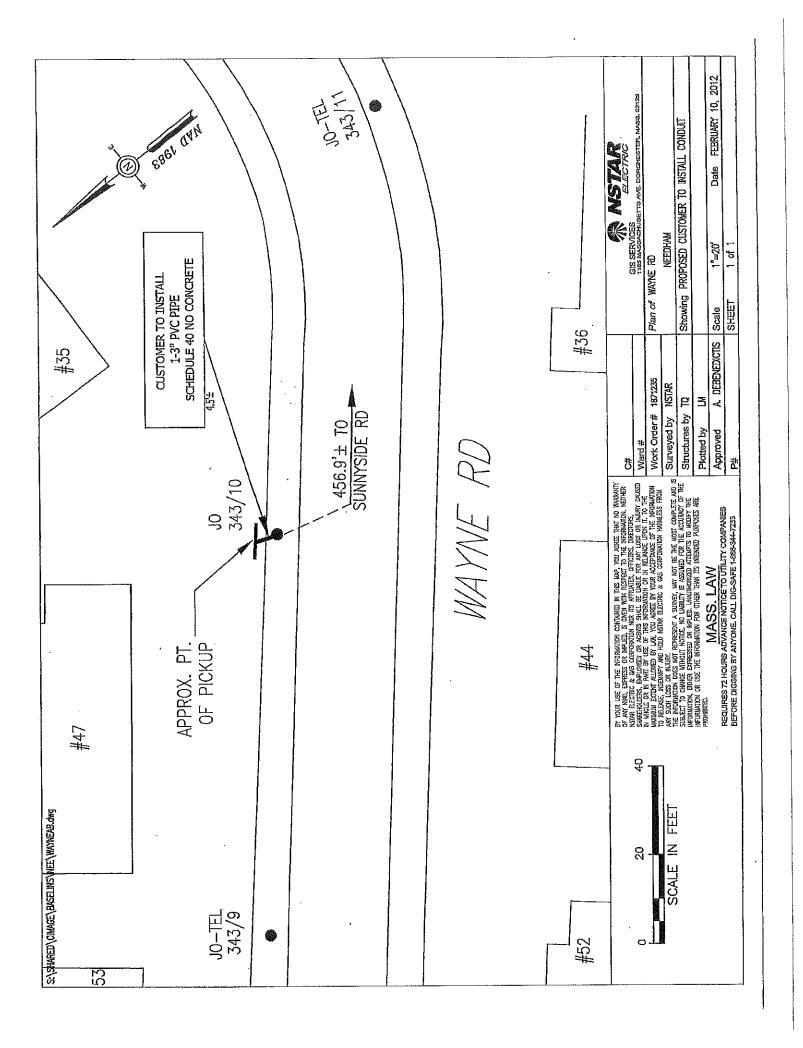

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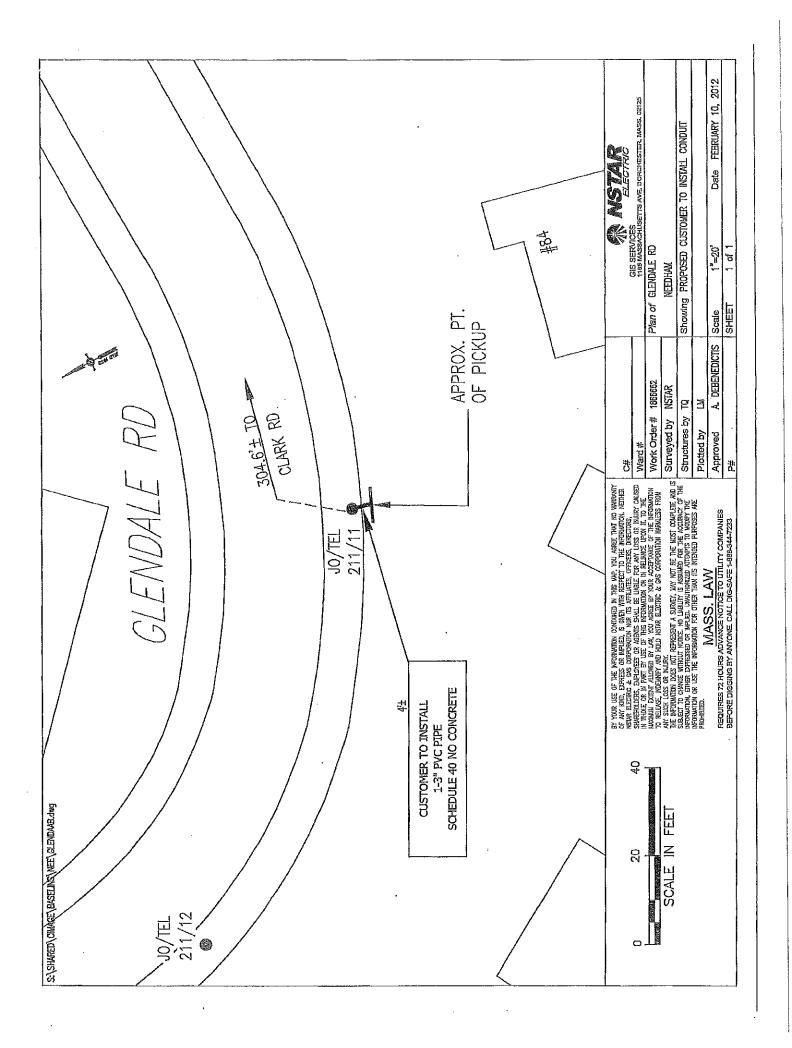

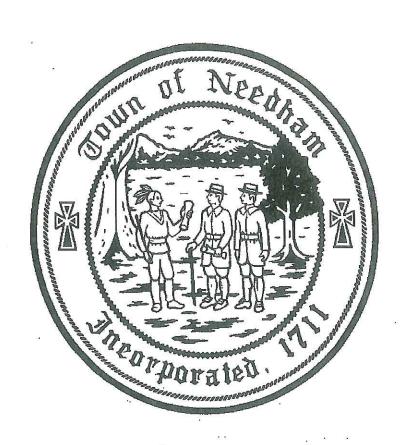

Street Permit Procedures & Regulations
Promulgated By The Board of Selectmen
Effective April 1, 2012

SECTION 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Street permit procedures are promulgated by the Department of Public Works pursuant to the authority granted under Sections 23 and 31 of the Town Charter and Section 2.2.5.1.4 of the General By-Laws.

Excavation and Trench Safety procedures are promulgated by the Department of Public Safety and the Division of Occupational Safety pursuant to authority granted by M.G.L. c. 82A. Requirements established in 520 CMR 14.00 and pursuant to section 2.2.5.4 of the General By-Laws are hereby included in this document.

The purpose of these procedures is to establish reasonable standards to protect the safety of the general public, to avoid interference with other road construction projects and to provide a uniform standard of construction for work within public ways or lands under the control of the Town.

These procedures may be revised from time to time in order to remain consistent with other State, Federal, or local Laws, regulation, or policy.

SECTION 2 DEFINITIONS

<u>Applicant</u> – the person who is applying for a permit or license under these procedures and the person to whom the permit or license is issued.

<u>Competent Person</u> - a person who is capable of identifying existing and predictable hazards in the surroundings or working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous to employees, and who has authorization to take prompt corrective measures to eliminate them.

Excavator – Any entity including, but not limited to, a person, partnership, joint venture, trust, corporation, association, public utility, company or state or local government body or public agency which performs excavation operations including the excavation of trenches.

<u>Grades Card</u> An index card issued by the building department that requires a signature from DPW staff confirming that all town specifications have been met in order to obtain a certificate of occupancy.

<u>License-</u> Written permission issued by The Needham Department of Public Works to an applicant who has been approved to do work in accordance with the Town's Street Permit procedures.

<u>Person</u> – any individual, group of individuals, association, partnership, corporation, company, business organization, trust, estate, the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof to the extent subject to Town by-laws, administrative agency, public or quasipublic corporation or body, and any other legal entity, its legal representatives, agents or assigns.

<u>Street</u> – Entire width between the boundaries of every town owned public way or easement.

<u>Street Permit</u> —A permit issued by the Needham Department of Public Works to an Applicant for occupying, obstructing, or excavating within a street, easement, or public or private property.

<u>Trench</u>—An excavation which is narrow in relation to its length, made below the ground surface in excess of 3 feet below grade and the depth of which is, in general, greater than the width, but the width of the trench, as measured at the bottom, is no greater than 15 feet.

<u>Trench Permit</u> – A street permit issued to perform trench excavation work.

<u>Work</u> – Opening, occupying, obstructing or excavating in a public way or excavating a trench on public or private property.

Work day – a period of time between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. occurring on a day of the week, except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays observed by the Town of Needham Department of Public Works. The hours may be modified as indicated on the permit.

SECTION 3 APPLICATION FOR LICENSES AND PERMITS

SECTION 3.1 License Requirements

No person may occupy, obstruct, excavate within a street or excavate a trench on public or private property prior to becoming licensed by the Town of Needham. Licenses may be issued by the Department of Public Works in 3-year cycles. All existing licenses will expire on December 1, 2012, and thereafter applicants must seek a renewal of their license if they intend to continue to perform work in the Town. A license renewal fee of \$300 will be required for renewal. Persons seeking to renew their license shall provide a copy of their Massachusetts Hoisting License for licenses that allow for excavation in a public way or any trench on a private or public way, a completed license application form, a check in the amount of \$300 payable to the Town of Needham and shall have had no outstanding violations in the previous licensing period. Examples of violations include but are not limited to, working without a street permit or trench permit, working in violation of the restrictions of street permits such as after 5 PM or on weekends, or work that does not meet town specifications. Such person upon receipt of a license commits to having a competent person on site in accordance with 520 CMR 14.00

Needham Department of Public Works shall require a signature committing the applicant to compliance with the requirements; a valid e-mail address and 24 hour phone number. A list of licensed contractors will be made available to the public via the Town of Needham website and shall be updated on an annual basis.

SECTION 3.2 Street Permit Requirements

Bond and Insurance Requirements

The holder of the permit shall be insured by an insurance carrier licensed to operate in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The minimum acceptable insurance amounts are as follows:

Public/General Liability

Bodily Injury

\$100,000/person

\$500,000 single limit

Property Damage

\$300,000/accident

\$500,000 single limit

Depending on the amount, complexity and length of time that a proposed construction work is expected, the Director of Public Works may require an increase of the above minimum insurance limits prior to issuing a permit to the licensed person.

Prior to the issuance of a permit, the Applicant shall deposit, with the Town, a Surety Bond in an amount and form as shall be determined by the Director of Public Works. The amount of the Surety Bond may also be established separately for each permit so that the Town will be protected against loss in the event of the failure of the permit holder to complete the work or make required repairs or restoration of damages involving the work or encroachment authorized by the permit.

The amount of bond for Street Permits shall be computed on the basis of cost required to make proper restoration or repairs. Immediately upon approval of an application for a permit, the Director of Public Works or his designee shall advise the Applicant as to the amount of bond required. An annual blanket Surety Bond, acceptable to the Director of Public Works, may be deposited to avoid the inconvenience and expenses of obtaining individual bonds for each permit requested. The minimum annual bond amount shall be \$5000.

The bond shall be released to the permit holder upon the expiration of the guarantee period. The guarantee period shall be for a period of one year following the placement of the permanent patch (except in cases of work in a road under a moratorium see Section 13). During the guarantee period, the Applicant shall be responsible for the repair and restoration of the surface.

An application for permit must be filed by a licensed person with the Town of Needham prior to any work on, in, within, under or over any Town-owned right of way, easement or land. Standard application forms for this permit may be obtained from the Department of Public Works.

An application for a Street Permit must be filed with the Department of Public Works or Board of Health prior to starting excavation of any Trench. The Applicant shall comply with the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Act, and any and all regulations promulgated by the Massachusetts Department of Public Safety pursuant to MGL c.82A and 520 CMR 14.00 (as amended) and the Town of Needham Bylaws, regulations, policies, and procedures.

Each application form shall be completely filled out and signed by the licensed person and shall be accompanied by the appropriate plans and permit fees. The completed application shall be submitted to the Department of Public Works. Applications for sub surface sewage works disposal permits are licensed under the permit issued by the Board of Health for that work under each permit issued by the Board of Health.

When applications are made for permits, complete plans and specifications must be submitted at the time of application. The plans shall be drawn at a scale of 1"=40' or greater scale, shall be drawn on the Form provided and shall contain the following minimum information.

General Information:

Address(es) of the area where work is proposed
Name, address and telephone number of the person preparing the plan
Name, address and telephone number of the Applicant
Street name(s) of the roadway(s) being affected
North arrow
Scale of the plan

Within 100 Feet of All Proposed Work:

All property lines, all utility poles and numbers, mailboxes, signs, trees and above ground utilities

All underground utilities

All driveways, intersections and limits of pavement

All fences, walls, guard rails, curbing, berms and rock outcrops

All ditches, swales and streams

All wetland and flood plain areas

All pavement markings

The plans shall show the approximate location and extent of the proposed work. For work requiring a Street Permit application, a traffic control plan or procedure shall also be submitted indicating how the public will be protected and public access continued through the work areas. Details shall include the number of uniformed police officers required by the Chief of Police, the location of barriers or barricades, lights, and warning signs. All safety devices shall comply with and be installed in accordance with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, current edition and with the Division of Occupational Safety Requirements.

No Permit and/or license will be issued to an Applicant and work will not be allowed to commence unless the Applicant and property owner of the site are current with all town fees.

Notification requirements

The Applicant shall in accordance with the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts give notice to public utility companies before excavation. A valid "Dig Safe" number shall be obtained for each application. The Applicant is also required to notify the Water and Sewer Division for dig safe markings of water, sewer, drain, and Highway Divison for traffic signal loops/conduit.

A twenty-four (24) hour notice to the Town Engineer or his designee prior to the start of work in the street or of a trench is required. The Street Permit may also have additional inspection notification requirements listed as part of the conditions of the permit.

Permit Completion

Upon completion of construction work related to the Street Permit, the Applicant shall notify the Department of Public Works that the work has been completed in conformance with the permit. The site will be inspected and if it is determined that all aspects of the project are properly complete, the permit will be closed out. If the construction does not meet all criteria specified in the permit regarding the completeness of the project, a notice will be issued to the Applicant outlining the incomplete items.

In the event that a Street Permit cannot be closed out during the period between April 1st and November 30th, the applicant may submit a letter requesting approval of the work contingent upon its completion in order to obtain an occupancy certificate from the Building Department. Such written request shall include at a minimum: The date which work is expected to be completed, licensed persons that will be completing the work and a current Street Permit must be obtained by the licensed person. The Department of Public Works may provide guidance in the form of a standard letter that may be submitted for this request. If the request is not approved, the applicant will receive written notification of the reasons why the request was not accepted.

SECTION 4 PERMIT AND LICENSE FEES

At the time of filing an application, all fees for the permit shall be paid by the Applicant. The fees are based on cost intended to cover the Town's administrative, technical, and inspectional review cost. The fee schedule is as follows:

Street Occupancy Permit Fee -	\$100
Street Excavation Permit Fee -	\$325 First 50 linear feet in Right of Way
	Plus \$1 per foot additional charge in excess of 50 Feet
License Fee	\$300
Trench Excavation Fee	\$50

*Street Permit including

Proposed Sidewalk Improvements \$100

*The town recognizes a property owners desire to improve the sidewalk areas in front of their property. Street permits that include the re-construction of a sidewalk which improves the town's infrastructure along the frontage of the homeowner's property shall have the permit fee reduced to \$100. The sidewalk requirements for construction shall conform to the minimum standards required by the Town.

SECTION 5 ISSUANCE OF PERMIT

A permit may be issued after proper completion of all aspects of the application for permit, a validly held street permit license, receipt of a surety bond and certificates of insurance showing insurance coverage in the required amounts; receipt of a DIG SAFE confirmation number; confirmation of notification of Water and Sewer, identification of the competent person responsible for work conducted under the permit, and payment of fees as required in these procedures.

A permit must be signed by the Director of Public Works or his designee before it becomes valid and will include an expiration date and a list of conditions. Permits will be issued within 2 working days after the complete application has been received including any bond amounts and fees, and approval by the Director. No work may commence until the Applicant has received a signed permit.

Permits issued under these procedures are valid for a period of 30 calendar days unless stated otherwise on the permit. Work may only be performed on work days between the dates of April 1st and November 30th inclusive and between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Except as permitted under the Emergency Permits Section of these procedures, no work shall be conducted on other than the above specified dates and times. Permits may be extended through November 30 of the current year. In the event of the Permit holder's failure to strictly comply with these procedures or permit conditions, the permit issued shall be revoked effective immediately upon making written notification of the violation to the Applicant by hand delivery or by ordinary mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the Applicant's address as shown on the permit.

A permit holder whose permit has been revoked will be subject to a license review which may result in the revocation of his/her license.

SECTION 6 EMERGENCY PERMITS

Oral permission may be granted by the Director of Public Works or his designee to perform emergency work, such as repair of broken gas or water mains, sewer mains or drain lines, telecommunication lines, or electric service conduits. On the first working day following oral permission, the person receiving such permission shall file for a permit in the manner prescribed for non-emergency work.

SECTION 7 INDEMNIFICATION

The Applicant shall agree as a condition governing the issuance of a permit that the Applicant will indemnify and hold harmless the Town of Needham, the Director of Public Works and its agents and employees from any and all claims and action whatsoever arising from the exercises of said permit. The Applicant's signature on the permit application shall be deemed to be an acknowledgment and agreement with the above condition.

The Applicant shall agree as a condition governing the issuance of a permit that if it becomes necessary for the Town to incur legal fees or expenses to defend or enforce any of the terms or conditions of the permit, the Applicant shall reimburse the Town for any such fees and expenses reasonably incurred by the Town.

SECTION 8 PROTECTIVE MEASURES & TRAFFIC CONTROL

It shall be the responsibility of the Applicant to make certain that the security of the traveling public is safeguarded and its rights are not unreasonably curtailed. The Applicant shall place around openings, excavations, encumbrances or obstructions, such barriers, barricades, lights, warning flags, danger signs and traffic control personnel as are required by the Department of Public Works and the Police Department to protect the safety of the general public. Adequate artificial lighting devices are required to call attention to and indicate the actual location of obstructions and hazards. All barricades, warning signs, lights, temporary signals and other protective devices shall conform with the current edition of the "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways" and with the Division of Occupational Safety Requirements. Traffic control devices shall be set up prior to the start of construction or maintenance operations and shall remain in place only as long as needed or required by the Department of Public Works. Advertisements, notices and signs other than for traffic control shall not be displayed on or attached to any barricade or fence in any right of way.

When the work area encroaches upon a sidewalk, walkway or crosswalk area, protective barriers, together with appropriate warning and guidance devices and signs, must be utilized so that the passageway for pedestrians is safe and well defined.

If any work requires a detour of a section of road, the Applicant shall submit at least 5-days in advance a traffic management plan to the DPW, Police, and Fire Department for review.

SECTION 9 STREET PERMIT CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS

All construction shall comply with the "Standards To Be Employed by Public Utility Operators When Restoring Any of the Streets, Lanes and Highways in Municipalities" (see Attached) as promulgated by the Massachusetts Department of Telecommunications and Energy (MDTE) 98-22, and shall also comply with the following requirements:

GENERAL CONSTRUCTION

Workmanship

As the work progresses, all streets shall be kept cleaned of all rubbish, excess earth, rock and other debris resulting from such work. All material excavated from trenches, and piles adjacent to the excavated trench in any street, shall be piled and maintained in such a manner as not to endanger those working in the trench, pedestrians, or users of the street, and so that as little inconvenience as possible is caused to those using the street from adjoining properties. Whenever necessary, in order to expedite the flow of traffic or to abate the dirt or dust nuisance, the boards or bins may be required by the Town to prevent the spreading of dirt into traffic lanes. Where the confines of the area being excavated are too narrow to permit the piling of excavated material beside the trench, the Town shall have the authority to require that the Applicant haul the excavated material to a storage site and then re-haul it to the trench site at the time of backfilling.

It shall be the Applicant's responsibility to secure the necessary permission and make all necessary arrangements for all required storage and disposal sites.

Dust control shall be provided as necessary to prevent a nuisance to abutters and surrounding areas. Dust control shall be by wetting or use of calcium chloride or other approved methods.

Protection of Adjoining Properties and Facilities

The Applicant shall not interfere with any existing facility without the written consent of the Town and/or the owner of the facility. If it becomes necessary to relocate an existing facility, this shall be done by its owner. No facility owned by the Town shall be moved to accommodate the Applicant, unless the cost of such work will be borne entirely by the Applicant. The cost of moving privately owned facilities shall be similarly borne by the Applicant unless it makes other arrangements with the person owning the facility. The Applicant shall support and protect, by the use of timbers, all piles, conduits, poles, wires or other apparatus which may in any way be necessary to support, sustain and protect them under, over, along or across said excavation works. The Applicant shall secure approval of the method of support and protection from the owner of the facility. In case any of said pipes, conduits, poles, wires, or apparatus shall be damaged, and for this purpose, pipe coating or other encasement or devices are to be considered as part of a structure, the Applicant shall promptly notify the owner thereof. All damaged facilities shall be repaired by the agency or person owning them and the expense of such repairs shall be charged to the Applicant. It is the intent of this paragraph that the Applicant shall assume all liability for damage to facilities and injury to persons. The only exception will be such instances where damage is exclusively due to the negligence of the owning company. The Town shall not be made a party to any action because of this paragraph. The Applicant shall inform himself as to the existence and location of all underground facilities and protect the same against damages.

The Applicant shall at all times, and at his own expense, preserve and protect from injury any adjoining property by providing proper foundations and lateral support, and by taking such other precautions as may be necessary for that purpose. The Applicant shall, at his own expense, shore up and protect buildings*, trees, walls, fences or other property likely to be damaged during the progress of excavation work and shall be responsible for all damage to public or private property or roadways resulting from his failure to properly protect and carry out said work. The Applicant shall not remove, even temporarily, any trees or shrubs which exist in planting strip areas, without first obtaining the consent of the Director of Public Works or his designee. (See Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 87, Section 5 – Cutting Trees)

All unattended trenches shall be plated with steel plates or shall be completely enclosed by a chain link fence at least 6 feet in height in accordance with M.G.L c 82A and 520 CMR 14.00.

The applicant is informed that any work associated with buildings may require approval by the building inspector.

Shade Trees

Shade trees shall not be cut down, trimmed or otherwise injured. Where it is necessary to cut and remove pavement, curb, sidewalk and/or other surface improvement, the material shall be cut and removed by means of equipment suitable to the type of material to be removed and in a manner which results in a minimum amount of damage to adjacent improvements.

The following policy will be adhered to in case a tree is destroyed by the Applicant or a

tree is authorized for removal by the Director:

All tree stumps and debris resulting from the work shall be removed from the location.

A replacement shall be made by the Applicant for each tree removed or destroyed with a minimum caliper of 2 inches or greater; the species and place of relocation to be designated by the Tree Warden. It must be planted in place and it must be balled and burlapped.

The Applicant shall deliver to the Director of Public Works, a bonafide order, placed with a recognized established nursery before installing the authorized trees. The Order shall include in it a statement that the size and species required will be in accordance with "USA Standard for Nursery Stock" and that planting will be done in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works Standard Specifications.

For roadside planting, the following type trees will be acceptable, subject to approval by the Director of Public Works as to which specific species is best for the location where the tree is to be planted: Norway Maple, Sugar Maple, Crimson King Maple, European Linden or approved equal.

In certain areas of the Town, ornamental trees, such as Flowering Crab, European Mountain Ash, Japanese Flowering Cherry, Moraine Ash and Washington Hawthorne, are acceptable as replacement trees. These trees are purchased by height and not by caliper and must be balled and burlapped. They must conform to the following minimum heights: 5' to 6', Flowering Crabs and Flowering Cherries; and 6' to 8' Moraine Ash, European Mountain Ash and Washington Hawthorne.

Drainage

Provisions shall be made to provide for proper drainage during construction and the Applicant shall be responsible for all claims for damage or injury that may arise from or in connection with the work conducted under the permit. The permit holder shall exercise every reasonable precaution to prevent or minimize silting of rivers, streams, ponds, or wetland areas. This shall include the use of berms, dikes, dams, sediment basins, screened or crushed stone, gravel, mulches, grasses, waterways and other erosion control methods.

Monuments

Property or street line monuments, survey reference points and permanent survey benchmarks, shall not be removed or disturbed, unless specifically permitted in writing by the Department of Public Works.

Excavations, Backfilling, and Paving

Excavations shall be backfilled in layers not to exceed 12 inches and shall be compacted to not less than 95% maximum dry density at optimum moisture content using pneumatic

tampers, vibratory compactors or other approved means. Puddling will not be allowed. The material compaction shall be determined by the Standard Proctor Method in accordance with Standard Specifications.

If unsuitable for backfill, excavated material shall be replaced with granular backfill gravel as specified in the Massachusetts Department of Public Works Standard Construction Specifications for Streets and Highways. Within the paved roadway areas, 8 inches of gravel borrow sub base conforming to Massachusetts Standard Specification M1.03.0 Type C shall be placed followed by 4 inches of crushed gravel conforming to M2.01.7 and finally the 2 ½" binder course and 1 ½" wearing course. In sidewalk and driveway areas, six (6) inches of crushed gravel base shall be placed and compacted to achieve 95% density. Any asphalt or concrete sidewalk surface shall be restored to a depth equal to existing with three (3) inches of concrete or pavement minimum. In case of longitudinal trenches in a sidewalk area, full width restoration may be required.

In other areas, the excavation shall be restored to the condition that existed before the excavation or as directed by Department of Public Works inspectors. Any existing grassland shall be restored with four (4) inches of sifted loam which shall be fertilized and seeded.

Driveways

One or a combination of driveway locations may be allowed for a residential lot for a maximum width of 24 feet in total. Such driveway location(s) shall be at least 30' from an intersecting road. (see attachment for typical drawing detail) Water box covers shall be installed where the water service shut off is located within paved areas.

Sidewalks

Sidewalks shall meet AAB requirements and restored to a safe passable condition that meets additional specifications in this section. Sidewalk widths shall be 4'6" unless otherwise required to be wider per other permit condition, or regulation. Sidewalk widths of less than 4'-6" require approval from the DPW Director. All sidewalk surface repairs/replacements shall consist of the same materials that currently exist, unless the DPW Director approves such other material. Work on or in sidewalk areas may trigger a requirement for handicap ramp construction on corner lots. Property owners who choose to re-construct the sidewalk in front of their home may be required to construct a handicap ramp on corner lots. Water box covers shall be installed where the water service shut off is located within paved areas.

Compliance Testing

In general, where compliance to the requirements of these Regulations and their intent is in question, the Applicant, at his expense shall provide any and all proof of compliance to the Department of Public Works. Acceptable proof shall be by, but not limited to, approved independent laboratory tests, approved independent field tests, shop drawings and certificates of compliance from manufacturers. Specific tests as required by regulations and specifications shall be performed.

Other Requirements

The permit shall be kept with the foreman at the place where the work is being performed and shall be produced for examination upon request of any member or officer of the Department of Public Works or any police officer of the Town of Needham.

After an excavation is commenced, the work shall proceed in a continuous manner with diligence and expedition and shall be completed and the street restored, as nearly as possible to its original condition, so as not to obstruct the public places or travel thereon more than is reasonably necessary. The surface of the street shall be permanently restored within a period of time not to exceed five (5) days from the date of completion of the project. In any event, the Applicant shall place and maintain temporary pavement immediately upon backfilling which shall be maintained on a daily basis. Department of Public Works inspectors will require temporary "hot-patch" or "cold-patch" dependent upon the location of the opening. Upon completion of the pavement restoration, the Department of Public Works shall be immediately notified as to the location and time of completion. Permanent pavement surface shall be smooth with less than ¼" dip or bump within a 10' length.

Traffic loops at all signalized intersections must be undisturbed or replaced to original condition prior to completing construction.

Restoration

Cuts in pavement shall be parallel or perpendicular to the line of the trench. In the case of transverse or diagonal trenching, the pavement shall be sawn to provide a flat diamond shaped patch with a two (2) foot minimum overlap on undisturbed material that will permit only one wheel of a vehicle at a time to strike the patch area. Within the sawn limits of the final patch, the existing pavement and any temporary material shall be removed and replaced to an equal depth with a minimum of four (4) inches (two and a half (2 ½) inches of base and 1 ½ inches of top) of bituminous pavement laid and compacted to meet the existing pavement edge exactly. The face of all joints shall be sealed with asphalt emulsion and sanded.

In cases where multiple excavations are made in a street which would result in the edge of patches being closer than 20 feet to one another, the Department of Public Works Inspectors may require one continuous patch. (see attached typical drawing detail)

All permanent pavement markings (crosswalks, traffic center lines, etc.), shall be repainted or replaced by or under the direction of the Department of Public Works of the Town of Needham, at the expense of the Applicant.

The Director of Public Works, as a condition of the permit, reserves the right to restore the highway or cause the same to be restored under his directions and the Applicant shall reimburse the Town for any or all liability and expense suffered by reason of such work. If the final restoration is not completed in a prompt manner, Department forces will, after notice has been given to the Applicant, make final restoration which may be done after their normal working hours (overtime rate). The Applicant shall reimburse the Town for any liability and expense suffered by reason of such work.

UTILITY CONNECTIONS

All utility connections to existing water mains, sewer mains and drain lines shall conform to the following standards and specifications. Sewer, water and drain connections require separate permits and fees from the Water and Sewer Division.

Water Mains and Service Laterals

All extensions to water mains shall be made using a tapping sleeve and valve unless otherwise approved by the Water and Sewer Superintendent. The water main shall be Class 52 CLDI and shall meet Town of Needham Standard Construction Specifications.

All fittings and valves shall also meet Town of Needham Standard Construction Specifications. Poured concrete thrust blocks shall be installed at all tees, plugs and bends in the pipe. The concrete shall meet MDPW Specifications M4-02 for Cement Concrete Class C. The thrust blocks shall be poured against undisturbed original aground and shall be so placed that pipe joints will be accessible for any possible future repairs. Yokes and tie rods may be used where it is not possible to install thrust blocks or at the discretion of the Water and Sewer Superintendent. Pipe anchors shall be used when and as directed.

The pipe shall be properly bedded with clean gravel fill meeting MDPW Specification Ml.03.0 Type C. The bedding material shall be placed and compacted by hand to the top of the pipe making sure that no cavities in the bedding exist around the pipe. The pipe bedding shall then continue to one (1 ft.) foot above the pipe.

Service laterals shall be made of 1-inch copper using a 1-inch corporation meeting Town of Needham Standard Construction Specifications. The tap shall be made at either the 2 o'clock or 10 o'clock positions on the pipe and the lateral shall be bent into a gooseneck of at least 6 inches. Service laterals exceeding 1 inch in diameter shall be accompanied by a saddle attached to the water main unless otherwise instructed by the Water and Sewer Superintendent. The service lateral shall be bedded within a 1 ft. layer of sand meeting MDPW specifications M1.04.0 Type a. The curb stop shall be located within the street right of way as indicated in the Specifications.

Sewer Mains

All sewer main extensions from existing sewer mains shall be made at a sewer manhole. The manhole structure shall be pre-cast reinforced concrete meeting ASTM C478 specifications. All joints shall be properly sealed with Butyl Rubber or Neoprene Rings and Type II Portland Cement Concrete. The manholes shall have pre-cut holes with rubberized boots for all pipe connections. The manhole shall be set on a minimum 8 inch leveled and compacted base or ¾"-1½" crushed stone. Doghouse style manholes are not permitted. See Town of Needham Standard Construction Specifications for further information.

The sewer main pipe shall be installed from the low end to the high end with the bell end of the pipe at the high end. The pipe shall be SDR 35 PVC and shall meet Town of Needham Standard Specifications. The pipe shall be set in a bed of 3/4"-11/2" crushed stone and shall be completely surrounded by the stone to a depth of at least 8 inches.

The pipe shall be laid true to line and grade. The minimum pipe diameter used for main extensions shall be 8 inches. Larger diameters may be required as determined by the Director of Public Works. The minimum acceptable slope is 0.004 ft. /ft. Consideration shall be given to surrounding areas during the design process. The sewer main extension shall be designed to accommodate the maximum area that can be reasonably serviced as determined by the Director. Wyes and/or partials shall be installed where, in the opinion of the Director, such installation would service an unsewered potential lot.

Provision shall be made by the contractor to ensure that sewage does not surcharge in existing mains during construction. This may be accomplished by pumping with pumps capable of handling existing flows so that surcharging upstream does not occur or by fashioning a bypass pipe section to allow sewage to flow around the work area. In any event, sewage shall not be allowed to flood the excavation.

Lateral connections to the sewer main shall be made with wye connections set 45 degrees above the horizontal plane and angled in the direction of the sewage flow in the main. Wyes shall be SDR-35 PVC and shall meet Town of Needham Standard Construction Specifications. Connections to existing sewer mains other than PVC shall be made with Fernco-style saddle wyes. Such connections shall not be constructed without prior approval from the Director of Public Works.

SECTION 10 INSPECTIONS

The Town shall make such inspections as are reasonably necessary in the enforcement of these procedures. The Town shall have the authority to promulgate and cause to be enforced such procedures as may be reasonably necessary to ensure that the work conforms to the requirements herein. The issued permit may include necessary scheduled inspection requirements during the construction process. The Applicant shall contact the DPW to schedule timing of inspections during the construction process.

SECTION 11 ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES

<u>Permit Procedures and Regulations</u>. Whoever violates any provision of these procedures may be penalized by a non-criminal complaint in the District Court pursuant to provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined \$100 for Street Permit violations or \$100 for Trench Excavation violations. Each day such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

If the work, or any part thereof, mentioned in the preceding sections shall be unskillfully or improperly done, the Town shall cause the same to be skillfully and properly done and shall keep an account of the expense thereof; and, in such cases, such person or utility shall pay the Town an amount equal to the whole of said expense incurred by said Town with an additional amount of 50% to cover indirect costs. The total cost is referred to herein as "recoverable charges". Thereafter, upon completion of the work and the determination of the costs thereof the Town shall issue no further permits to any person or utility until it shall receive payment of said costs.

Any person or utility who continues to violate any regulation of these procedures shall receive no further permits and is subject to license revocation until such time as the Town is satisfied that the person or utility shall comply with the terms of these Procedures and Regulations. A contractor license may be revoked or deemed non-renewable if the inspector deems their craftsmanship or performance sub standard to Needham DPW standards as determined by the Director of Public Works.

Failure to obtain a valid permit or license prior to the start of construction or activity is subject to a "cease and desist order" and may be grounds for license revocation or rejection.

SECTION 12 MORATORIUMS

Each year, and at the completion of a road construction upgrade or reconstruction project, the DPW will update a list of roads considered to be under a moratorium. The minimum period of the moratorium is for 5-years. Such list will be available at the DPW's Administration office.

Work that results in breaking through pavement, landscaping or curbing within the Right of Way of a road under a moratorium is prohibited except under special circumstances approved by the Town Engineer. In such cases where work is unavoidable the following minimum standards must be met.

- 1. Construction requirements specified in Section 10;
- 2. Curb to curb mill and overlay coverage a minimum distance of 10 feet beyond the edges of disturbance;
- 3. The contractor shall guarantee through a surety determined by the Department of Public Works for a period one year beyond the end of the moratorium date for that section of road.

SECTION 13 REVISIONS & SEVERABILITY

These procedures may be revised from time to time by vote of the Board of Selectmen. The invalidity of any section of these procedures shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof, nor shall it invalidate any permit which has been previously issued.

SECTION 14 EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of these procedures and Regulations shall apply to all work performed on or after April 1, 2012.

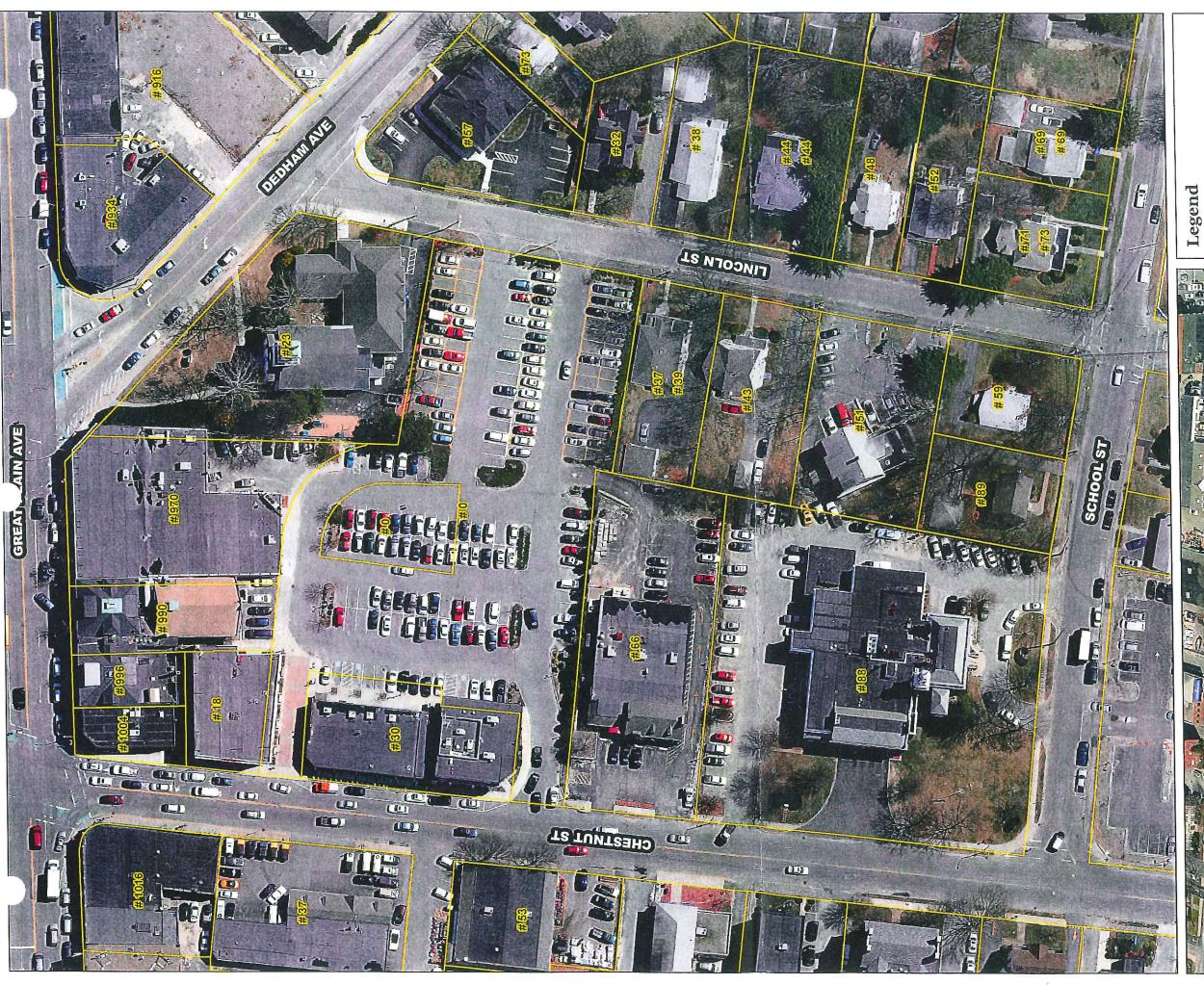

Section 16. (a) If a governmental body duly authorized by general or special law to engage in such transaction determines that it shall rent, convey, or otherwise dispose of real property, the governmental body shall declare the property available for disposition and shall specify the restrictions, if any, that it will place on the subsequent use of the property.

- (b) The governmental body shall determine the value of the property through procedures customarily accepted by the appraising profession as valid.
- (c) A governmental body shall solicit proposals prior to:
- (1) acquiring by purchase or rental real property or an interest therein from any person at a cost exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars; or
- (2) disposing of, by sale or rental to any person, real property or any interest therein, determined in accordance with paragraph (b) to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars in value.
- (d) The governmental body shall place an advertisement inviting the submission of proposals in a newspaper with a circulation in the locality sufficient to inform the people of the affected locality. The governmental body shall publish the advertisement at least once a week for two consecutive weeks. The last publication shall occur at least eight days preceding the day for opening proposals. The advertisement shall specify the geographical area, terms and requirements of the proposed transaction, and the time and place for the submission of proposals. In the case of the acquisition or disposition of more than twenty-five hundred square feet of real property, the governmental body shall also cause such advertisement to be published, at least thirty days before the opening of proposals, in the central register published by the state secretary pursuant to section twenty A of chapter nine.
- (e) The governmental body may shorten or waive the advertising requirement if:
- (1) the governmental body determines that an emergency exists and the time required to comply with the requirements would endanger the health or safety of the people or their property; provided, however, that the governmental body shall state the reasons for declaring

the emergency in the central register at the earliest opportunity; or

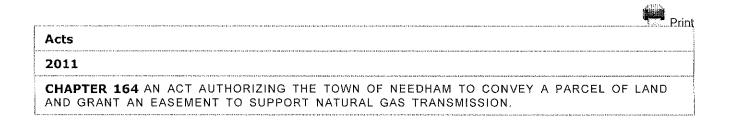
- (2) in the case of a proposed acquisition, the governmental body determines in writing that advertising will not benefit the governmental body's interest because of the unique qualities or location of the property needed. The determination shall specify the manner in which the property proposed for acquisition satisfies the unique requirements. The governmental body shall publish the determination and the reasons for the determination, along with the names of the parties having a beneficial interest in the property pursuant to section forty J of chapter seven, the location and size of the property, and the proposed purchase price or rental terms, in the central register not less than thirty days before the governmental body executes a binding agreement to acquire the property.
- (f) Proposals shall be opened publicly at the time and place designated in the advertisement. The governmental body shall submit the name of the person selected as party to a real property transaction, and the amount of the transaction, to the state secretary for publication in the central register.
- (g) If the governmental body decides to dispose of property at a price less than the value as determined pursuant to paragraph (b), the governmental body shall publish notice of its decision in the central register, explaining the reasons for its decision and disclosing the difference between such value and the price to be received.
- (h) This section shall not apply to the rental of residential property to qualified tenants by a housing authority or a community development authority.
- (i) Acquisitions or dispositions of real property or any interest therein pursuant to this section between governmental bodies and the federal government, the commonwealth or any of its political subdivisions or another state or political subdivision thereof shall be subject to subsections (a), (b) and (g).

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:

SECTION 1. The board of selectmen and the conservation commission of the town of Needham may convey a certain parcel of conservation land, containing approximately 375 square feet, located at Ridge Hill Reservation, off Mary Chilton road in the town of Needham, to Algonquin Gas Transmission, LLC to correct an encroachment of a building by Algonquin Gas Transmission and to operate and maintain a gas transmission line utility. The parcel is identified as Tract N-215A on a plan prepared by the town of Needham conservation commission and dated May 27, 2011.

SECTION 2. In consideration for the conveyance authorized in section 1, Algonquin Gas shall make a payment in the amount of \$50,000 to the Conservation Trust Fund of the town of Needham.

SECTION 3. The town of Needham, acting by and through its conservation commission and board of selectmen may transfer to its board of selectmen the care, custody and control of a certain parcel of land acquired for conservation purposes to be used for general municipal use for the purpose of installing and maintaining a cathodic protection system for a gas transmission line for Algonquin Gas. The parcel contains approximately 18,764 square feet of land, is at Ridge Hill Reservation, located 461 Charles River street and is shown on a plan entitled "Ridge Hill Cathodic Protection System Permitting Plan" prepared in 2010 by Vanasse Hangen Brustlin, Inc., of Watertown, MA.

SECTION 4. The town of Needham, acting by and through its board of selectmen, may grant a cathodic protection easement to Algonquin Gas on 19,564 square feet of land within Ridge Hill Reservation described in section 3 containing 18,764 square feet and another parcel of land containing approximately 800 square feet that is held by the town for municipal purposes. Such easement shall be for the installation and maintenance of the cathodic protection system for a gas transmission line for Algonquin Gas.

SECTION 5. In consideration for the grant of the easement set forth in section 4, Algonquin Gas shall make a payment in the amount of \$20,000 to the Conservation Trust Fund of the

town of Needham.

SECTION 6. If the lands conveyed and transferred pursuant to sections 1, 3 and 4 cease to be used for the purposes described in said sections, the lands shall revert to the town of Needham and shall be dedicated to conservation purposes within Ridge Hill Reservation.

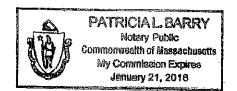

ARTICLE1: AMEND ZONING BY-LAW - DESCRIPTION OF FLOOD PLAIN DISTRICTS AND FLOOD PLAIN DISTRICT REGULATIONS

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Needham Zoning By-Law, as follows:

- (a) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, by revising the first paragraph thereof so that the entire paragraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "The Floodplain District is herein established as an overlay district. The areas included in the Flood Plain Districts are defined as follows:"
- (b) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, Subsection 2.3.1, by adding a new paragraph 2.3.1 to read as follows:
 - "2.3.1 All special flood hazard areas within the Town of Needham designated as Zone A, AE, or AH on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the administration of the National Flood Insurance Program. The map panels of the Norfolk County FIRM that are wholly or partially within the Town of Needham are panel numbers 25021C0016E, 25021C0017E, 25021C0018E, 25021C0019E, 25021C0028E, 25021C0036E, 25021C0037E, 25021C0038E, and 25021C0039E dated July 17, 2012. The exact boundaries of the District may be defined by the 100-year base flood elevations shown on the FIRM and further defined by the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report dated July 17, 2012. The FIRM and FIS report are incorporated herein by reference and are on file with the Town Clerk, Planning Board, Building Official, Conservation Commission and Engineering Department."
- (c) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, by renumber former paragraphs 2.3.1, 2.3.2, 2.3.3, 2.3.4, 2.3.5, 2.3.6, and 2.3.7 as paragraphs 2.3.2, 2.3.3, 2.3.4, 2.3.5, 2.3.6, 2.3.7 and 2.3.8 respectively.
- (d) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.3, <u>Uses Requiring a Special Permit</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (a) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(a) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvements) of residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps (the 100-year flood plain elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it can be demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood.
- (e) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.3, <u>Uses Requiring a Special Permit</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (b) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(b) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvement) of non-residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps (the 100-year flood elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map or are flood proofed and watertight to the applicable flood elevation. In the case where watertight flood proofing is permitted, a registered professional engineer or architect

- shall certify to the Building Inspector that the methods used are adequate to withstand flood depth pressures and velocities impact and the uplift of forces and other factors associated with the 100-year flood. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it is demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood."
- (f) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.5, <u>General Provisions Relating to Flood Plain District</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (a) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(a) All development in the Flood Plain District, including structural and non-structural activities, whether permitted by right or by special permit shall be in compliance with Chapter 131, Section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws and with the following: (i) Section of the Massachusetts State Building Code which addresses floodplain and coastal high hazard areas (currently 780 CMR); (ii) Wetlands Protection Regulations, Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) (currently 310 CMR 10.00); (iii) Inland Wetlands Restriction, DEP (currently 310 CMR 13.00); and (iv) Minimum Requirements for the Subsurface Disposal of Sanitary Sewage, DEP (currently 310 CMR 15, Title 5). Any variances from the provisions and requirements of the above referenced state regulations may only be granted in accordance with the required variance procedures of these state regulations."
- (g) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.5, <u>General Provisions Relating to Flood Plain District</u>, by revising the first sentence of subparagraph (c) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(c) Base flood elevation data shall be provided for subdivision proposals or other developments of greater than 50 lots or 5 acres, within unnumbered A zones, as shown on the <u>Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) dated July 17, 2012."</u>
- (h) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.5, <u>General Provisions Relating to Flood Plain District</u>, by revising the first sentence of subparagraph (d) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(d) Within areas designated Zone A, AH, and AE, along watercourses that have not had a regulatory floodway designated, as shown on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM), Floodway Map, and Flood Insurance Study, dated July 17, 2012, the best available Federal, State, local, or other floodway data shall be used to prohibit encroachments in floodways which would result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the occurrence of the base flood discharge."
- (i) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.6, <u>National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Requirements</u>, by revising the first sentence of the first paragraph so that the entire paragraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):

In granting special permits authorized above under Subsections 3.3.3 and 3.3.4, the Board of Appeals shall, as appropriate, require the following as conditions of approval:"
- (j) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.6, <u>National Flood Insurance Program</u> (NFIP) Requirements, by revising the first sentence of subparagraph (c) so that the entire

subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):

"(c) Require that adjacent communities, the site coordination office and the NFIP State Coordinator at the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation be notified prior to any alteration or relocation of a water course, and that a copy of such notification be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Administrator."

2.2 Location of Districts

Said districts are located and bounded as shown on a map entitled "Zoning Map of the Town of Needham, Mass." dated September, 1924, as revised and amended to date and on file in the Office of the Town Clerk and as further described for Flood Plain Districts in Section 2.3. The Zoning Map with boundaries of the districts and all explanatory matter thereon is hereby made a part of this By-Law.

2.2.1

Where a district boundary is shown as following a street, railroad or utility, the boundary shall be the center line thereof as said line existed at the date of the adoption of the Zoning Map, unless otherwise indicated.

2.2.2

Where a district boundary is indicated as a property or lot line and the exact position of such line is not defined by measurements, the true location thereof shall be taken as the boundary line as said line existed at the date of the establishment of such boundary.

2.2.3

Where a district boundary is shown outside of a street, railroad or utility and approximately parallel thereto, the boundary shall be deemed parallel to the nearest line thereof, and the figure placed on the Zoning Map between the boundary and such line shall be the distance in feet between them, as measured at a right angle from such line otherwise indicated.

2.2.4

Where a district boundary is shown as following a watercourse, the boundary shall coincide with the center line thereof as said line existed at the date of the establishment of such boundary.

2.2.5

Where a district boundary shall include a numerical figure followed by the letters, M.S.L., it is at that number of feet above mean sea level.

2.2.6

Where the location of a district boundary line is otherwise uncertain, the location thereof shall be determined with the distance in feet from other lines of bounds as given or as measured from the scale of the Zoning Map.

2.3 Description of Flood Plain Districts

The Floodplain District is herein established as an overlay district. The areas included in the Flood Plain Districts are defined as follows:

2.3.1

All special flood hazard areas within the Town of Needham designated as Zone A, AE, or AH on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the administration of the National Flood Insurance Program. The map panels of the Norfolk County FIRM that are wholly or partially within the Town of Needham are panel numbers 25021C0016E, 25021C0017E, 25021C0018E, 25021C0019E, 25021C0028E, 25021C0036E, 25021C0037E, 25021C0038E, and 25021C0039E dated July 17, 2012. The exact boundaries of the District may be defined by the 100-year base flood elevations shown on the FIRM and further defined by the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report dated July 17, 2012. The FIRM and FIS report are incorporated herein by reference and are on file with the Town Clerk, Planning Board, Building Official, Conservation Commission and Engineering Department.

All that land along or sloping toward that portion of Rosemary Brook between Rosemary Lakea and Central Avenue that is at or below the following elevations:

- (a) Ninety (90) feet above mean sea level upstream of West Street
- (b) Eighty-eight (88) feet above mean sea level between West Street and Central Avenue

2.3.32

All that land along or sloping toward that portion of Rosemary Brook between Central Avenue and the Needham-Wellesley town line that is at or below an elevation of eighty-five (85) feet above mean sea level.

2.3.43

All that land along or sloping toward the Fuller Brook that is at or below the following elevations:

- (a) One hundred forty (140) feet above mean sea level upstream of a line described as follows: beginning at the U.S. Geodetic Survey bench mark 28 AK (Massachusetts 1941 Coordinates X = 665044.12, Y = 464912.59), thence northerly along a straight line thirty-seven hundred (3700) feet more or less to a point at the intersection of the center lines of Alden Road and Steward Road.
- (b) One hundred thirty-seven (137) feet above mean sea level westerly of the line described in the preceding paragraph (a) and also including all that land at or below elevation one hundred thirty-seven (137) feet mean sea level between Cartwright Road and the Needham-Wellesley town line and between Central Avenue and the Needham-Wellesley town line.

2.3.54

All that land along or sloping toward the Charles River between the most easterly intersection of the Needham-Dover-Wellesley town lines and the Cochrane Dam that is at or below the following elevations:

- (a) One hundred ten (110) feet above mean sea level between the most easterly intersection of the Needham-Dover-Wellesley town lines and a line projected perpendicular to the center line of the Charles River extending westerly from the Metropolitan District Commission sewer manhole, Station #43 + 33.20, seventy-eight hundred (7800) feet more or less downstream.
- (b) One hundred nine (109) feet above mean sea level between a line projected perpendicular to the center line of the Charles River extending westerly from the Metropolitan District Commission sewer manhole, Station #43 + 33.20, and the Central Avenue Bridge.
- (c) One hundred eight (108) feet above mean sea level between the Central Avenue Bridge and the Cochrane Dam located approximately two hundred (200) feet downstream of the South Street Bridge.

2.3.65

All that land along or sloping toward the Charles River that is at or below an elevation of one hundred (100) feet above mean sea level between the Cochrane Dam and the Chestnut Street Bridge.

2.3.76

All that land along or sloping toward the Charles River between the Chestnut Street Bridge and the Greendale Avenue Bridge that is at or below the following elevations:

- (a) Ninety-eight (98) feet above mean sea level between the Chestnut Street Bridge and the Dedham Avenue Bridge.
- (b) Ninety-six (96) feet above mean sea level between the Dedham Avenue Bridge and the Greendale Avenue Bridge.

2.3.87

All that land along or sloping toward the Charles River between the Greendale Avenue Bridge easterly and northerly along the Charles River in Needham to the Needham-Wellesley town line that is at or below the following elevations:

- (a) Ninety-five (95) feet above mean sea level between the Greendale Avenue Bridge and the intersection of the Needham-Dedham town lines approximately twenty-four hundred (2400) feet downstream of the Greendale Avenue Bridge.
- (b) Ninety-two (92) feet above mean sea level between the intersection of the Needham-Dedham town lines approximately twenty-four hundred (2400) feet downstream of the Greendale Avenue Bridge and the Kendrick Street Bridge.
- (c) Ninety-one (91) feet above mean sea level between the Kendrick Street Bridge and the Sudbury Aqueduct.
- (d) Seventy-five (75) feet above mean sea level between the Sudbury Aqueduct and the Needham-Wellesley town line. (Note: Add 105.64 feet to mean sea level elevations to determine elevations on Needham Sewer base datum.)

3.3 Uses in Flood Plain District

The purpose of the Flood Plain District is to protect the streams, rivers, and other watercourses in the Town and their adjoining lands; to protect the health and safety of persons and property against the hazards of flooding; to preserve and maintain the ground water table for water supply purposes; to protect the community against detrimental use and development of lands adjoining such water courses; to conserve the watershed areas of the Town for the health, safety, welfare of the public; and to preserve the balance of the components of the ecosystem of the watercourses and adjoining land.

The Flood Plain District shall be considered as overlying other use districts established by this By-Law. Within the Flood Plain District, the requirements of the underlying district continue to apply insofar as they comply with the provisions of this section. In the event there is a conflict or difference between the provisions of the overlying and underlying district the more restrictive shall apply. Compliance with these provisions shall not be construed as satisfying the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 131.

3.3.1 Prohibited Uses

The following uses are prohibited, regardless of other requirements:

- (a) Manufacture, use, transport, storage or disposal of toxic or hazardous materials.
- (b) Sanitary landfill; junkyard; salvage yard; and other solid waste disposal.
- (c) Encroachments including fill, replacement of soil with impervious material, new construction, substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure), or other development unless certification by a registered professional engineer is provided demonstrating that encroachments shall not result in any increase in flood levels in the Town during the occurrence of a 100-year flood.
- (d) Swimming pools.

3.3.2 Permitted Uses

- (a) Uses directly related to the conservation of water, plants, and wildlife.
- (b) Outdoor recreation activities and facilities, including unpaved play areas, nature study, boating, fishing and hunting where otherwise legally permitted which do not require removal or transfer of earth.
- (c) Wildlife management areas, landings, foot, bicycle and/or horse paths and bridges, provided such uses do not affect the natural flow pattern of any watercourse.
- (d) Grazing and farming, including truck gardening and harvesting of crops.

- (e) Forestry and nurseries.
- (f) Removal from a watercourse of silt and other accumulated debris which tends to interfere with the natural flow patterns of the watercourse.
- (g) Dwellings for sustained human habitation lawfully existing which shall not hereafter be enlarged or extended to increase ground coverage.

3.3.3 Uses Requiring a Special Permit

The Board of Appeals may grant a Special Permit for the following:

- (a) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvements) of residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps Town of Needham Zoning Map (the 100-year flood plain elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it can be demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood.
- (b) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvement) of non-residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps Town of Needham Zoning Map (the 100-year flood elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map or are flood proofed and watertight to the applicable flood elevation. In the case where watertight flood proofing is permitted, a registered professional engineer or architect shall certify to the Building Inspector that the methods used are adequate to withstand flood depth pressures and velocities impact and the uplift of forces and other factors associated with the 100-year flood. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it is demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood.
- (c) Small non-residential structures of less than 100 square feet of floor area used in connection with recreation or the growing, harvesting, storage, or sale of crops raised on the premises.
- (d) Any driveway and walkway ancillary to uses otherwise permitted by this section.
- (e) Tennis courts or other uses requiring a similarly prepared surface.
- (f) Water and sewer pumping stations.

- (g) Any use not expressly permitted or prohibited.
- (h) Any use permitted in the underlying district in which the land is situated, subject to the same use and development restrictions as may otherwise apply thereto, provided that the land designated as being within the Flood Plain District is found by the Board of Appeals not, in fact, to be subject to flooding. The Board of Appeals shall refer each question on this matter to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Health, and Department of Public Works, and shall not act until these agencies have reported their recommendations or 45 days have elapsed after such referral and no report has been received.

3.3.4 Special Permit Criteria

In granting a special permit, the Board of Appeals shall consider, among other factors, the following:

- (a) Geographic location of proposed building and security of driveway or walkway access during flooding.
- (b) Foundation elevations of proposed building and security of foundation during flooding, including assurance that foundations would not be undermined and that the proposed building would not be floated off, swept away, or battered during flooding.
- (c) Disposal of sewage from the proposed building and containment of sewage during flooding.
- (d) Safety of water, sewage, gas, electric and fuel utilities from breaking, igniting, electrocution or other dangers during flooding.
- (e) Soil structure and the general character of development in the neighborhood.
- (f) The preservation of the natural water channel passage of flood flows.
- (g) The retention of existing flood water storage capacity.

3.3.5 General Provisions Relating to Flood Plain District

(a) All development in the Flood Plain District, including structural and non-structural activities, whether permitted by right or by special permit shall be in compliance with Chapter 131, Section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws and with the following: (i) Section of the Massachusetts State Building Code which addresses floodplain and coastal high hazard areas (currently 780 CMR): 3107.0, "Flood Resistant Construction"); (ii) Wetlands Protection Regulations, Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) (currently 310 CMR 10.00); (iii) Inland Wetlands Restriction, DEP (currently 31002 CMR 136.00); and (iv) Minimum Requirements for the Subsurface Disposal of Sanitary Sewage, DEP (currently 310 CMR 15, Title 5). Any variances

from the provisions and requirements of the above referenced state regulations may only be granted in accordance with the required variance procedures of these state regulations.

- (b) All subdivision proposals in the Flood Plain District shall be reviewed to assure that: (i) such proposals minimize flood damage; (ii) all public utilities and facilities are located and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage; and (iii) adequate drainage is provided to reduce exposure to flood hazards.
- (c) Base flood elevation data shall be provided for subdivision proposals or other developments of greater than 50 lots or 5 acres, within unnumbered A zones, as shown on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) dated July 17, 2012.p (FIRM) dated June 5, 1989.

(d) Within areas designated Zone A, AH1-30, and AE, along watercourses that have not had a regulatory floodway designated, as shown on the Norfolk County Flood e Federal Rate Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). Floodway Map, and Flood Insurance Study dated June 5, 1989, and Flood Insurance Study. dated July 17, 2012, the best available Federal, State, local, or other floodway data shall be used to prohibit encroachments in floodways which would result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the occurrence of the base flood discharge.

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3.3.6 National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Requirements

Reference is hereby made to the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) and Flood Insurance Study dated July 17, 2012 dated June 5, 1989 — both of which are on file in the office of the Town Clerk, Planning Board, Building Official, Conservation Commission and Engineering Department. In granting special permits authorized above under Subsections 3.3.3 and 3.3.4, the Board of Appeals shall, as appropriate, require the following as conditions of approval:

- (a) Require that new and replacement water supply and sanitary sewerage systems be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into said systems, as well as discharges from said systems into flood waters;
- (b) Require that new adequate drainage is provided to reduce exposure to flood hazards in flood-prone areas, and more specifically, require adequate drainage around proposed structures on slopes to guide flood waters around and away from such structures; and
- (c) Require that adjacent communities, and the site coordination office and the NFIP State Coordinatore at the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation be notified prior to any alteration or relocation of a water course, and that a copy of such notification be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Administrator.

Dear Mr. Handel:

This is to formally notify you of the final flood elevation determination for the Town of Needham, Norfolk County, Massachusetts (All Jurisdictions), in compliance with Title 44, Chapter I, Part 67, Section 67.11, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). This section requires that notice of final flood elevations shall be sent to the Chief Executive Officer of the community, all individual appellants, and the State Coordinating Agency, and shall be published in the Federal Register.

On June 5, 1989, the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) that identified the Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs), the areas subject to inundation by the base (1-percent-annual-chance) flood, in your community. Recently, FEMA completed a re-evaluation of flood hazards in your community. On June 12, 2009, FEMA provided you with Preliminary copies of the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report and FIRM that identify existing flood hazards in your community, including Base Flood Elevations (BFEs). The proposed BFEs for your community were published in the *Needham Times* on or about August 5, 2010, and August 12, 2010; and in the *Federal Register*, at Part 67, Volume 75, Page 43481 and 43482, on July 26, 2010.

The statutory 90-day appeal period, which was initiated on the second newspaper publication date cited above, has ended. FEMA did not receive any appeals of the proposed BFEs during that time. Accordingly, the BFEs for your community are considered final. The final rule for BFEs will be published in the *Federal Register* as soon as possible. The FIRM for your community will become effective on July 17, 2012. Before the effective date, FEMA will send you final printed copies of the FIS report and FIRM.

Because the FIS report establishing the BFEs for your community has been completed, certain additional requirements must be met under Section 1361 of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as amended, within 6 months from the date of this letter. Prior to July 17, 2012, your community is required, as a condition of continued eligibility in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), to adopt or show evidence of adoption of floodplain management regulations that meet the standards of Paragraph 60.3(c) of the NFIP regulations (44 CFR 59, etc.) by the effective date of the FIRM. These standards are the minimum requirements and do not supersede any State or local requirements of a more stringent nature.

It must be emphasized that all the standards specified in Paragraph 60.3(c) of the NFIP regulations must be enacted in a legally enforceable document. This includes adoption of the current effective FIS report and FIRM to which the regulations apply and other modifications made by this map revision. Some of the standards should already have been enacted by your community in order to establish initial eligibility in the NFIP. Your community can meet any additional requirements by taking one of the following actions:

- 1. Amending existing regulations to incorporate any additional requirements of Paragraph 60.3(c);
- 2. Adopting all the standards of Paragraph 60.3(c) into one new, comprehensive set of regulations; or
- 3. Showing evidence that regulations have previously been adopted that meet or exceed the minimum requirements of Paragraph 60.3(c).

Communities that fail to enact the necessary floodplain management regulations will be suspended from participation in the NFIP and subject to the prohibitions contained in Section 202(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Public Law 93-234) as amended.

In addition to your community using the FIS report and FIRM to manage development in the floodplain, FEMA will use the FIS report and FIRM to establish appropriate flood insurance rates. On the effective date of the revised FIRM, actuarial rates for flood insurance will be charged for all new structures and substantial improvements to existing structures located in the identified SFHAs. These rates may be higher if structures are not built in compliance with the floodplain management standards of the NFIP. The actuarial flood insurance rates increase as the lowest elevations (including basement) of new structures decrease in relation to the BFEs established for your community. This is an important consideration for new construction because building at a higher elevation can greatly reduce the cost of flood insurance.

To assist your community in maintaining the FIRM, we have enclosed a Summary of Map Actions to document previous Letter of Map Change (LOMC) actions (i.e., Letters of Map Amendment (LOMAs), Letters of Map Revision (LOMRs)) that will be superseded when the revised FIRM panels referenced above become effective. Information on LOMCs is presented in the following four categories: (1) LOMCs for which results have been included on the revised FIRM panels; (2) LOMCs for which results could not be shown on the revised FIRM panels because of scale limitations or because the LOMC issued had determined that the lots or structures involved were outside the SFHA as shown on the FIRM; (3) LOMCs for which results have not been included on the revised FIRM panels because the flood hazard information on which the original determinations were based are being superseded by new flood hazard information; and (4) LOMCs issued for multiple lots or structures where the determination for one or more of the lots or structures cannot be revalidated through an administrative process like the LOMCs in Category 2 above. LOMCs in Category 2 will be revalidated through a single letter that reaffirms the validity of a previously issued LOMC; the letter will be sent to your community shortly before the effective date of the revised FIRM and will become effective 1 day after the revised FIRM becomes effective. For the LOMCs listed in Category 4, we will review the data previously submitted for the LOMA or LOMR request and issue a new determination for the affected properties after the revised FIRM becomes effective.

The FIRM and FIS report for your community have been prepared in our countywide format, which means that flood hazard information for all jurisdictions has been combined into one FIRM and FIS report. When the FIRM and FIS report are printed and distributed, your community will receive only those panels that present flood hazard information for your community. We will provide complete sets of the FIRM panels to county officials, where they will be available for review by your community.

The FIRM panels have been computer-generated. Once the FIRM and FIS report are printed and distributed, the digital files containing the flood hazard data for the entire county can be provided to your community for use in a computer mapping system. These files can be used in conjunction with other thematic data for floodplain management purposes, insurance purchase and rating requirements, and many other planning applications. Copies of the digital files or paper copies of the FIRM panels may be obtained by calling our FEMA Map Information eXchange (FMIX), toll free, at 1-877-FEMA MAP (1-877-336-2627). In addition, your community may be eligible for additional credits under our Community Rating System if you implement your activities using digital mapping files.

If your community is encountering difficulties in enacting the necessary floodplain management measures required to continue participation in the NFIP, we urge you to call the Acting Director, Federal Insurance and Mitigation Division of FEMA, Region I, in Boston, Massachusetts, at (617) 956-7571 for assistance. 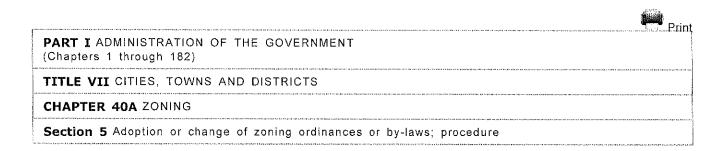

Section 5. Zoning ordinances or by-laws may be adopted and from time to time changed by amendment, addition or repeal, but only in the manner hereinafter provided. Adoption or change of zoning ordinances or by-laws may be initiated by the submission to the city council or board of selectmen of a proposed zoning ordinance or by-law by a city council, a board of selectmen, a board of appeals, by an individual owning land to be affected by change or adoption, by request of registered voters of a town pursuant to section ten of chapter thirty-nine, by ten registered voters in a city, by a planning board, by a regional planning agency or by other methods provided by municipal charter. The board of selectmen or city council shall within fourteen days of receipt of such zoning ordinance or by-law submit it to the planning board for review.

No zoning ordinance or by-law or amendment thereto shall be adopted until after the planning board in a city or town, and the city council or a committee designated or appointed for the purpose by said council has each held a public hearing thereon, together or separately, at which interested persons shall be given an opportunity to be heard. Said public hearing shall be held within sixty-five days after the proposed zoning ordinance or by-law is submitted to the planning board by the city council or selectmen or if there is none, within sixty-five days after the proposed zoning ordinance or by-law is submitted to the city council or selectmen. Notice of the time and place of such public hearing, of the subject matter, sufficient for identification, and of the place where texts and maps thereof may be inspected shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city or town once in each of two successive weeks, the first publication to be not less than fourteen days before the day of said hearing, and by posting such notice in a conspicuous place in the city or town hall for a period of not less than fourteen days before the day of said hearing. Notice of said hearing shall also be sent by mail, postage prepaid to the department of housing and community development, the regional planning agency, if any, and to the planning board of each abutting city and town. The department of housing and community development, the regional planning agency, the planning boards of all abutting cities and towns and nonresident property owners who may not have received notice by mail as specified in this section may grant a waiver of notice or submit an affidavit of actual notice to the city or town clerk prior to town meeting or city council action on a proposed zoning ordinance, by-law or change thereto. Zoning ordinances or by-laws may provide that a separate, conspicuous statement shall be included

with property tax bills sent to nonresident property owners, stating that notice of such hearings under this chapter shall be sent by mail, postage prepaid, to any such owner who files an annual request for such notice with the city or town clerk no later than January first, and pays a reasonable fee established by such ordinance or by-law. In cases involving boundary, density or use changes within a district, notice shall be sent to any such nonresident property owner who has filed such a request with the city or town clerk and whose property lies in the district where the change is sought. No defect in the form of any notice under this chapter shall invalidate any zoning ordinances or by-laws unless such defect is found to be misleading.

Prior to the adoption of any zoning ordinance or by-law or amendment thereto which seeks to further regulate matters established by section forty of chapter one hundred and thirty-one or regulations authorized thereunder relative to agricultural and aquacultural practices, the city or town clerk shall, no later than seven days prior to the city council's or town meeting's public hearing relative to the adoption of said new or amended zoning ordinances or by-laws. give notice of the said proposed zoning ordinances or by-laws to the farmland advisory board established pursuant to section forty of chapter one hundred and thirty-one.

No vote to adopt any such proposed ordinance or by-law or amendment thereto shall be taken until a report with recommendations by a planning board has been submitted to the town meeting or city council, or twenty-one days after said hearing has elapsed without submission of such report. After such notice, hearing and report, or after twenty-one days shall have elapsed after such hearing without submission of such report, a city council or town meeting may adopt, reject, or amend and adopt any such proposed ordinance or bylaw. If a city council fails to vote to adopt any proposed ordinance within ninety days after the city council hearing or if a town meeting fails to vote to adopt any proposed by-law within six months after the planning board hearing, no action shall be taken thereon until after a subsequent public hearing is held with notice and report as provided.

No zoning ordinance or by-law or amendment thereto shall be adopted or changed except by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the town council, or of the city council where there is a commission form of government or a single branch, or of each branch where there are two branches, or by a two-thirds vote of a town meeting; provided, however, that if in a city or town with a council of fewer than twenty-five members there is filed with the clerk prior to final action by the council a written protest against such change, stating the reasons duly signed by owners of twenty per cent or more of the area of the land proposed to be included in such change or of the area of the land immediately adjacent extending three hundred feet therefrom, no such change of any such ordinance shall be adopted except by a three-fourths vote of all members.

No proposed zoning ordinance or by-law which has been unfavorably acted upon by a city

council or town meeting shall be considered by the city council or town meeting within two years after the date of such unfavorable action unless the adoption of such proposed ordinance or by-law is recommended in the final report of the planning board.

When zoning by-laws or amendments thereto are submitted to the attorney general for approval as required by section thirty-two of chapter forty, he shall also be furnished with a statement which may be prepared by the planning board explaining the by-laws or amendments proposed, which statement may be accompanied by explanatory maps or plans.

The effective date of the adoption or amendment of any zoning ordinance or by-law shall be the date on which such adoption or amendment was voted upon by a city council or town meeting; if in towns, publication in a town bulletin or pamphlet and posting is subsequently made or publication in a newspaper pursuant to section thirty-two of chapter forty. If, in a town, said by-law is subsequently disapproved, in whole or in part, by the attorney general, the previous zoning by-law, to the extent that such previous zoning by-law was changed by the disapproved by-law or portion thereof, shall be deemed to have been in effect from the date of such vote. In a municipality which is not required to submit zoning ordinances to the attorney general for approval pursuant to section thirty-two of chapter forty, the effective date of such ordinance or amendment shall be the date passed by the city council and signed by the mayor or, as otherwise provided by ordinance or charter; provided, however, that such ordinance or amendment shall subsequently be forwarded by the city clerk to the office of the attorney general.

A true copy of the zoning ordinance or by-law with any amendments thereto shall be kept on file available for inspection in the office of the clerk of such city or town.

No claim of invalidity of any zoning ordinance or by-law arising out of any possible defect in the procedure of adoption or amendment shall be made in any legal proceedings and no state, regional, county or municipal officer shall refuse, deny or revoke any permit, approval or certificate because of any such claim of invalidity unless legal action is commenced within the time period specified in sections thirty-two and thirty-two A of chapter forty and notice specifying the court, parties, invalidity claimed, and date of filing is filed together with a copy of the petition with the town or city clerk within seven days after commencement of the action.

- (a) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, by revising the first paragraph thereof so that the entire paragraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "The Floodplain District is herein established as an overlay district. The areas included in the Flood Plain Districts are defined as follows:"
- (b) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, Subsection 2.3.1, by adding a new paragraph 2.3.1 to read as follows:

- "2.3.1 All special flood hazard areas within the Town of Needham designated as Zone A, AE, or AH on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for the administration of the National Flood Insurance Program. The map panels of the Norfolk County FIRM that are wholly or partially within the Town of Needham are panel numbers 25021C0016E, 25021C0017E, 25021C0018E, 25021C0019E, 25021C0028E, 25021C0036E, 25021C0037E, 25021C0038E, and 25021C0039E dated July 17, 2012. The exact boundaries of the District may be defined by the 100-year base flood elevations shown on the FIRM and further defined by the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report dated July 17, 2012. The FIRM and FIS report are incorporated herein by reference and are on file with the Town Clerk, Planning Board, Building Official, Conservation Commission and Engineering Department."
- (c) In Section 2.3, <u>Description of Flood Plain Districts</u>, by renumber former paragraphs 2.3.1, 2.3.2, 2.3.3, 2.3.4, 2.3.5, 2.3.6, and 2.3.7 as paragraphs 2.3.2, 2.3.3, 2.3.4, 2.3.5, 2.3.6, 2.3.7 and 2.3.8 respectively.
- (d) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.3, <u>Uses Requiring a Special Permit</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (a) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(a) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvements) of residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps (the 100-year flood plain elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it can be demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood.
- (e) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.3, <u>Uses Requiring a Special Permit</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (b) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
- "(b) All new construction and substantial improvements (the cost of which exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the improvement) of non-residential structures which have the lowest floor, including basement or cellar, elevated to or above the flood plain elevation defined on the Norfolk County Flood Insurance Rate Maps (the 100-year flood elevation) and the Town of Needham Zoning Map or are flood proofed and watertight to the applicable flood elevation. In the case where watertight flood proofing is permitted, a registered professional engineer or architect shall certify to the Building Inspector that the methods used are adequate to withstand flood depth pressures and velocities impact and the uplift of forces and other factors associated with the 100-year flood. No new construction or substantial improvement shall be permitted unless it is demonstrated by the applicant that the cumulative effect of the proposed development will not increase the water surface elevation of the 100-year flood."
- (f) In Section 3.3, <u>Uses in Flood Plain District</u>, Subsection 3.3.5, <u>General Provisions Relating to Flood Plain District</u>, by adding language to the first sentence of subparagraph (a) so that the entire subparagraph shall read as follows (new language underlined):
 - "(a) All development in the Flood Plain District, including structural and non-structural activities, whether permitted by right or by special permit shall be in compliance with Chapter 131, Section 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws and with the following: (i) Section of the Massachusetts State Building Code which addresses floodplain and coastal high hazard areas (currently 780 CMR); (ii)

Any variances from the provisions and requirements of the above referenced state regulations may only be granted in accordance with the required variance procedures of these state regulations."

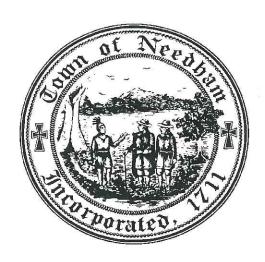

This is done because Town elections are held in April and Town Meeting would not have a chance to vote on the salary of a newly elected Clerk until after the incumbent had been receiving a higher rate of pay for several months. It has been the practice of the Personnel Board to provide the Town

Clerk, the only full-time elected official, with benefits as close to that of other full-time employees as possible. Payment for longevity, as well as buy-back of sick leave and vacation no later than the time of separation from Town service, is now included in the recommended salary and compensation article. This article also includes provision for a one-time distribution of accumulated and unused vacation leave as of June 30, 2000, such payment to be made no later than the time of separation from Town service.

The annual stipends for the members of the Board of Selectmen have remained unchanged since 1977.

The taxable valuation of the taxpayer's property shall not be less than ten percent of its fair cash value.

ARTICLE 15: AUTHORIZATION TO EXPEND STATE FUNDS FOR PUBLIC WAYS

ARTICLE 21: HOME RULE PETITION - OFF-PREMISES SALE OF ALCOHOL

AN ACT RELATIVE TO AUTHORIZING THE TOWN OF NEEDHAM TO AUTHORISE THE SALE OF ALL ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES NOT TO BE DRUNK ON THE PREMISES UNDER ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT XLIX.

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding section 11 of chapter 138 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, the board of selectmen of the town of Needham shall cause to be placed on the ballot at a regular or special election the following question:-

"Shall the licensing authority in the town of Needham be authorized to grant licenses for both the sale of all alcoholic beverages in packages not to be drunk on the premises and the sale of wine and malt beverages in packages not to be drunk on the premises?"

Below the ballot question shall appear a fair and concise summary of the ballot question prepared by the town counsel and approved by the board of selectmen.

SECTION 2. If a majority of the votes cast in answer to that question is in the affirmative, the Town of Needham shall be taken to have authorized the granting of licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises and the sale of wine and malt beverages not to be drunk on the premises subject to the following:

The number of licenses shall be limited to six. Commencing on January 1, 2018 the number of licenses shall be limited to eight but at no time shall there be in effect more than six such licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages. The remaining licenses shall be limited to the sale of wines and malt beverages.

The licensing authority may establish the days and hours during which the license may operate.

Except as otherwise provided herein, such licenses shall be subject to the provisions of said chapter 138.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 22: PESTICIDE FREE ZONE ON LAND OWNED OR MANAGED BY THE TOWN OF NEEDHAM

To see if the Town of Needham will vote to transition away from the use of herbicides and pesticides* on land owned, managed or leased by the Town of Needham. Within two years The Town of Needham will take the next step in reducing pesticide use on town owned property by instituting a no-use policy concerning chemical synthetic herbicides and pesticides as defined by the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. Included in the no-use policy are fertilizers known as weed 'n feed products which contain herbicides and pesticides.

Needham owned, managed and leased land includes but is not limited to school grounds and playing fields, town commons and parks as well as conservation land and The Needham Community Farm. It also includes the grounds of The Needham Town Hall, The Needham Public Library, The Needham Senior Center and the town building facilities and the berms along town sidewalks.

There will be an exemption for emergency outbreaks of stinging or biting insects.

A Standing Committee will be created to study and implement a Best Practices Policy and Manual of land care and landscaping policy for the Town of Needham. The Committee is to be made up of five Needham residents plus one elected or appointed official from the Conservation Commission, School Committee, and Board of Health, Park and Recreation. The Committee will meet at least four times a year.

The Standing Committee will create A Best Practices Manual for Land Care which would include the following practices: soil testing, the use of organically certified soil amendments, compost and compost tea. Approved bio-pesticides may be considered for use.** Cultural practices will be included: using the appropriate height for lawn mowing, planting of clover, what to do with grass clippings, the use of carbon neutral machinery in landscaping and the use of water savings measures. Landscape design will consider lawn size and placement, fertilizer use and the use of water recycling and rain gardens.

The Committee will create educational forums and materials to implement the Best Practices for Land Care Manual and no-use pesticide policy and educate Needham residents and employees of the Town of Needham on these topics.

*Pesticide, as defined in FIFRA section 2(u) (PDF) (109 pp, 288k), means: any substance or mixture of substances intended for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest; any substance or mixture of substances intended for use as a plant regulator, defoliant, or desiccant; and any nitrogen stabilizer. It includes pesticides, herbicides, insecticides, rodenticides, and fungicides.

**FIFRA exemption of minimal risk pesticides http://www.epa.gov/PR_Notices/pr2000-6.pdf Products which contain certain low-risk ingredients, such as garlic and mint oil, have been exempted from Federal registration requirements, although State regulatory requirements may still apply.

Article Information: The Town Meeting and the voters approved the Community Preservation Act in 2004. The Fund receives monies through a 2.0% surcharge on local real estate property tax bills with certain exemptions. Adoption of the Act makes the Town eligible to receive additional monies on an annual basis from the Massachusetts Community Preservation Fund. Any expenditure from the Community Preservation Fund must be both recommended by the CPC and approved by Town Meeting. The law requires that at least 10% of the revenue be appropriated or reserved for future appropriation for each of the following purposes: community housing, historic preservation and open space. The Town traditionally sets aside 11% to account for any changes to the revenue estimate or State match that may occur during the year. Up to 5% of the annual revenue estimate may be utilized for the administrative and operational expenses of the Community Preservation Committee. At the end of the fiscal year, unspent administrative funds return to the CPA Annual Reserve. In addition to the projects proposed to be funded through reserves under Articles 24 through 27, the CPC recommends approval for 11% to be appropriated to the Community Housing Reserve and the Open Space Reserve. Allocation to the Historic Reserve is satisfied by the payment of the debt for the Town Hall project which is included in the motion to appropriate the Operating Budget under Article 10. The CPC also recommends an appropriation of 5% for administrative and operating expenses.

Athletic Facility Improvements The Department of Public Works and Park and Recreation Departments have developed a maintenance plan for all fields, which includes new or total reconstruction, partial renovation, irrigation, drainage improvements, and equipment replacement or repair (bleachers, fences/backstops, player benches and miscellaneous equipment) for multi-use fields and ball diamonds. Projects planned for fiscal year 2013 include new fabric and repairs on both backstops and fencing at Claxton Field, installation of an irrigation system for Greene's Field, installation of bleachers and a bleacher pad for Claxton Diamond #2, installation of an irrigation system for Claxton Field, and installation of an irrigation system for the Pollard School multi-purpose field.

Defazio Field Re-Sodding This capital request is for field improvements at the DeFazio Complex. The Healy and Warner fields were seeded twice during the Field of Dreams project. After two seeding applications, the grass still did not fill in. As a result, the fields have taken almost entirely to weeds (large

and smooth crabgrass and white clover). The best option to ensure safety and playability is to sod the fields with Kentucky Bluegrass, similar to what was done on the other two fields at DeFazio – Conroy and McLeod.

Rosemary Trail Improvement Design The trail system that begins in the parking lot at Rosemary Pool and extends through the camp property and over to Nehoiden Street is used on a daily basis by residents. The beginning section is in the most urgent need for restoration; however, there are other areas of concern, particularly along the steep stretch adjacent to the lake. A portion of this project will be completed by volunteers, and only the larger portions requiring construction will need to be performed by a contractor. At this time, the project is not eligible for CPA funding, but if proposed changes to the wording of the legislation are approved, this project may become eligible. This appropriation would fund the design and permitting phase of the project. It is anticipated that the construction portion will be in the \$100,000 range.

Desktop Virtualization This request is for virtualizing approximately 100 employee workstations by adding additional licenses and hardware. Licensing would also be purchased to enable certain users to access their workstations remotely. All of the applications used by employees (e.g. Microsoft Office, Adobe Acrobat, or Internet Explorer) are stored on servers controlled by the Information Technology Center (ITC). Any specific application is then served to the employee's desktop through the network. Because the applications are bundled in one location, the ITC Network Manager can more efficiently and productively roll-out upgrades, allowing for consistent versions of software. Virtualization will help make existing staff more productive and help to support the growing demands of the current workforce. Workstation Support is more streamlined because issues with applications served out to the workstations are managed in the ITC, and only serious hardware issues will need to be addressed at the employee workstation. The hardware that is used by employees at their desks can be replaced at a lower cost than current workstation hardware.

Network Servers And Switches The request is to replace older servers, application and data, with newer, faster, and more energy-efficient models. This can also include the replacement of the spam filter, virus firewall, and Internet filtering. The request includes funding for the replacement of older network switches to connect buildings, departments, and workstations throughout the Town. Newer models of both servers and switches will be better able to take advantage of the Town fiber and increase the speed of data within the Town's fiber network. Not replacing or updating this equipment can have a negative impact on email, financial applications, internet access, and data accessibility.

Public Facilities Core Fleet The Core fleet consists of passenger vehicles such as sedans and wagons, vans, pick-up trucks, small dump trucks, and utility trucks. Unless circumstances require otherwise, the vehicle scheduled to be replaced in FY2013 is a 2001 Ford F-450 Rack Body Truck that is primarily used for grounds keeping services, trash runs, moving School and Town property, and setting up the stage for the High School graduation.

Public Facilities Energy Efficiency Upgrade Improvements The results of a recent energy efficiency upgrade study indicate that if the Town makes an initial investment for energy upgrades in the ten buildings identified in the study, the cost of these upgrades will be recovered through energy savings within five years. Projects proposed for FY2013 include replacing the exterior lighting at Hillside School. The lighting consists of high intensity discharge lamps and will be replaced with induction lighting. Similar work will be performed at the Mitchell School, along with improved insulation levels in the attic.

Public Facilities Maintenance Program This project funds annual maintenance of public buildings throughout the Town and School Department including but not limited to: asbestos abatement, small equipment replacement, duct cleaning, painting, and other repairs and necessary upgrades. Funding in fiscal year 2013 is intended for duct cleaning at the A & B Buildings of the High School, asbestos abatement at the Mitchell School, flooring replacement at the Broadmeadow School and the Library, and xeriscaping at the High School. Additional work planned for the Hillside School will include remediation of flooding issues, upgrades to the boiler room, repair to the floor and stairs, and upgrading of AC units. At the Mitchell School, repairs to gutters and downspouts, fuel oil containment work (or conversion to natural gas), handrail upgrades, and egress analysis will be performed.

Structural Fire Fighting Gear Structural firefighting protective gear has a recommended life expectancy of 10 years depending on exposure and wear. The Fire Department is requesting replacement of this gear for twenty (20) staff members who will be using gear that is over 11 years old at the time of replacement.

Deputy Chief Vehicle/C-3 This request is to replace a 2004 Ford sedan that is used daily by the Deputy Chief of Operations. Currently the car has over 56,000 miles of service, and at the time of replacement is estimated to have over 70,000 miles of service. At the time of replacement, the vehicle will be nine years old, up to two years beyond its scheduled replacement. A new vehicle will be purchased and put into service as C-1. School Furniture, Musical Instruments, And Graphic Arts Equipment The School Furniture Replacement Program began in fiscal year 2005 and is geared toward replacing furniture in school facilities which are not scheduled to undergo capital renovation/ addition projects in the near future (Hillside, Mitchell, Newman and Pollard). In these schools, furniture is 10-20+ years old and in a state of disrepair after decades of heavy use. By FY2015, all furniture in 'poor' condition will have been replaced at all four schools. The FY2013-FY2017 funding request begins the replacement of furniture in fair condition at these schools.

Fiscal year 2013 represents the eighth year of the musical equipment replacement cycle. The scheduled replacements in FY2013 are additional middle school percussion instruments, additional string instruments, and assorted elementary school Orff percussion instruments. The purpose of the program is to replace musical instruments, especially large string instruments and pianos, which are over 25 years old. After decades of heavy use, many of the School Department's string instruments are no longer usable or repairable. The older pianos, while still usable, are becoming increasingly costly to repair and maintain. Although students do purchase some of the less expensive instruments (clarinets, trumpets, etc.), a quality band and/or orchestra program needs to ensure balanced instrumentation to deliver the proper musical experience required by the curriculum.

Fiscal year 2013 is the first year of a request to establish an equipment replacement cycle for the Graphics Production Center at Needham High School. Although the Center received new equipment during the recent renovation at the High School, the School Department has determined that an ongoing source of funding is needed to sustain and update program equipment. During the summer of 2011, a complete inventory analysis of all equipment was completed. The equipment proposed for replacement in fiscal year 2013 includes a screen print dryer and wide format printer.

Interactive Whiteboard Technology And Technology Replacement This interactive whiteboard project would fund the purchase and installation of interactive technology (SMART and Mimio boards) at Needham

schools. The funding requested for interactive whiteboards includes the completion of the SMART Board purchase and installation at the Newman School to coincide with the return to the renovated building. Included in this purchase for Newman are 11 additional SMART Boards as well as the permanent installation of 23 existing boards and the purchase and installation of wall-mounted short throw projectors. In addition to the completion of Newman, interactive whiteboards will be added at Broadmeadow (1), Hillside (1), and Pollard (2) to advance the District's inventory towards its goal of full interactive whiteboard implementation for grades one through twelve.

The School technology replacement program includes the replacement of 300 teacher, administrator, student, lab and laptop computers that have reached or are functioning beyond the end of their seven-year lifecycle: 169 of these computers are for teachers and administrators throughout the district; 68 are for classroom computers at Broadmeadow, Eliot, Mitchell, and Newman; and at Pollard there is a cart with 30 laptops that is being replaced. Although the majority of the computers being purchased are for the elementary schools and Pollard, FY2013 represents the first year of replacement of computers and LCD projectors that have reached the end of their lifecycle at the High School. The replacement of the High School technology will be phased in over five years. Funding in FY2013 would support 75 teacher and administrator computers, included in the previous count of 169 teacher and administrator computers, as well as 33 student laptop computers in the library. Also included in the replacement cycle are 10 LCD projectors.

Beyond the 300 teacher, administrator, student, lab and laptop computers mentioned above, this request also includes the replacement of two district data servers that are housed at the ETC. These servers have been running 24/7 for three and four years and will be repurposed to less critical functions for two and three years respectively. Also in this category is the replacement of eight UPS batteries that support critical servers throughout the district. Replacement of 19 printers across the district is also included within the technology replacement cycle. The request also includes funding for the impact of conversion to Lion, Apple's new operating system.

School Administration Building Study This funding will support a feasibility study of the renovation of Emery Grover and a lease/purchase alternative to the building renovation. The Emery Grover School Administration Building is in need of additional office and storage space as well as extensive repair and modernization. The Town Facilities Master Plan had estimated the renovation cost at \$11.4 million in 2008 dollars. The scope of the original renovation was to reorganize the layout of offices, make the building fully ADA accessible, remove remaining asbestos and lead paint, replace deteriorating systems, and allow for full utilization of all four floors. The feasibility study will include studying options in the marketplace as well as alternatives for the Emery Grover Building.

Street Resurfacing: This program is essential to improve the structural and surface integrity of the Town's network of accepted streets. The primary strategy of this program is asphalt paving and incidental work. Incidental work may include asphalt berm curb, new grass shoulders, corner reconstruction including handicapped ramps, minor drainage improvements, street sign replacement, traffic markings and signs. Applying this repair strategy in a timely manner will extend the useful life of the roadway for up to 15 years. The requested street resurfacing funding in FY2013 is \$296,000.

Traffic Signal & Intersection Improvements: This program funds traffic signal improvements and intersection improvements and new traffic signal installations where none currently exist. No funding is proposed in FY2013 in this category.

Combined Sidewalk Program: This Program addresses the failing network of sidewalks throughout the community. There are over 160 miles of accepted sidewalks in Needham. Over half of the Town's sidewalks do not comply with current standards and require significant improvements including the installation of handicapped ramps. The requested Combined Sidewalk Program funding in FY2013 is \$279,000.

Storm Drain Capacity Improvements: This program provides funding to improve roadway drainage capacity. The Stormwater Master Plan identified a number of areas throughout Needham where improvements are required to resolve flooding problems and illicit discharge. Locations for improvements have been prioritized within the plan. Since the issuance of this report, numerous multi-unit developments have been built or planned in the Town. These developments incorporate new roads with drainage structures and roof or sump connections which are then connected to existing Town systems. These new connections have increased the load on the Town's drainage system and causes flooding in some areas. No funding is requested in this category for FY2013.

Brooks and Culverts – Repair and Maintenance: This program addresses the issue of flooded and poorly draining brooks, streams, waterways and culverts throughout the Town that have been severely damaged by heavy rains/storms for many years. Prior funding has funded cleaning and debris removal. Recent flooding caused the failure of retaining walls. Brooks have become silted, allowing the overgrowth of vegetation that has impacted the level of the water flows and resulting in the loss of useable abutting property and flooded basements. Projects proposed for FY2013 include the continued wall repair along Rosemary Brook in the amount of \$25,000.

ARTICLE 34: APPROPRIATE FOR DPW COMPLEX RENOVATIONS

Sewer System Infiltration and Inflow Program This program supports the identification and removal of Infiltration and Inflow (I/I) in existing sewer systems. The requested funding for FY2013 is for the evaluation of infiltration, which is defined as groundwater or storm water runoff that enters the system through deteriorated pipe or manhole structures. On the basis of volume of flow and knowledge of local sewer system overflows (SSO) or basement flooding, an order of priority has been established to determine the scheduling of the engineering, design and remediation work. The highest priorities relate to locations of known surcharging with sewage overflow or release or basement flooding. The remediation proceeds in stages starting with the preliminary engineering, followed by the rehabilitation design and concluding with the rehabilitation construction.

Work in prior years has been undertaken in Areas 11, 14, 19-1, 22, 3, 4, 30, 31, 2, 24, 21L, 1, 16. The priority was based on areas that had recorded the highest levels of infiltration. The field work was conducted in 1984, and supplemented in 1986 and 1987. The study results are now approaching 25 years old. The earliest repair work that was undertaken is approaching 20 years old, and the remaining sections identified in the original study show significantly less I/I per length of sewer main. There is a strong probability that the original high leakage areas are contributing greater amounts of infiltration than the remaining sections left to repair as identified in the original study. Therefore, the study must be updated at this time to ensure effective expenditure of Town resources to address current infiltration and inflow. The components of the first phase of the study will include engineering (\$240,000), permanent and portable flow meter installation (\$210,000), and rented flow meters (\$100,000). The components of a future phase of the evaluation will include engineering and closed circuit TV services.

Sewer SCADA System The Department's goal is to provide a communication and alarm system to replace the current system that is outdated and unreliable. Currently there is no linked communication between or among pump stations. The goal is to collect data from the nine sewage pumping stations, then communicate that data to a central location (likely the West Street Pump Station), allowing for efficient management and control of the sewer pumping operations. This system will alert the appropriate emergency response for on-call personnel to remotely access the system, making changes to pump stations as necessary. The current alarm call system uses an outdated verbatim call box at the four major sewage pumping stations and a light and siren system at the five smaller stations. The verbatim system is programmed to call the Police Department dispatcher when an alarm condition has occurred, who then alerts the Sewer Division on-call person. The five smaller stations rely on neighbors to call the Police Department when an alarm occurs. This funding is for a feasibility study to determine the best mode of communication for the SCADA system.

Filter Media Replacement Filter media is used for manganese removal at the Charles River Water Treatment Facility. All four filters at the Treatment Facility were replaced with natural greensand in 2008. This program is intended to establish a five year replacement cycle for the replacement of the filter media, with a new synthetic product called Greensand Plus, a substitute for natural greensand. Greensand Plus is promoted as being able to withstand wider variations in operating conditions and therefore may reduce the frequency of media replacement, and reduce the need for the administration of potassium permanganate. The first year of funding for the five year cycle is fiscal year 2012

Water System Rehabilitation Program The annual Water System Rehabilitation Program draws from the recommendations of the Water System Master Plan. The master plan recommends that pipes 85 years or older be considered for replacement or relining. This list of older pipes is evaluated and prioritized, and then cross-referenced with work proposed for other utilities, road repairs, or reconstruction. Unless circumstances require otherwise, projects for FY2013 include engineering and design for the installation of a new eight inch pipe (2,500 linear feet) on Grant Street from Junction Street to Dedham Avenue.

Water Service Connections The primary purpose of this program is to remove old iron pipe water services that may contain lead from the water distribution system. Old water services are to be replaced prior to a road reconstruction/paving project. If the services are not replaced, an element of the subsurface infrastructure is susceptible to failure before the useful life of the reconstructed roadway has been realized. The FY 2013 funding will provide approximately one year's value of water service replacements, which will fall in line with the road resurfacing program schedule.

Water Fire Flow Improvements The Water System Master Plan has identified a category of improvements for high priority action. The St. Mary Pump Station has four pumps located within the facility that are designed to pump potable water from the MWRA to supplement the Town's demand for water. Only two pumps are operable at the station, resulting in operation at a capacity less than that which

is permitted (6.5 million gallons per day). The current pump station is equipped with an emergency auxiliary motor; however, it is preferable to have a standby generator similar to other pumping stations and the Charles River Water Treatment Facility. This request will provide the necessary improvements to meet future water demands, and ensure that the station has emergency back-up electrical power. The preliminary design of the station has been completed. The DPW is preparing to seek proposals for selection of a designer for the final design and the Owner's Project Manager (OPM) services. The costs of OPM services were not originally included in the budget for the project budget. \$350,000 is being requested to cover the entire design and construction services for the OPM. A request for funding for the St. Mary Pump Station Improvement Project construction will be proposed for fiscal year 2014 at an expected amount of \$5,070,000.

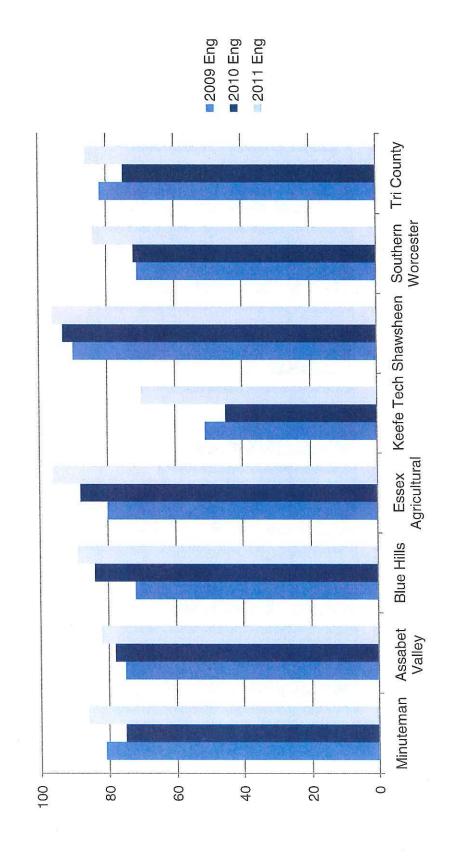

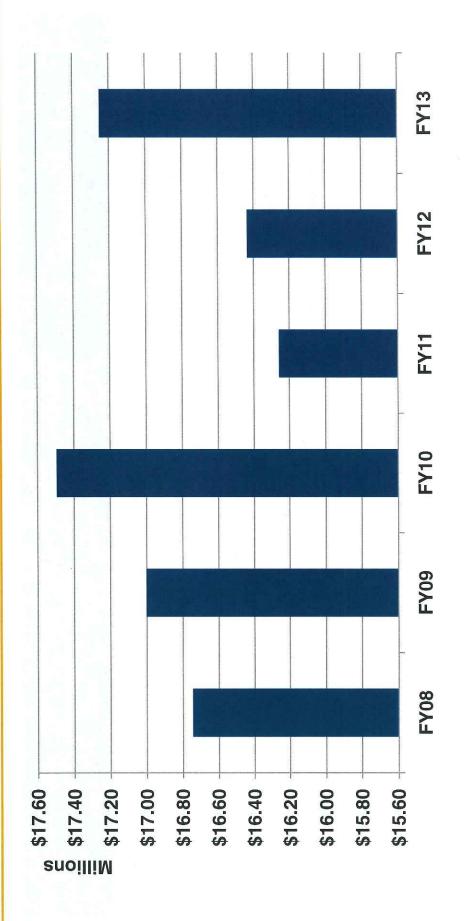

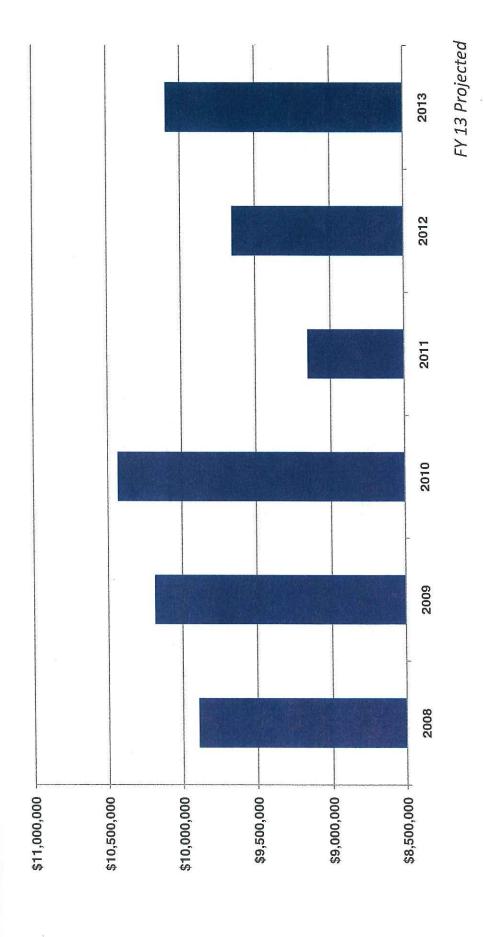

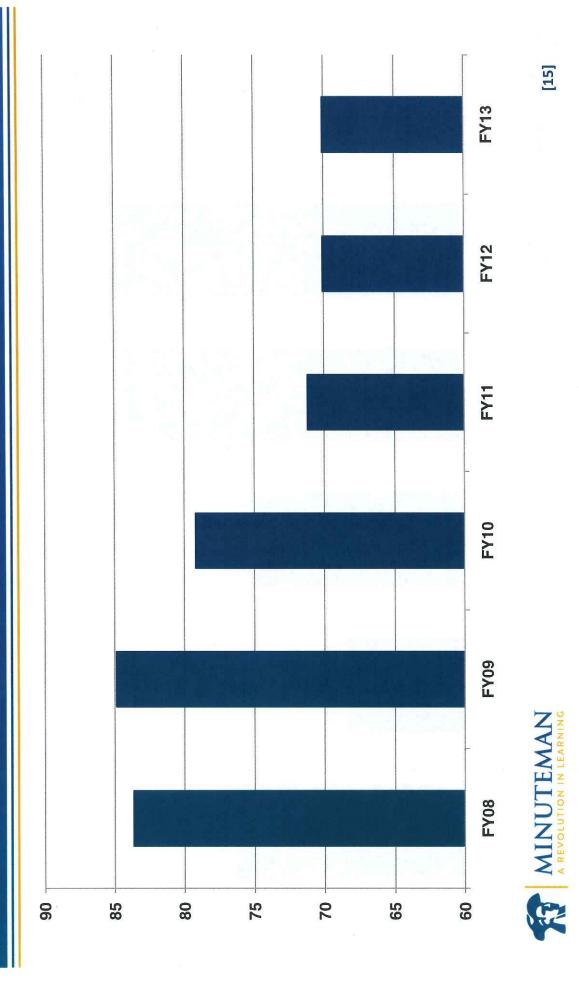


Assessments to Member Towns

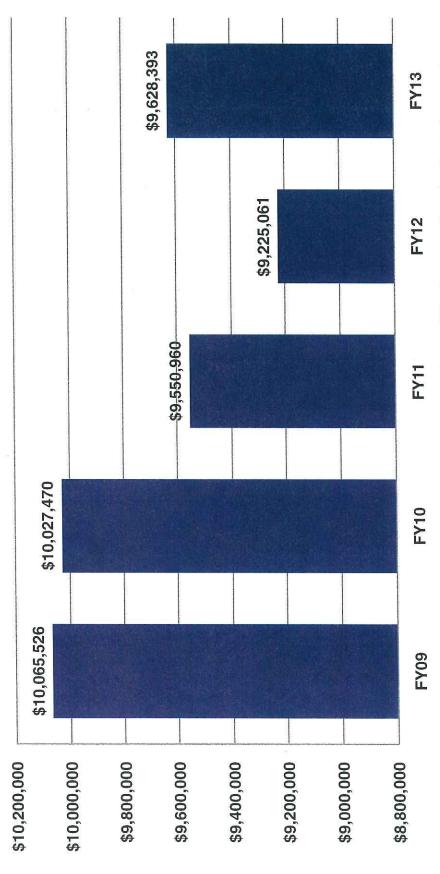




Trend: Minuteman Staffing



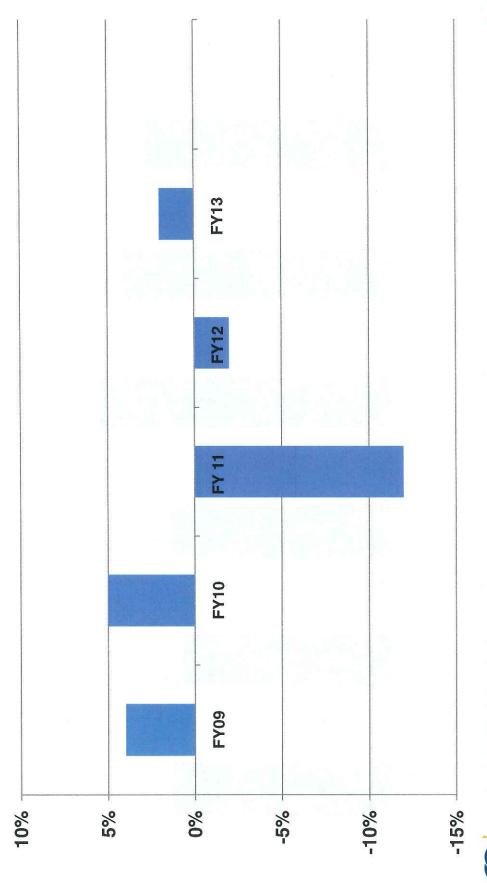
Actual Dollars of Total Salary





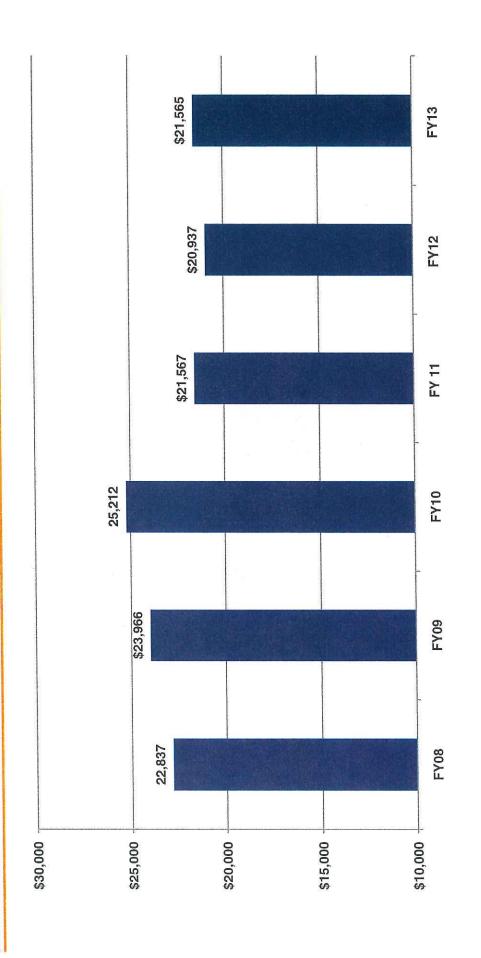


Trend: Per Pupil Expenditure





Minuteman Per Pupil Expenditure

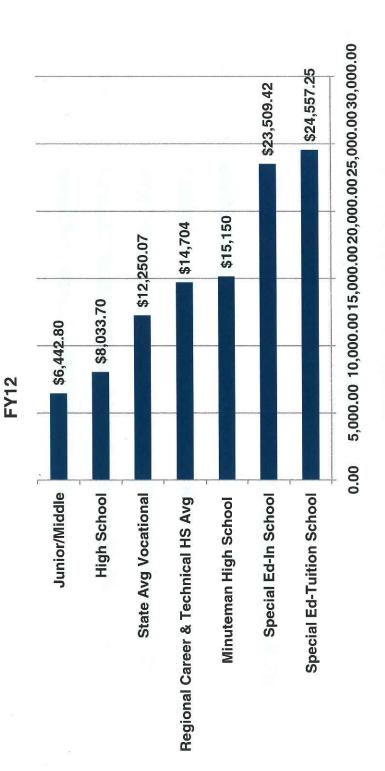




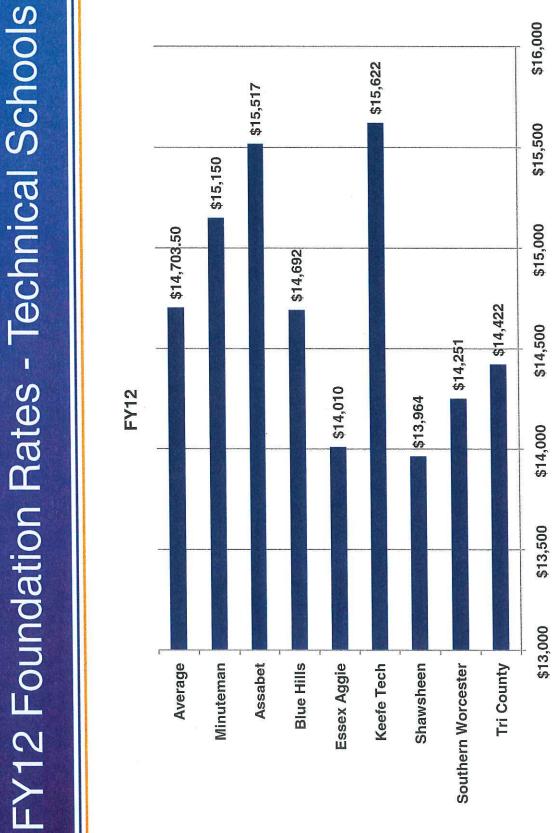

Average FY12 Per Pupil Foundation Rates

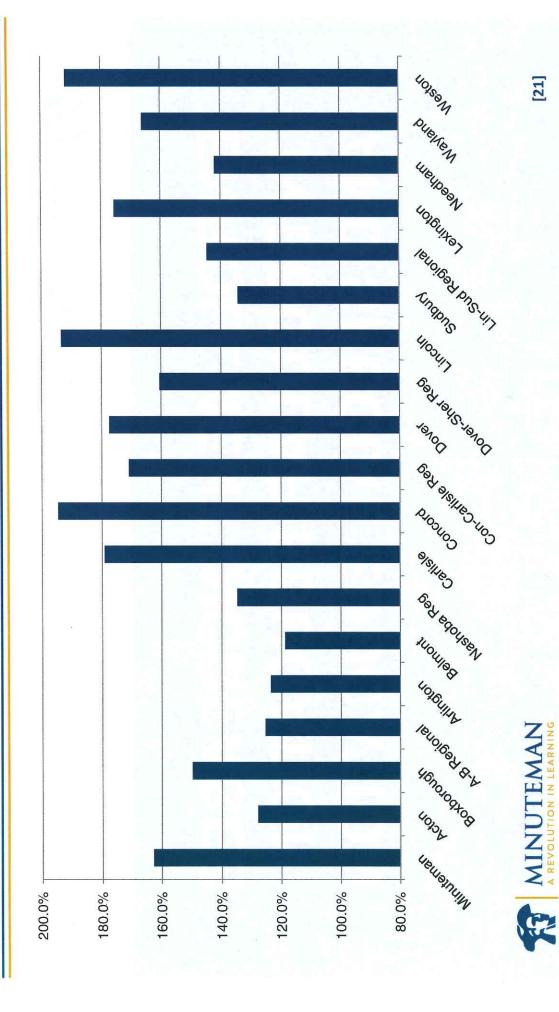








FY11 NSS% Above Foundation





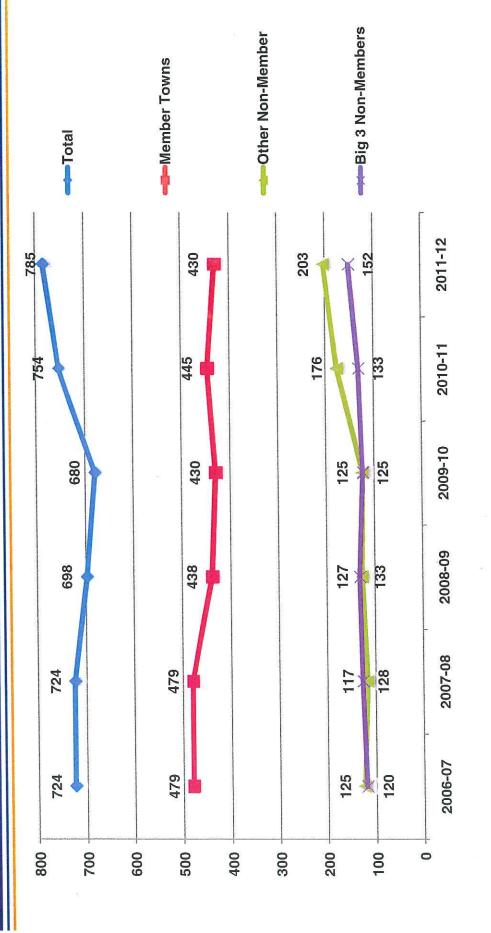

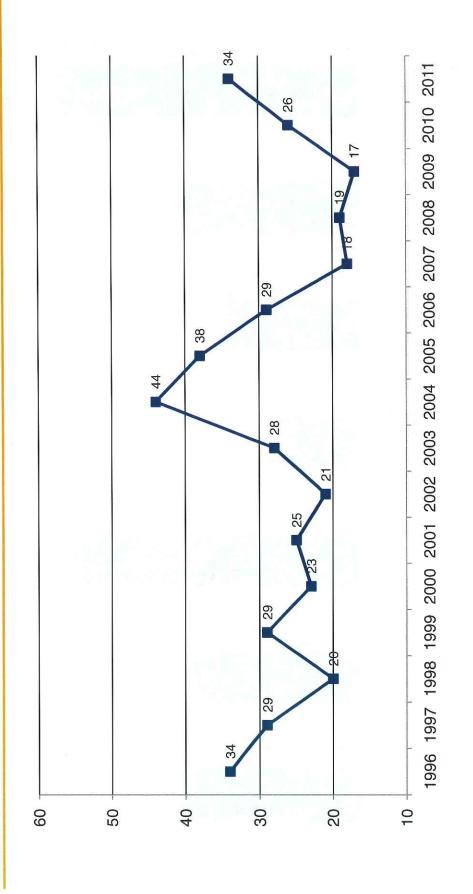


Overall Enrollment





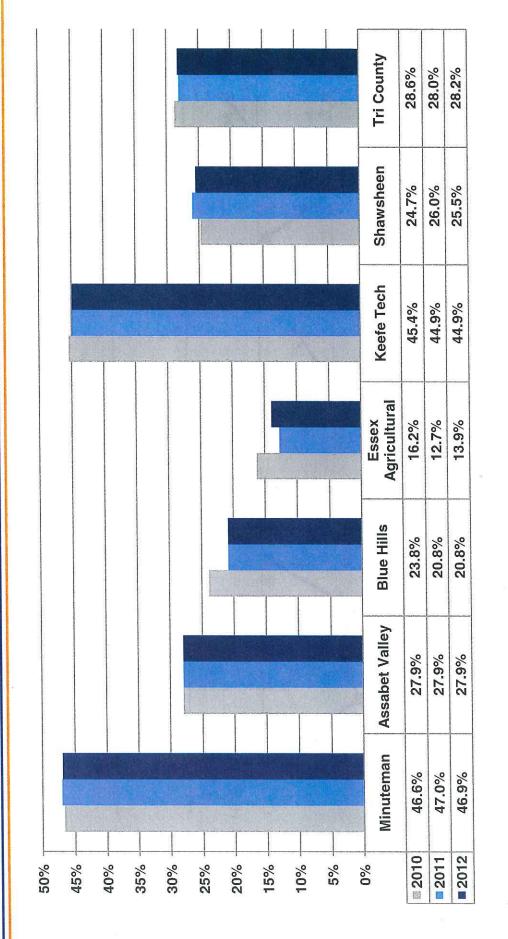
Historical Needham Enrollment





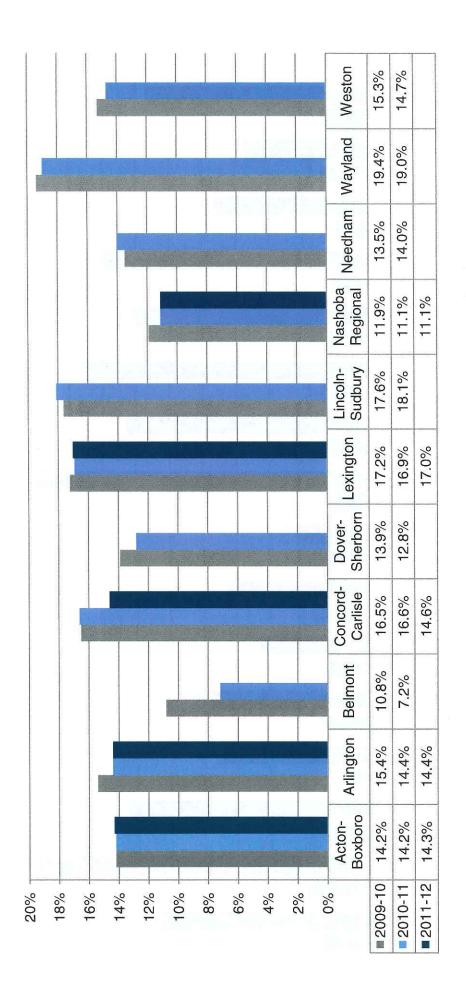

Special Education Enrollment



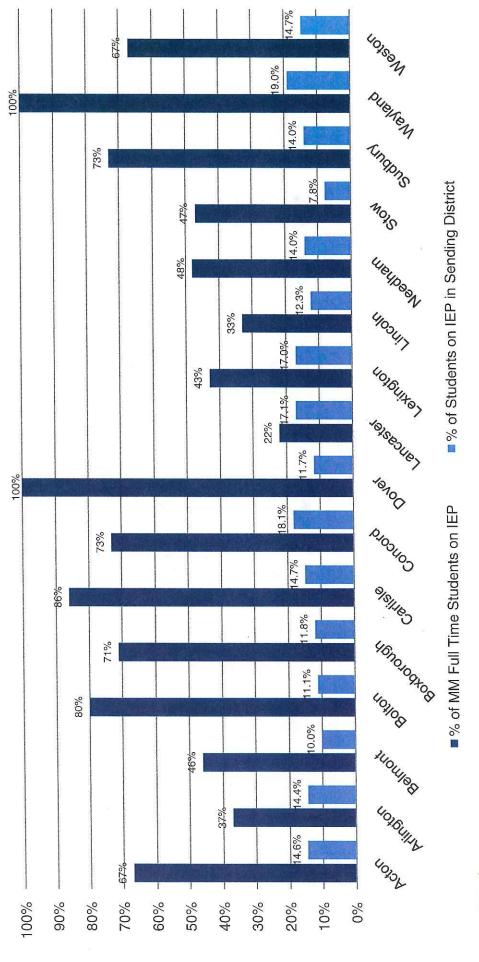


Special Education Enrollment District Schools

Policy: Procedure for Designer Selection by Town Agencies

Policy:

These procedures govern the selection of designers for any municipal building project subject to the state designer selection law, M.G.L. c. 7, §38A1/2-O. Any other local law governing the procurement of services will be inapplicable to these procurements.

I. DEFINITIONS

"Awarding Authority" means a board, committee, commission or town official that has been authorized to expend money and award a contract(s) for the study, design or construction of a building project:

"Designer" means an individual, corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, joint venture, joint stock company or other entity engaged in the practice of architecture, landscape architecture, engineering or other professional services, which satisfies any of the following:

- i. If an individual, the individual is a registered architect, landscape architect, engineer or qualified professional;
- ii. If a partnership, a majority of all the partners are persons who are registered architects, landscape architects, engineers or other qualified professionals;
- iii. If a corporation, sole proprietorship, joint stock company or other entity, the majority of the directors or a majority of the stock ownership and the chief executive officer are persons who are registered architects, or engineers, and the person to have the project in his or her charge is registered in the discipline for the project;
- iv. If a joint venture, each joint venture satisfies the requirements of this section.

"Design Services" means any of the following services provided by any designer, programmer, or construction manager in connection with any public building project:

i. Preparation of master plans, studies, surveys, soil tests, cost estimates or programs;

- ii. Preparation of drawings, plans or specifications including but not limited to schematic drawings, preliminary plans and specifications, working plans and specifications or other administration of construction contracts documents;
- iii. Supervision or administration of a construction contract; and
- iv. Construction management or scheduling.

"Building Project" means a capital facility project undertaken for the planning, acquisition design, construction, installation, repair or maintenance of any building and appurtenant structures, facilities and utilities, including initial equipment and furnishings thereof; provided, however, that appurtenant buildings or structures which are required to be constructed as integral parts of the development of sewer, water, and highway systems shall not be subject these procedures.

"Committee" means the appointees of the awarding authority, made up of at least three members, to act as a designer selection board for selection of finalists to provide design services for a town building project in accordance with the intent of Chapter 7, Sections 38A 1/2 to 38O. The committee shall include one or more members who are residents of the Town and one or more architects or engineers who may be in-house or outside people.

II. PROCEDURES

A. The procedure for designer selection by town agencies as required under the provisions of G. L., Chapter 7, Section 38A 1/2 to 38O, is to apply to the selection of designers for designer services by all municipal agencies for building projects, including construction, renovation, alteration, remodeling and repair projects, if both the estimated cost is one hundred thousand dollars or more and the design fee under the contract is ten thousand dollars or more. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for projects requesting funding from the Massachusetts School Building Authority. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for the fabrication or construction of modular buildings procured under the provisions of M.G.L., Chapter 149, Section 44E. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for public works projects bid under the provisions of Chapter 30, Section 39M and projects, including building projects, that are integral parts of the development of sewer, water and highway systems.

В.

- 1. The awarding authority will determine the nature and extent of the design services required for the project and will develop the project criteria required under paragraph II, subparagraph 3 below.
- 2. A Request for Proposals (RFP) will be publicly advertised in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the project and in the Central Register at least two weeks prior to the deadline for submitting proposals.
- 3. The RFP will provide the following detailed information:
 - i. A description of the project, the specific designer services sought, estimated construction costs, and the time allotted for completion;

- ii. When and where the program prepared for the project will be available for inspection by applicants, or a statement that there is no program beyond the information in (a) above.
- iii. The qualifications required of applicants for the project;
- iv. The categories of designer consultants, if any, for which applicants must list consultants they intend to use;
- v. Whether the fee has been set or will be negotiated. If the fee has been set, its amount must be stated as a total dollar amount, not a percentage. If the fee is to be negotiated, the awarding authority shall set a not-to-exceed amount but this amount need not be published in the RFP.
- vi. The deadline for submission of proposals;
- vii. When and where a briefing session (if any) will be held;
- viii. Any other pertinent information.
- 4. A committee of at least three members will be appointed by the awarding authority to evaluate proposals and select the finalists.
- 5. The Committee shall select at least three finalists, if there are three or more applicants. If less than three apply, each applicant shall be a finalist. The evaluation and selection of the proposals shall be based on the following criteria:
 - i. prior similar experience:
 - ii. past performance on public and private projects;
 - iii. financial stability;
 - iv. identity and qualifications of the consultants who will work with applicant on the project; and
 - v. any other criteria that the committee considers relevant for the project.
- 6. Applicants or finalists may be required to:
 - i. appear for an interview before the committee;
 - ii. present a written proposal to the committee; or
 - iii. participate in a design competition held by the committee.

- iv. provide additional information to the committee, as the committee shall determine, provided all other applicants or finalists are afforded an equal opportunity to do so.
- 7. When the committee has required the applicants to list consultants which they intend to use, any changes in, or addition to, consultants named in the application must be approved by the awarding authority and reported to the committee with a written statement by the designer or construction manager of the reasons for the change. In no event may a consultant be used who is debarred pursuant to Chapter 149, Section 44C or disqualified pursuant to Chapter 7, Section 38E.
- 8. The committee will select at least three finalists from among all applicants and transmit the list to the awarding authority. The list will rank the finalists in order of qualifications, provide a record of the final vote of the committee on the selection, and include a written statement explaining the committee's reasons for its choice and its ranking of the finalists. The list will be a public record and maintained in the contract file. The Committee shall transmit to the awarding authority all material made or received relating to the recommendation. In no event may a designer be used who is debarred pursuant to Chapter 149, Section 44C or disqualified pursuant to Chapter 7, Section 38E.

9.

- i. If the fee for design services has been set by the awarding authority prior to the selection process, the awarding authority will select the designer or construction manager to be awarded the contract from the list submitted by the committee. If the list ranks the designers in order of qualification and a designer or construction manager other than the one ranked first is selected, the awarding authority shall file a written justification with the committee and with the Town Clerk.
- ii. If the fee is to be negotiated, the awarding authority shall review the list transmitted by the committee, and may exclude any designer or construction manager from the list if a written explanation of the exclusion is filed with the Committee and maintained with the contract file. The awarding authority shall then appoint a designer based on successful fee negotiation among the remaining finalists in order of rank.
- iii. If the awarding authority is unable to negotiate a satisfactory fee with any of the finalists, the awarding authority shall request the Committee to select additional finalists.
- 10. The awarding authority may allow a designer who conducted a feasibility study to continue with the design of the project, provided the awarding authority subsequently procures the services for such design in accordance with these designer selection procedures and Chapter 7 of the General Laws. However, the awarding authority may commission, at its discretion, an independent review, by a knowledgeable and competent individual or business doing such work, of the feasibility of the designer's work to insure its reasonableness and its adequacy before allowing the designer to continue on the project.

III. DESIGN CONTRACT

- A. The design contract shall state the fee for such services as a total dollar amount. The contract may provide for equitable adjustments in the event of changes in scope or services. However, neither the designer, nor any of its consultants, shall be compensated for any services involved in preparing changes that are required for additional work that should have been anticipated by the designer in the preparation of the bid documents, as reasonably determined by the awarding authority.
- B. Every contract awarded for design services shall include:
 - 1. a certification that the designer or construction manager has not given, offered or agreed to give any gift, contribution or offer of employment as an inducement for, or in connection with, the award of the contract for design services;
 - a certification that no consultant to or subcontractor for the designer or construction manager has given, offered or agreed to give any gift, contribution or offer of employment to the designer or construction manager, or to any other person, corporation, or entity as an inducement for, or in connection with the award to the consultant or subcontractor of a contract by the designer or construction manager;
 - a certification that no person, corporation or other entity, other than a bona fide full time employee of the designer or construction manager, has been retained or hired to solicit for or in any way assist the designer or construction manager in obtaining the contract for design services upon an agreement or understanding that such person, corporation or other entity be paid a fee or other consideration contingent upon the award of the contract to the designer;
 - 4. a certification with respect to design contracts which exceed ten thousand dollars and which are for the design of a building for which the budgeted or estimated construction costs exceed one hundred thousand dollars, that the designer has internal accounting controls as required by Chapter 30, Section 39R, and that the designer will:
 - i. maintain accurate and detailed accounts for a six year period after the final payment;
 - ii. file regular statements of management concerning internal auditing controls;
 - iii. file an annual audited financial statement; and
 - iv. submit a statement from an independent certified public accountant that such CPA has examined management's internal auditing controls and expresses an opinion as to their consistency with management's statements in (2) above and whether such statements are reasonable with respect to transactions and assets that are substantial in relation to designer's financial statements. G. L., Chapter 7, Section 38H (e); and

POLICY CHANGES: Style Only

- 5. a requirement that the designer at his/her own expense obtain and maintain a professional liability insurance policy covering negligent errors, omissions and acts of the designer or of any person or business entity for whose performance the designer is legally liable arising out of the performance of such contracts for design services. The awarding authority may require a consultant employed by the designer subject to this subparagraph to obtain and maintain a similar liability insurance policy. The total amount of such insurance shall at a minimum equal the lesser of one million dollars or ten percent of the project's estimated cost of construction, or such larger amounts as the public agency may require, and shall cover the applicable period of limitations. A designer required to obtain all or a portion of such insurance coverage at his own expense shall furnish a certificate or certificates of insurance coverage to the awarding authority prior to the award of the contract.
- C. The awarding authority may request a copy of the Division of Capital Asset Management's (DCAM) Standard Design Contract to use as is, or to modify. Contracts for design services may include a requirement that the designer be responsible for overseeing the construction phase of the contract.
- D. The awarding authority shall incorporate current applicable minority-owned business enterprise (MBE) and women-owned business enterprise (WBE) participation goals, as determined by DCAM, into any design contract where funding is provided by the Commonwealth, in whole or in part (such as reimbursements, grants and the like). Reductions or waivers of these goals may be permitted where the size, nature or location of the project makes achieving such levels of MBE or WBE participation unfeasible.

IV. RECORDS

- A. In the selection of applicants to perform design services the awarding authority will keep the following records:
 - 1. all information supplied by or obtained about each applicant;
 - 2. all actions taken by the committee relating to any project;
 - 3. all actions taken by the awarding authority relating to any project;
 - 4. any other records related to designer selection.
- B. All records will be available for inspection by the State Designer Selection Board.

V. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No member of a committee shall participate in the selection of a designer as a finalist for any project if the member or any member of his or her immediate family:

- A. has a direct or indirect financial interest in the award of the design contract to any applicant;
- B. is currently employed by, or is a consultant to or under contract to an applicant;
- C. is negotiating or has an arrangement concerning future employment or contracting with any applicant;
- D. has an ownership interest in, or is an officer or director of, any applicant.

VI. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

When an emergency situation exists, the Town may utilize the following:

EXPEDITED PROCEDURE FOR SELECTION OF DESIGNERS WHEN AN EMERGENCY SITUATION EXISTS

A. <u>Scope and Purpose</u> These regulations establish a speedy procedure by which the Local Awarding Authority can select a designer, programmer or construction manager, when an emergency situation exists.

B. Declaration of Emergency

- 1. The declaration will be made by the Awarding Authority, based upon one of the following criteria:
 - a. Danger to health or safety of any persons because of the time required for selection of a designer by the regular statutory process.
 - b. Deadline for action on a project set by a court or federal agency which cannot be met if the regular statutory process is followed.
- 2. The Awarding Authority will file a memorandum with the committee stating the reasons for the emergency declaration, listing proposed scope of work, estimated cost of construction, the established lump sum fee for designers' services, and any other relevant information.
- 3. Upon receipt of the memorandum from the Awarding Authority the Committee may elect to follow the expedited procedures set forth below.

C. Studies, Programs and Design and Administration of Construction Projects

1. If the scope of work involves a study, program or design and administration of a construction project, finalists may be selected from the existing standing list of consultants who have previously applied to the Town for projects of this nature which have been advertised, or from applicants who have filed a master file brochure with the Town, without public advertising.

POLICY CHANGES: Style Only

2. The Chairman of the Committee, upon receipt of the declaration by the Local Awarding authority that an emergency exists, will select at least 6 semi-finalists as described above.

D. Voting by Committee Members for Selection in an Emergency Situation

- 1. The Chairman of the Committee shall compile the above information into a package for distribution and action by all Committee members. Material shall be mailed if time permits. When possible, selection shall be made at the next scheduled meeting. When time or other circumstances do not permit, members may respond by mail.
- 2. In those cases where the Chairman determines that immediate action is required on the basis of an immediate threat to health *or* safety, that person shall nominate at least 6 semi-finalists for the specific project to be acted on. The Chairman may cause to have polled all available Committee members by phone and record their vote, tabulate the results, and forward the names of the 3 or more finalists to the Awarding Authority for its appointment in accordance with Chapter 7, Sections 38F and 38G.
- 3. The tabulation of the vote by committee members for the 3 or more finalists to be submitted to the Awarding Authority shall be accomplished by crediting the designated point count of each member's vote to the firm so selected by each respective member. Every firm ranked 1st will be credited with 3 points, the 2nd ranked firm will be credited with 2 points and the 3rd ranked finalist will obtain point. The firm obtaining the highest cumulative total of points will be ranked 1st, the next highest total will be ranked 2nd and the 3rd highest total point count will be ranked 3rd.
- 4. In the case of an equal total point count, the Committee shall be re-polled to determine the final ranking of the 3 or more finalists.

VII. GENERAL

- A. The recommended procedures above may be amended or modified so long as the procedure adopted satisfies the purpose and intent of Chapter 7, Sections 38A 1/2 38O and requires newspaper and central register advertising, a uniform application form and uniform application procedure.
- B. All meetings of a government body shall be open to the public and any person shall be permitted to attend any meeting except as provided by G. L., Chapter 30A Sections 20 and 21.

VIII. REGULATORY AUTHORITY

TOWN OF NEEDHAM PROCEDURE FOR DESIGNER SELECTION BY TOWN AGENCIES

These procedures govern the selection of designers for any municipal building project subject to the state designer selection law, M.G.L. c. 7, §38A1/2-O. Any other local law governing the procurement of services will be inapplicable to these procurements.

I. DEFINITIONS

"Awarding Authority" means a board, committee, commission or town official that has been authorized to expend money and award a contract(s) for the study, design or construction of a building project:

"Designer" means an individual, corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, joint venture, joint stock company or other entity engaged in the practice of architecture, landscape architecture, engineering or other professional services, which satisfies any of the following:

If a corporation, sole proprietorship, joint stock company or other entity, the majority of the directors or a majority of the stock ownership and the chief executive officer are persons who are registered architects, or engineers, and the person to have the project in his or her charge is registered in the discipline for the project;
- iv. If a joint venture, each joint venture satisfies the requirements of this section.

"Design Services" means any of the following services provided by any designer, programmer, or construction manager in connection with any public building project:

- i. Preparation of master plans, studies, surveys, soil tests, cost estimates or programs;
- Preparation of drawings, plans or specifications including but not limited to schematic drawings, preliminary plans and specifications, working plans and specifications or other administration of construction contracts documents;
- iii. Supervision or administration of a construction contract; and

iv. Construction management or scheduling.

"Building Project" means a capital facility project undertaken for the planning, acquisition design, construction, installation, repair or maintenance of any building and appurtenant structures, facilities and utilities, including initial equipment and furnishings thereof; provided, however, that appurtenant buildings or structures which are required to be constructed as integral parts of the development of sewer, water, and highway systems shall not be subject these procedures.

"Committee" means the appointees of the awarding authority, made up of at least three members, to act as a designer selection board for selection of finalists to provide design services for a town building project in accordance with the intent of Chapter 7, Sections 38A 1/2 to 38O. The committee shall include one or more members who are residents of the Town and one or more architects or engineers who may be in-house or outside people.

II. PROCEDURES

A. The procedure for designer selection by town agencies as required under the provisions of G. L., Chapter 7, Section 38A 1/2 to 38O, is to apply to the selection of designers for designer services by all municipal agencies for building projects, including construction, renovation, alteration, remodeling and repair projects, if both the estimated cost is one hundred thousand dollars or more, and the design fee under the contract is fen thousand dollars or more. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for projects requesting funding from the Massachusetts School Building Authority. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for the fabrication or construction of modular buildings procured under the provisions of M.G.L., Chapter 149, Section 44E. These procedures do not apply to the selection of designers for public works projects bid under the provisions of Chapter 30, Section 39M and projects, including building projects, that are integral parts of the development of sewer, water and highway systems.

- 1. The awarding authority will determine the nature and extent of the design services required for the project and will develop the project criteria required under paragraph II, subparagraph 3 below.

- 4. A committee of at least three members will be appointed by the awarding authority to evaluate proposals and select the finalists.
- 5. The Committee shall select at least three finalists, if there are three or more applicants. If less than three apply, each applicant shall be a finalist. The evaluation and selection of the proposals shall be based on the following criteria:
 - i. prior similar experience;
 - ii. past performance on public and private projects;
 - iii. financial stability;
 - iv. identity and qualifications of the consultants who will work with applicant on the project; and
 - v. any other criteria that the committee considers relevant for the project.
- 6. Applicants or finalists may be required to:
 - i. appear for an interview before the committee;
 - ii. present a written proposal to the committee; or

- iii. participate in a design competition held by the committee.
- iv. provide additional information to the <u>committee</u>, as the committee shall determine, provided all other applicants or finalists are afforded an equal opportunity to do so.

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- 7. When the committee has required the applicants to list consultants which they intend to use, any changes in, or addition to, consultants named in the application must be approved by the awarding authority and reported to the committee with a written statement by the designer or construction manager of the reasons for the change. In no event may a consultant be used who is debarred pursuant to Chapter 149, Section 44C or disqualified pursuant to Chapter 7, Section 38E.
- 8. The committee will select at least three finalists from among all applicants and transmit the list to the awarding authority. The list will rank the finalists in order of qualifications, provide a record of the final vote of the committee on the selection, and include a written statement explaining the committee's reasons for its choice and its ranking of the finalists. The list will be a public record and maintained in the contract file. The Committee shall transmit to the awarding authority all material made or received relating to the recommendation. In no event may a designer be used who is debarred pursuant to Chapter 149, Section 44C or disqualified pursuant to Chapter 7, Section 38E.

If the fee for design services has been set by the awarding authority prior to the selection process, the awarding authority will select the designer or construction manager to be awarded the contract from the list submitted by the committee. If the list ranks the designers in order of qualification and a designer or construction manager other than the one ranked first is selected, the awarding authority shall file a written justification with the committee and with the Town Clerk.

If the fee is to be negotiated, the awarding authority shall review the list transmitted by the committee, and may exclude any designer or construction manager from the list if a written explanation of the exclusion is filed with the Committee and maintained with the contract file. However, the awarding authority may commission, at its discretion, an independent review, by a knowledgeable and competent individual or business doing such work, of the feasibility of the designer's work to insure its reasonableness and its adequacy before allowing the designer to continue on the project.

- A. The design contract shall state the fee for such services as a total dollar amount. The contract may provide for equitable adjustments in the event of changes in scope or services. However, neither the designer, nor any of its consultants, shall be compensated for any services involved in preparing changes that are required for additional work that should have been anticipated by the designer in the preparation of the bid documents, as reasonably determined by the awarding authority.
- B. Every contract awarded for design services shall include:
 - a certification that the designer or construction manager has not given, offered or agreed to give any gift, contribution or offer of employment as an inducement for, or in connection with, the award of the contract for design services;
 - 2. a certification that no consultant to or subcontractor for the designer or construction manager has given, offered or agreed to give any gift, contribution or offer of employment to the designer or construction manager, or to any other person, corporation, or entity as an inducement for, or in connection with the award to the consultant or subcontractor of a contract by the designer or construction manager;
 - 3. a certification that no person, corporation or other entity, other than a bona fide full time employee of the designer or construction manager, has been retained or hired to solicit for or in any way assist the designer or construction manager in obtaining the contract for design services upon an agreement or understanding that such person, corporation or other entity be paid a fee or other consideration contingent upon the award of the contract to the designer;
 - 4. a certification with respect to <u>design</u> contracts which exceed ten thousand dollars <u>and</u>, which are for the design of a building for which the budgeted or estimated construction costs exceed one hundred thousand dollars, that the designer has internal accounting controls as required by Chapter 30, Section 39R, and that the designer will:

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- i. maintain accurate and detailed accounts for a six year period after the final payment;
- ii. file regular statements of management concerning internal auditing controls;
- iii. file an annual audited financial statement; and
- iv. submit a statement from an independent certified public accountant that such CPA has examined management's internal auditing controls and expresses an opinion as to their consistency with management's statements in (2) above and whether such statements are reasonable with respect to transactions and assets that are substantial in relation to designer's financial statements. G. L., Chapter 7, Section 38H (e); and
- 5. a requirement that the designer at his/her own expense obtain and maintain a professional liability insurance policy covering negligent errors, omissions and acts of the designer or of any person or business entity for whose performance the designer is legally liable arising out of the performance of such contracts for design services. The awarding authority may require a consultant employed by the designer subject to this subparagraph to obtain and maintain a similar liability insurance policy. The total amount of such insurance shall at a minimum equal the lesser of one million dollars or ten percent of the project's estimated cost of construction, or such larger amounts as the public agency may require, and shall cover the applicable period of limitations. A designer required to obtain all or a portion of such insurance coverage at his own expense shall furnish a certificate or certificates of insurance coverage to the awarding authority prior to the award of the contract.
