#### 1. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF TOPIC TO BE DISCUSSED

The Water and Sewer Rate Structure Committee met on May 3, 2016 and voted to recommend the rates as proposed which are explained in the June 10, 2016 memo. It is anticipated that the Board of Selectmen will vote on final water and sewer rates at its meeting on June 28, 2016. The rates are proposed to be put into effect July 1, 2016.

The Committee supports the proposed water and sewer rate schedule which was designed to lessen the financial impact of the needed higher sewer rates by phasing in the sewer rate increase as it was presented to the Board of Selectmen last year at the public hearing. The increase in the average annual regular water/sewer bill for FY2017 would be 2.8% and the estimated increase for FY2018 would increase the annual bill by 1.5%.

Re: Water and Sewer Rate Recommendations

A public hearing has been scheduled for the Board's meeting on June 14, 2016, and the final rates will be set at the Board's June 28, 2016 meeting. The Water and Sewer Rate Structure Committee met on May 3, to weigh and deliberate options for the Board of Selectmen to consider. The five-member committee is appointed by the Board of Selectmen, and its general charge is to review proposed changes to the water and sewer rate structure and to make recommendations to the Board on said changes. The Committee members are John Cosgrove Jr, Chair of the Committee; Tom Loughran, Nick Renzulli, Steven Rosenstock, and John Tallarico. Mr. Cosgrove is also one of the two appointed Town representatives on the MWRA Advisory Board. Traditionally the Water and Sewer Superintendent has been the second.

The Committee voted to recommend that the Board adopt the proposed rate structure that was included in the presentation to the Board of Selectmen last year. The recommended rate structure would increase the annual bill for a residential customer with regular water and sewer service by approximately 2.8%. The MWRA annually provides to member communities an average cost for annual household water/sewer (AHWS) use based on the industry standard of 120 hundred cubic feet (HCF), or approximately 90,000 gallons, to track rate increases over time. For historical purposes, this constant benchmark is maintained; however, actual household usage varies considerably and therefore the impact of any proposed change may be more or less than the AHWS reference.

#### Consumption Trends

Average regular water use (domestic) has declined over the three, five, and seven year periods, each shows a downward trend (refer to table 1). Water consumption for the first three quarters of FY2016, however is slightly higher than the same period in FY2015. The FY2013 billable water consumption was lower than any of the averages, and was at an all-time low. Irrigation water has been trending upward, but is much more volatile than domestic water use. The three year (FY2013 – 15) average of irrigation water sales was 312,359 HFC and last year the three year average (FY2012 – 14) was 305,795 HFC. The FY2013 – 15 average was more than the five and seven year averages. The five year (FY2011 – 15) irrigation average was higher than the seven year average. We reported last year that the five year average was lower than the three and seven year averages, but is now higher than the seven because FY2010 is no longer in the five year period. In FY2010, irrigation water use was down considerably from the average, with nearly a 27% drop in billed use from FY2009. We believe the decrease was attributable to weather; the summer was cooler, except for a short period of hot and humid temperature. So if

FY2010 data had been excluded last year, the irrigation water use during that period would have shown an increasing trend as well.

One of the Town's largest water and sewer customers is Coca Cola. Almost all the water and sewer use is charged at the highest rate, which effectively provides a subsidy to the citizens of Needham. Water use by Coca Cola has been relatively predictable until recently, but even their use has trended downward as well. When we presented to the Board last year, we explained that FY2013 was the lowest billed use year until FY2014, but now FY2015 is the lowest billed use for Coca Cola, and through the third quarter, the current fiscal year is trending to be even lower.

Billed sewer use is also declining, whether looking at the three, five or seven year average. As with domestic water, the FY2015 billable sewer was slightly higher than the previous year, but overall it is trending lower. The first three quarters in FY2016 shows billed sewer lower than the same period in FY2015. Furthermore, all the average comparison periods are trending downward. The lowest amount billed during the immediate past seven years (FY2009 – 15) was FY2013. Coca Cola's billable sewer is declining as well. Due to an aberration with FY2013 billable sewer, which was the highest amount billed to Coca Cola in recent history, the three year average shows an uptick, but excluding FY2013 the trend is declining. The first three quarters in FY2016 shows billed sewer considerable lower for the company than the same period in FY2015; FY2015 nine month billing was lower than the same period in FY2014. Because most all of the billed consumption for Coca Cola is at the higher step rate, a reduction in billed use has a disproportionate impact on sewer revenue which then exacerbates the rise in sewer rates.

It is important to remember that the water which runs through the domestic water meter of a customer, who is also connected to the public sewer, is the basis for determining the sewer bill for the customer. When a customer has an irrigation water meter installed, the water which is used outside of the house is measured separately, and therefore is not included in the calculation of the sewer bill. In this case sewer revenue declines, but the expense of the sewer system does

not. Although the installation of an irrigation meter lowers the cost to the individual customer, the decline in billable domestic water use also lowers the amount that is used to determine the sewer bill. The problem is aggravated since the sewer rate structure was based on a higher amount of domestic water consumption. The assumption of the higher domestic water consumption was the basis by which the sewer service rates were determined, and consequently resulted in lower rates per unit than what was required to support operations.

#### Rate Structure Proposal

The basis of the rate structure is to distribute the costs associated with operation, maintenance, capital infrastructure, and other liabilities incurred to provide public water and sewer services. We must be able to demonstrate that the rate structure will generate the revenue to meet the appropriations and other liabilities to be paid during the fiscal year. Because demands on the systems and costs can swing significantly from year-to-year, due to factors such as seasonal demand for water, infrastructure improvements, unexpected major system repairs, assessments for the treatment of sewer and purchase of water from the MWRA, and regulatory and local constraints, we look to billing target estimates rather than a specific dollar amount in determining where rates need to be to pay the costs of operations. We consider a three year span as to the average billing needed to meet the estimated operating expenses, maintain sufficient reserves to fund unexpected events, have adequate capital to satisfy the liquidity and financial ratios that the rating agencies look for when determining the Town's overall credit rating, and to weather short term consumption variations.

The rates that were eventually adopted by the Board of Selectmen, after evaluating several different variations and offering changes to the presented options, have proven to meet the revised Water Enterprise requirements, but not the Sewer Enterprise. Sewer usage fees need to generate at least \$8 to \$9 million in billings to sustain the service. Based on this target range, sewer use fee revenue would need to increase by ten percent. The portion of the Sewer Enterprise operating budget that is to be supported by sewer revenue for FY2017 is \$8,218,768. with approximately another \$450,000 in other expenses including indirect costs. The Town used \$404,156 in retained earnings (non-recurring revenue) to fund recurring expenses. Use of retained earnings is acceptable to cover aberrations or expenses that are not reasonably expected to continue into the next year, or to provide temporary funding while new rates take effect. The Town fell below its retained earnings floor last year (FY2016) in order to provide funding for sewer operations, and came within \$83,000 of falling below the floor for FY2017 funding which was done by scaling back on capital. The increase is necessary as the enterprise has been relying on non-sewer receipts to pay for operations, exclusive of capital, for several years. Indeed, the sewer cash capital program has been scaled back in order the preserve fund balance, but this cannot continue. The Sewer Enterprise budget has not grown significantly over the past few years, save MWRA assessments, a significant portion of the annual operating budget. The decline in billable use is expected to continue declining, as efforts to have Needham water use drop below the 65 gallon threshold, and so rate increases are unavoidable.

The Town still cannot meet the revenue target for sewer based on the current schedule, a fact which was understood last year when the Board adopted rates for FY2016. The recommended increase in the sewer rates should get the Town closer to the level that is needed to be self-sustaining, but will likely require another sewer rate increase in FY2018. Over the next year, in addition to the annual review of the use rates, we will review the fees and charges for other

services to see if they should be amended and present those findings to the Committee to review before coming to the Board of Selectmen in June 2017.

Last year, the concept was to increase the sewer rates to meet the target not all in one year, but over two or perhaps three years, and to increase water rates in FY2016, but not the following year. The good news is that water rates do not need to be increased for FY2017, and will not need to change for FY2018. Unfortunately, as anticipated, sewer rates do need to increase. The recommendation is to continue with the phased approach with the sewer rates and set the rates as presented last year for FY2017: step 1 would be \$8.60 per HCF; step 2 would be \$9.45 HCF, step 3 would be \$10.20 HCF, and step 4 would be \$11.15 HCF (refer to Table 2).

Based on the AHWS standard, the estimated increase in the annual sewer bill is 3.9%, and the annual regular water bill would not change. This calculates to be a 2.8% increase in the annual bill over the estimate for FY2016. The water rates are not expected to increase for the following year (FY2018), and possibly no increase for FY2019, but the sewer rates will need to increase again in FY2018. This is subject to change based on water consumption trends and method of use, assessments from the MWRA for the treatment of sewerage, and what the actual year end results show.

#### Comparable Communities

In comparison to area communities, Needham ranks number 10 out of 19 in terms of annual water and sewer charges for fiscal year 2016 (refer to Table 3). Interestingly, in fiscal year 2015, before the rate increase, Needham ranked 9 out of 19 (refer to the December 2014 column in Table 3), so Needham's expense rank declined even with the rate increase. This is another example where we anticipate that communities will need to keep increasing water and sewer rates compelled in part by efforts to reduce water use, which does not impact most operating and

fixed costs at least in the short and medium terms. The average household bill per the MWRA comparison for Needham was \$1,586 which is approximately 96% of the average bill (\$1,652) for the group. The group of 19 communities shows an average bill range of \$1,182 for the City of Waltham, a community with a great number of commercial users, to a high of \$2,349 for the Town of Belmont. The rate increase adopted by the Board for FY2016 resulted in a change of 1.5% on the AHWS bill, whereas the average change by the other communities was 2.6%. However the change over seven years for Needham was 7.1%, but the average of the other communities was 29.6%.

We have also calculated the estimated annual bill based on the average Needham household water usage per a state report. The 2015 data shows that the average Needham household used 9,330 c.f. of water. The report last year reported 9,430 c.f. of water use, and the 2012 report had the average Needham household use at approximately 9,920 c.f of water. This clearly shows that our effort to encourage less water use is having an impact. However, as noted last year, based on the average household size in Needham per the US Census data, water usage would need to be approximately 8,626 c.f of water use or less per year to be under the 65 gallons of water use per day per person. This would be an additional reduction of more than 7%, a fact that foretells of future rate increases. Nonetheless, a Needham customer with water and sewer service using 9,330 c.f. would have an annual bill of \$1,233 Based on the proposed rate structure, that bill would increase by \$35 (a 2.8% increase) and our FY2018 estimate would add another \$19 in year two (a 1.5% increase). The increase in the annual bill over the two year period would be approximately \$54 or 4.3%., but that bill would be \$367 lower than the AHWS bill for FY2018 which would be approximately \$1,654 or 22% less.

The regular water rate structure for Needham has the lowest step rate at \$3.10 per hundred cubic feet which has Needham's water rate well below that of many of the comparison communities. Even Needham's highest regular water step rate at \$5.10 is well below that of many other communities. The Town's sewer rates continue to be at the higher end of the group, the bottom step would be \$8.60 per hundred cubic feet compared to the average of \$8.31 and the top sewer

step for Needham would be \$11.15 per hundred cubic feet, which compares to an average of \$13.15 today.

#### Next Steps

The Selectmen will hear from staff, the citizen committee, and the public about the proposal. The Board will be asked whether to move forward with the new rate structure proposal with an understanding that regular water rates will not need to change for FY2017 or FY2018, but that in all likelihood a rate increase for sewerage will be needed not only for FY2017 but also for FY2018. We see this proposal as easing in the financial impact of regulatory and environmental concerns in water use.

I will be at your meeting along with members of the Water and Sewer Rate Structure Committee to discuss the recommendations and to answer questions you may have. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions beforehand.

Re: Debt Sales

The Town maintained its "AAA" rating with Standard and Poor's (S&P), which has reaffirmed the rating, and still views Needham's outlook as stable after our review with them on Wednesday, May 18, 2016. The rating agency also assigned the highest short-term rating attainable (SP-1+) to the Town's Bond Anticipation Notes. The S&P May 27, 2016 rational for the rating is attached.

In addition to issuing Notes to finance several capital projects in various stages of completion, we also determined that this was an opportunity to do advance refunding bonds on debt that was issued on the High School project and the High Rock and Pollard School projects. This will impact two bond issues: the General Obligation Bonds dated June 1, 2008 and the General Obligation Bonds dated November 1, 2008. The refunding bond will save the Town over \$788,000 and because all the debt is excluded debt, the amount that will be raised on the tax levy will be less. This means the taxpayers will pay less than they would have had to pay on the remaining debt for the school projects.

The Town received six competitive bids for the refunding bond. The lowest bidder, J.P. Morgan Securities LLC, offered a coupon rate that ranges from a low of 2.000% to a high of 4.000%; the bonds that are being refunded had interest rates between 3.75% and 5.000%. After taking into account the premium offered by the bidder and other amounts to be paid, the all-in true interest cost (All-In TIC) is 1.570406%. I have attached the advance refunding statistical analysis.

The Town is also issuing two Bond Anticipation Notes (BANs), the first will mature on June 30, 2016 and the second will mature on January 18, 2017. The June 30, 2016 maturity is a taxable BAN in the amount of \$1,153,860 that will be paid in full when it matures. The Town received three bids on this Note, and the winning bid was made by **Century Bank**, which offered the Town a Net Interest Cost (NIC) of 0.75%. The total interest expense is \$336.54. The Town received five bids on the second Note, and the winning bidder was **TD Securities**, which offered a coupon rate of 2.00% with a premium of \$71,215.95 which results in a Net Interest Cost (NIC) of 0.6975%. The total interest expense is \$109,356.67.

The table on the next page provides a breakout of the projects and the amounts being financed between the two bond anticipation notes.

S&P Global Ratings assigned its 'AAA' long-term rating and stable outlook to Needham, Mass.' series 2016 general obligation (GO) refunding bonds and affirmed its 'AAA' long-term rating, with a stable outlook, on the town's existing GO debt.

At the same time, S&P Global Ratings assigned its 'SP-1+' short-term rating to Needham's series A GO taxable bond anticipation notes (BANs), payable on Sept. 15, 2016, and series B GO BANs, payable on Jan. 18, 2017.

Needham's GO bonds are eligible to be rated above the sovereign because we believe the town can maintain better credit characteristics than the nation in a stress scenario. Under our criteria, titled "Ratings Above The Sovereign: Corporate And Government Ratings—Methodology And Assumptions," published Nov. 19, 2013, on RatingsDirect, local governments are considered to have moderate sensitivity to country risk. The town's GO pledge is the primary source of security on the debt; this severely limits the possibility of negative sovereign intervention in the payment of the debt or in the operations of the town. The institutional framework in the nation is predictable for local governments, allowing them significant autonomy, independent treasury management, and no history of government intervention. Needham has considerable financial flexibility, demonstrated by the very high general fund balance as a percent of expenditures, as well as very strong liquidity.

The short-term rating reflects our view of the town's strong ability to pay principal and interest when the notes come due. Needham's market risk profile is low, in our view, as it maintains strong legal authority to issue long-term debt to take out the BANs and since it is a frequent issuer, providing regular disclosure to market participants.

Needham's full-faith-and-credit GO pledge secures the bonds, subject to the limitations of Proposition 2 1/2. Officials intend to use series 2016 bond proceeds to advance refund the town's GO bonds dated June 1, 2008, and Nov. 1, 2008.

The rating reflects our opinion of the following factors for the town:

- Very strong economy, with access to a broad and diverse metropolitan statistical area (MSA);
- Strong management, with good financial policies and practices under our Financial Management Assessment (FMA) methodology;
- Strong budgetary performance, with a slight operating surplus in the general fund and an operating surplus at the total governmental fund level in fiscal 2015;
- Very strong budgetary flexibility, with an available fund balance in fiscal 2015 of 21% of operating expenditures;
- Very strong liquidity, with total government available cash at 26.7% of total governmental fund expenditures and 3.4x governmental debt service, and access to external liquidity we consider strong;
- Very strong debt and contingent liability position, with debt service carrying charges at 7.8% of expenditures and
  net direct debt that is 49.2% of total governmental fund revenue, as well as low overall net debt at less than 3% of
  market value and rapid amortization, with 67.7% of debt scheduled to be retired within 10 years; and
- Strong institutional framework score.

### Very strong economy

We consider Needham's economy very strong. The town, with an estimated population of 29,698, is located in Norfolk County in the Boston-Cambridge-Newton MSA, which we consider to be broad and diverse. The town has a projected per capita effective buying income of 217% of the national level and per capita market value of \$305,347. Overall, the town's market value grew by 3.8% over the past year to \$9.1 billion in 2016. The county unemployment rate was 4.3% in 2015.

A residential suburb of Boston, Needham is approximately 10 miles southwest of the city. In addition to the town's residential community, Needham's economy has a diverse mix of industries, ranging from manufacturing to financial services. In fiscal 2016, the town's assessed value (AV) comprised of 85.9% residential properties and approximately 11% commercial and industrial properties. The top 10 largest taxpayers account for only 4.4% of overall AV.

Officials expect increases in property value to continue due to continuous commercial and residential growth. New developments include the expansion of Trip-Advisors and the addition of two new major hotels, all happening within the Needham Crossing business park. In addition, Needham Crossing is already home to a mix of residential and business occupants. Prominent tenants include companies such as Coca-Cola, Euro-Pro, and Sheraton Hotel. Town officials expect economic growth to continue as new and upcoming projects continue within the town.

### Strong management

We view the town's management as strong, with good financial policies and practices under our FMA methodology, indicating financial practices exist in most areas, but that governance officials might not formalize or monitor all of them on a regular basis.

Needham is conservative in its management and budgeting practices. Management seeks to reduce costs and maintain financial sustainability when drafting the town's budget. Management considers historical trends and future concerns when developing revenue and expenditure assumptions. The town manager receives budget-to-actual reports monthly while the board of selectmen receives reports quarterly.

Needham maintains a five-year financial forecast and a five-year rolling capital improvement plan, both of which are included and presented with the annual budget. Currently, the town has a formal debt management policy but does not

have a formal reserve policy. Needham uses commonwealth guidelines for investment management.

### Strong budgetary performance

Needham's budgetary performance is strong in our opinion. The town had slight surplus operating results in the general fund of 0.5% of expenditures, and surplus results across all governmental funds of 6.9% of expenditures in fiscal 2015. General fund operating results of the town have been stable over the past three years, with a result of negative 0.8% of expenditures in 2014 and 2.4% of expenditures in 2013.

Management attributes the operating surplus in fiscal 2015 to the town's numerous ongoing developments. Along with the redevelopment of existing properties, new developments have increased property value tremendously for Needham, with property taxes making up 73% of the town's revenue in fiscal 2015.

Needham expects to end fiscal 2016 with better results than fiscal 2015. Management reports similar increasing trends in property value due to the continued redevelopment of existing buildings, as well as the growing presence of new high-tech companies. For fiscal 2017, management reports a balanced budget of \$144 million, which includes a \$1.8 million appropriation of reserves.

### Very strong budgetary flexibility

Needham's budgetary flexibility is very strong, in our view, with an available fund balance in fiscal 2015 of 21% of operating expenditures, or \$27.5 million.

The town's available funds include assigned, unassigned, and committed funds. Needham has historically maintained strong budgetary flexibility, keeping its available reserves close to 20% of general fund expenditures over the past three fiscal years. Management expects to maintain a level of, at least, 19% of revenue for available funds and a minimum of 8% of revenue for unassigned funds. The town has also demonstrated a willingness to raise revenue in excess of Proposition 2.1/2 limits on several occasions.

### Very strong liquidity

In our opinion, Needham's liquidity is very strong, with total government available cash at 26.7% of total governmental fund expenditures and 3.4x governmental debt service in 2015. In our view, the town has strong access to external liquidity if necessary.

Needham is a frequent issuer of GO debt, which allows for strong access to external liquidity. In addition, the town does not currently have any variable-rate or direct-purchase debt. Therefore, we expect Needham's liquidity profile to remain very strong.

### Very strong debt and contingent liability profile

In our view, Needham's debt and contingent liability profile is very strong. Total governmental fund debt service is 7.8% of total governmental fund expenditures, and net direct debt is 49.2% of total governmental fund revenue. Overall net debt is low at 0.8% of market value, and approximately 67.7% of the direct debt is scheduled to be repaid within 10 years, which are, in our view, positive credit factors.

Subsequent to this issuance, the town will have approximately \$95.7 million in total direct debt, about \$16 million of which is self-supporting debt from the town's enterprise funds. Needham also expects to issue debt within the next two

years for an upcoming elementary school project, the amount of which is still unknown. However, management expects the amount to be approved for debt exclusion.

Needham's combined required pension and actual other postemployment benefit (OPEB) contribution totaled 7.8% of total governmental fund expenditures in fiscal 2016. Of that amount, 4.3% represented required contributions to pension obligations, and 3.5% represented OPEB payments. The town made its full annual required pension contribution in fiscal 2016.

Needham participates in the Needham Contributory Retirement System, a cost-sharing, defined-benefit retirement system. The town's required pension contribution is its actuarially determined contribution, calculated at the commonwealth level, based on an actuary study.

Using updated reporting standards in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 67, the town's net pension liability was measured as of Dec. 31, 2014, and was \$54.4 million. The public employees' retirement system plan maintained a funded level of 71%, using the plan's fiduciary net position as a percent of the total pension liability. For additional details on GASB Nos. 67 and 68, please see our report, titled "Incorporating GASB 67 And 68: Evaluating Pension/OPEB Obligations Under Standard & Poor's U.S. Local Government GO Criteria," published Sept. 2, 2015, on RatingsDirect. Needham has consistently funded 100% of its required contributions, and it expects to have the system fully funded by 2030.

Needham also offers OPEB to retirees, which it funds on a pay-as-you-go basis. It is one of the few communities in Massachusetts that fully funds its OPEB obligation. The town has been appropriating its annual required contributions toward its OPEB fund for the past five fiscal years, and it pays for annual health care costs from the fund. As of Aug. 31, 2015, the OPEB trust fund had a balance of approximately \$23.2 million. Based on the most recent actuarial valuation completed on, July 1, 2013, the funded ratio was 24%, based on a \$46.8 million unfunded actuarial accrued liability.

### Strong institutional framework

The institutional framework score for Massachusetts municipalities is strong.

### Outlook

The stable outlook reflects S&P Global Ratings' opinion that Needham will likely maintain its very healthy reserves due to its strong management practices and conservative operating profile. We believe the town's large and buoyant economy provides additional underlying strength. Furthermore, we expect Needham to maintain a very strong debt and contingent liability profile as the town has taken proactive measures to mitigate any potential budgetary challenges regarding pension and OPEB costs.

Therefore, we do not expect to change the rating within our two-year outlook period. However, we could lower the rating if operating performance were to weaken, leading to reserves falling below 15% of expenditures, or if the town fails to adhere to current management practices and financial policies.

Requires the Department of Housing and Community

  Development to develop a municipal opt-in program to advance
  the state's economic, environmental, and social well-being
  through enhanced planning for economic growth, land
  conservation, workforce housing creation and mobility.
- Allows for accessory dwelling units on residential lots that meet certain requirements without a special permit.
- Requires zoning ordinances and bylaws to provide at least one district of reasonable size in which multi-family housing is a permitted use as of right.
- Requires zoning ordinances and bylaws to provide for open space residential development as of right in a specific zoning district or in multiple districts through overlay zoning.
- Allows cities and towns the option to change the voting threshold to approve zoning amendments from the current 2/3 vote to a simple majority vote.
- Requires a local zoning board to consider consistency with the

- municipality's master plan when evaluating an ordinance, by-law, or an amendment to an ordinance or by-law.
- Changes the current standard that zoning ordinances or by-laws do not apply to building or special permits issued before the first publication of notice of the public hearing on the ordinance or by-law to a requirement that the ordinance or by-law would not apply to building or special permits applications received before the first publication of notice of the public hearing.
- Eliminates a provision in current law that protects up to 3 preexisting adjoining residential lots under common ownership against any zoning dimensional changes for 5 years after any zoning change.
- Modifies vesting rights for subdivision plan freezes to allow for a land owner to submit a preliminary subdivision plan, followed within 7 months by a substantially similar definitive plan, before a public hearing on a zoning or by-law change in order to protect the land shown on the plan.
- Decreases the voting requirements for approval of a special permit from 2/3 vote to a simple majority vote.
- Increases the duration of special permits from a maximum of 2 years to a minimum of 3 years.
- Clarifies existing law regarding provisions for siting of refuse stations in areas zoned principally for industrial use.
- Codifies the site plan review process to establish standards and criteria by which a project and its direct adverse impacts on properties and public infrastructure within the surrounding 300 feet of the parcel are evaluated.
- Provides statutory authority and limitations on the use of development impact fees, ensuring the fees have a rational nexus to, and are roughly proportionate to the impacts created by a proposed development and enumerating the type of capital facilities for which a development impact fee can be assessed.
- Provides statutory authority and limitations on the use of inclusionary zoning ordinances, authorizing ordinances or by-laws

to require applicants for a residential or mixed use development to provide inclusionary housing units in return for municipal affordable housing concessions.

- Clarifies that no ordinance or by-law can prohibit a landowner from requesting the municipality to engage in a land use dispute avoidance process and establishes confidentiality for the process, including exemption from the public records law and tolling of applicable time requirements.
- Updates the standard and required findings necessary for a zoning board and clarifies that variances, other than a use-variance, run with the land.
- Requires that local boards of health receive notice of projects seeking zoning approvals.
- Gives the court discretion to issue a surety or cash bond upon appeal of a special permit, variances, or site plan approval.
- Updates the current master plan requirements to ensure plans
  reflect the Commonwealth's Sustainable Development Principles
  and are tailored to the specific needs of the municipality. Master
  plans are subject to a public hearing and must be adopted by the
  local planning board and the local legislative body.
- Allows municipalities to pass a minor subdivision ordinance or by-law to opt-in to an alternative to the current "approval not required process" and thereby apply certain rules and regulations to the minor subdivision process.
- Clarifies that design and dimensional subdivision requirements for total travel lane widths no greater than 24 feet are presumed not to be excessive.
- Clarifies that a planning board may require a subdivision plan to show land suitable for park or recreation purposes and may require no building be built on that land.
- Allows the recording of plans for minor lot line changes, subject to certain conditions.
- Clarifies the appeals process to challenge a decision on a

subdivision or minor subdivision and gives the court discretion to issue a surety or cash to limit frivolous appeals.

- Requires cases appropriate for the permit session of the land court, but not originally filed in the permit session, to be transferred to the permit session upon request of a party in the dispute.
- Makes a technical correction to the time to appeal in the nature of certiorari.
- Requires any municipality with an existing zoning variance, site plan review or inclusionary zoning ordinance to conform to the provisions of the legislation within 3 years.
- Allows a master plan currently in effect to remain in effect for 10 years, at which time it must be updated to conform to the requirements of this act.
- Grandfathers any variance granted prior to passage of this act and clarifies that the variance runs with the land.

This memo responds to your request for an assessment of how Senate, No. 2311 (previously S2144) could affect the Town of Needham.

Senate, No. 2311, "An Act promoting housing and sustainable development", comes at the heels of over seventeen years of work by planners, municipal attorneys, real estate developers, and others to improve and update G.L. c. 40A, the Zoning Act, and G.L. 41, § 81K-§ 81GG inclusive, the Subdivision Control Law. Originally called the Land Use Reform Act (LURA), the zoning reform bill in the Senate today reflects a variety of interests and compromise positions that have evolved over time. Its contents will please some people and draw opposition from others, as can be seen in the different "messages" that have begun to circulate from organized interest groups. As explained in this memo, S2311 provides for some sought-after changes to the Zoning Act that are intended to increase local control, but at the same time, it reinforces the state's interest in encouraging housing and economic growth and developing a variety of housing choices. This "trade-off" framework helps to explain many aspects of S2311.

Many individuals and groups have sought amendments to S2311 since late last week. As appropriate, I have noted some of the known amendments. However, I am confident that Senate Ways and Means has received even more requests for corrective and filed amendments than I have mentioned here, including amendments that would effectively open up G.L. c. 40B, §§ 20-23. There has been considerable activity about this bill over the past few weeks. The Senate is expected to vote on Thursday. It is possible that some of the content of my memo will be made obsolete by amendments negotiated and agreed upon in the next twenty-four to forty-eight hours.



### **PLANNING**

At the heart of zoning reform is planning and plan implementation. Massachusetts currently has a master plan law, G.L. c. 41, § 81D. It directs planning boards to prepare a master plan and prescribes the minimum required content as nine core elements (goals and policies, land use, housing, economic development, transportation, natural and cultural resources, open space and recreation, community facilities and services, and implementation program). Though directive, the present master plan statute does not have any particular enforcement mechanisms or deadlines, and it also has no incentives for cities and towns to create a plan. In addition, communities are not obligated to align their zoning with the master plan's goals, policies, and land use plan. As a result, there are many towns in Massachusetts with old master plans or no master plan at all, and zoning that bears little relationship to the master plan. Needham's most recent town-wide master plan was completed ca. 1983.

It is against this backdrop that zoning reform groups have proposed a stronger master plan law and an explicit connection between the master plan and zoning. S2311, Sec. 24, would require planning boards to prepare a master plan for their city or town and review and update it at least every ten years. The *required* plan elements would be reduced (goals, housing, natural resources and energy management, land use and zoning, and implementation program), but the bill identifies many other elements as appropriate, though voluntary. In addition, Sec. 24 contains specific language about the relationship with zoning: "The plan shall be internally consistent in its policies, forecasts and standards and may support and provide a rationale for the municipality's zoning ordinance or bylaws, subdivision regulations and other land use laws, regulations, policies and capital expenditures." Many see this language as providing an important legal basis for defending the validity of a zoning bylaw or ordinance if it were challenged in court.

In short, if S2311 became law, Needham would need to:

- 1) Update the comprehensive plan;
- Secure planning board and town meeting approval of the plan by simple majority vote; and
- Consider ways to bring the Zoning Bylaw in line with the plan (if any inconsistencies or conflicts exist).

Worth noting is that elsewhere in S2311, the planning board's report to town meeting about proposed zoning amendments would need to include an assessment of the amendment's consistency with the Town's master plan. (Sec. 9)



### **ACCESSORY DWELLINGS**

S2311 Sec. 5 would establish a conditional zoning exemption for accessory dwelling units (ADU), defined as follows: "self-contained housing unit, inclusive of sleeping, cooking and sanitary facilities, incorporated within the same structure as the principal dwelling or in a detached accessory structure and that: (i) is located on the same lot as the principal dwelling; (ii) maintains a separate entrance, either directly from the outside or through an entry hall or corridor shared with the principal dwelling; (iii) shall not be sold separately from the principal dwelling; and (iv) is not larger in floor area than 1/2 the floor area of the principal dwelling or 900 square feet, whichever is smaller." Thus, the definition contemplates an ADU inside a single-family dwelling or in a separate building on the same lot, from upstairs over a garage to a "tiny house" structure or an elder cottage housing opportunity (ECHO) dwelling.

Per Sec. 5, an ADU would be permitted as of right if it is accessory to a single-family home on at least 5,000 sq. ft. of land, or the amount of land needed to support a septic system that complies with Title V of the State Environmental Code. Communities would not have the option to regulate ADUs by special permit. However, communities could impose the following limits that are specifically called out in Sec. 5:

- 1) "Reasonable" setback and building height regulations
- 2) Require the house or the ADU to be owner-occupied
- 3) Limit the total number of allowable ADUs to 5 percent of the Town's year-round housing inventory. The effect of this provision is that Needham could impose an ADU cap of 553 units (11,047 year-round units \* 5 percent).

It appears that currently, Needham does not allow accessory dwellings by right or by special permit. In weighing the advantages and drawbacks of S2311, the Town may want to determine whether ADUs would help Needham address goals or policies in any of its existing plans, such as the housing plan.

### HOUSING DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK

S2311, Sec. 6 lays out a range of housing development provisions to encourage housing growth and good design. These provisions include "by-right" zoning for multifamily housing and open space residential development (OSRD). They would reside in a newly created Section 3A of Chapter 40A.

 As currently drafted, S2311 would require communities to identify appropriate locations for multifamily housing and zone for multifamily development by right. The multifamily district would have to allow at least 15 units per acre (except in rural



communities) and meet the definition of an "eligible location" under G.L. c. 40R.¹ Other state requirements such as Title V and the Wetlands Protection Act, G.L. c. 131, § 40, would still apply. However, the multifamily zoning requirement in S2311 also provides for a determination of consistency by DHCD, i.e., a community that already has a multifamily zoning district may be eligible for a waiver under S2311 if the existing zoning is substantially consistent with the proposed changes to the Zoning Act.

2) S2311 would also make OSRD a "by right" development option, which developers could pursue and planning boards could approve through subdivision control. The bill outlines the basic features that an OSRD by-right bylaw would need to meet, e.g., methods of calculating allowable density and protecting the open space. This approach to OSRD already exists in a few communities in Massachusetts and has been incorporated within the Commonwealth's "Smart Growth Toolkit".<sup>2</sup>

As we understand it, Needham currently allows multifamily housing by right in the Apartment districts. At least one district, A-1, appears to meet the minimum density requirement in S2311. If the bill passes, the Town may want to review its A1 regulations carefully and determine whether Needham qualifies for a Section 3A waiver. If a district that allows multifamily units by right is substantially built out, a waiver is unlikely. Also, the Town may need to modify its Site Plan Review bylaw to comply with other components of S2311.

Of note: An amendment to S2311 has been filed that would add "exclusionary zoning" to the list of unlawful discrimination prohibited by G.L. c. 151B. The purpose of the amendment is to support the "by-right" housing provisions as essential tools for non-discrimination against protected classes, including people of color, families, and people with disabilities. There seems to be considerable support for this amendment.

### **INCLUSIONARY ZONING**

S2311 formally provides for an approach to affordable housing development that has had varying degrees of success in Massachusetts. Inclusionary zoning is the practice of encouraging or requiring the inclusion of affordable units in mixed-income developments. In its present form, Chapter 40A does not provide for or recognize inclusionary zoning, and this has often left local officials wondering about its legality. Passage of S2311 would not obligate Needham to institute inclusionary zoning; it simply clarifies that communities

may institute inclusionary zoning. That said, inclusionary zoning enacted under S2311 would be required to provide "municipal concessions" such as a density bonus, off-street parking reductions, and so forth. If S2311 were to pass, Needham and other communities could, if they wish, target inclusionary zoning to the multifamily district (or to work with multifamily uses) and create more units eligible for the Subsidized Housing Inventory.

An amendment was filed with Senate Ways and Means to remove the municipal concessions requirement. We understand that the concessions requirement will not be changed.

### SITE PLAN REVIEW

As you may know, site plan review is a creature of home rule in Massachusetts. The Zoning Act is silent about it, but the courts have upheld site plan review as a valid permitting practice to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community. S2311 formalizes site plan review in a proposed new section of Chapter 40A known as Section 9D. The proposed Section 9D provides for administrative site plan review for uses allowed as of right and a review and decision period not exceeding 120 days. Site plans would qualify for approval by simple majority vote. The lapse period could not be less than two years.

Needham currently has a two-tier site plan review framework with major and minor plan review. Major site plan review is a special permit process, which appears to conflict with the site plan review provisions of S2311. If S2311 passes, the Planning Department will need to review the existing Zoning Bylaw Section 7.4 against the more streamlined version of site plan review and bring local procedures in line with the statute. Changes needed, if any, would most likely affect the Major Project review process and have little if any impact on Minor Project review.

### MUNICIPAL OPT-IN PROGRAM

S2311 contains an "opt-in" feature that has been around for some time in prior versions of zoning reform legislation. The purpose of the opt-in program is to provide incentives for communities to spur housing and economic development in designated areas, i.e., growth districts. Communities that institute practices such as expedited permitting and consolidated hearings would become eligible for "certification" under S2311, Sec. 2 (which amends G.L. c. 23B). Certification status would bring certain benefit such as preference for state discretionary grants or a reduced "vesting" period for subdivision plans (meaning a shorter zoning freeze).

Needham has taken several steps to promote development in desired locations such as Needham Crossing. It is difficult for us to say whether the opt-in program would provide tangible benefits to the Town because it involves policies that have to be determined



locally. We simply point out that the Town has a track record for innovation, and the optin program could be appealing. The legislation is very broad in that it directs DHCD to establish the program and a process for certifying communities, but the actual incentives that certified communities would be eligible for are stated in broad/general terms. It is difficult to foresee how much value the opt-in program will provide. It may be very important to some communities.

### MINOR SUBDIVISIONS

For many years, proponents of zoning reform have sought to eliminate the so-called "Approval Not Required" or ANR provision of the Subdivision Control Law. While S2311 does not erase ANR, Sec. 34 creates the option for a "minor subdivision" procedure for small projects (not more than six lots) with an accelerated subdivision review period of 65 days, or 95 days if the lots will be located on a new way. Minor subdivision is a local option that creates better oversight for small divisions of land, but the planning board is essentially obligated to approve the plan unless 2/3 of its members think otherwise.

The bill provides that communities can adopt the minor subdivision option under a new (proposed) section of the Subdivision Control Law (G.L. c. 41, §§ 81HH). Adoption of the new section would require a 2/3 vote of town meeting. An amendment has been filed to replace the 2/3 requirement with a simple majority vote.

### **VESTED RIGHTS**

Vesting is the mechanism for balancing the interests of property owners and the public when a community adopts new zoning. The goal of vesting is to be fair to owners who have plans to develop their parcel while understanding that "freezing" old zoning rules for many years can adversely affect the public. In fact, the vesting policies of the existing Zoning Act were one of the main driving forces behind pursuing zoning reform seventeen years ago.

Prior versions of zoning reform eliminated the three-year ANR freeze (freeze of use regulations) and the "common lot" freeze. However, these issues are not addressed in S2311. In addition, S2311 maintains the eight-year protection for subdivision plans. Amendments have been filed to strike the ANR freeze. We do not know if they will survive.

Needham seems to have a preference for creating overlay districts instead of changing the rules in its use districts. As a result, it is not clear how important the debate over vested rights will be in your community – that is, whether the existing or proposed "freeze" policies have a material impact on Needham. It is very important in most of the towns I work with.



### **VARIANCES**

S2311 includes important changes to G.L. c. 40A, § 10, which governs variances. The present statute imposes very strict requirements on the issuance of variances – requirements that were intended to limit the ability of the board of appeals to grant them. Statewide, the actual experience with variances and the original intent are vastly different, however. Some boards of appeal never grant variances while others ignore the law and grant them without any standards at all. One of the most striking land use decisions I have seen in my years as a planner involves a 650,000 sq. ft. commercial development in Central Massachusetts, all permitted with a use variance. By contrast, the board of appeals in another community simply refuses to grant any dimensional variances regardless of the circumstances.

Ostensibly to address such discrepancies, S2311, Sec. 22 contains language that would relax the criteria for granting a variance. The logic is that something more realistic might help town boards be selective about the variances they choose to approve. By contrast, some reviewers of Sec. 22 fear that relaxing the criteria for granting variances could bring about unintended, unwanted consequences. Below is an excerpt from S2311 and existing G.L. c. 40A, § 10:

### Proposed:

Where literal enforcement of the zoning ordinance or by-law would result in *practical difficulty, financial or otherwise*, to the petitioner, upon appeal or upon petition with respect to particular land or structures, the permit-granting authority may grant a variance from the terms of the applicable zoning ordinance or by-law following a public hearing for which notice has been given by publication and posting as provided in section 11 and by mailing notice to all interested parties. *The practical difficulty necessitating the variance shall relate to the physical characteristics including, but not limited to, soil conditions, shape or topography or location of the site or of the structures thereon.* 

### Existing:

The permit granting authority shall have the power . . . to grant upon appeal or upon petition with respect to particular land or structures a variance from the terms of the applicable zoning ordinance or by-law where such permit granting authority specifically finds that owing to circumstances relating to the soil conditions, shape, or topography of such land or structures and especially affecting such land or structures but not affecting generally the zoning district in which it is located, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance or by-law would involve substantial hardship, financial or otherwise, to the petitioner or appellant, and that desirable relief may be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without nullifying or substantially derogating from the intent or purpose of such ordinance or by-law . . . .

We do not know how many variances are applied for in Needham or what the ZBA's workload is like, or if variance activity is even a concern for the Town. You may want to



seek input from the members of your ZBA about the potential ramifications of the language in Sec. 22. The "practical difficulty" standard would be a less onerous requirement than the existing criteria, yet some observers of this bill believe a more realistic standard will encourage better decisions.

### **AMENDMENTS: SPECIAL PERMITS**

The Zoning Act requires a two-thirds vote to pass amendments to a zoning ordinance or bylaw. S2311 provides a local option to reduce the vote to simple majority. If Needham wanted to make it easier to enact zoning changes, S2311 would give you a tool to achieve that end. The bill contains similar language for special permits.

### **BOARD TRAINING**

S2311 amends G.L. c. 23B, which describes the powers and duties of the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). The proposed bill would provide for annual training programs for members of planning boards and boards of appeal, carried out by DHCD or a related agency, such as Citizen Planner Training Collaborative (CPTC). There is no mandate for local officials to participate in training, however.



### S. 2311 Would Override Local Zoning and Grant Unprecedented By-Right Powers to For-Profit Developers

June 8, 2016

Dear Senator,

On behalf of cities and towns across the Commonwealth, the Massachusetts Municipal Association is writing to express our significant concerns with S. 2311, An Act Promoting Housing and Sustainable Communities. The MMA's Municipal and Regional Policy Committee completed a careful and extensive evaluation of the bill as reported out of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, and we must express our serious reservations regarding many of the key provisions of the bill.

Any amendments to the existing zoning and land use laws in Massachusetts will have profound and long-lasting impacts on our communities and residents, and will certainly affect the quality of life in cities and towns for generations to come. For this reason, proposed changes to zoning and land use statutes require very careful consideration.

While various proposals to better connect planning and zoning practices have been in circulation and discussion for some time, S. 2311 reflects a sweeping departure from previous versions of zoning reform. Previous zoning proposals reflected a balanced approach, and incorporated many hours of study and negotiation between all impacted parties. S. 2311 has a greatly expanded scope and reach, and it would override basic zoning authority at the local level. A bill this technically complex, with such wide-ranging consequences for all communities across the Commonwealth, should be carefully considered, with ample time to consult with the local governments and citizen panels that would be directed to implement these mandates. Legislation of this nature should not advance until its impact on communities and neighborhoods is fully evaluated and clearly understood.

We believe that any reform to state zoning laws must contain strong protection of local decision-making authority, and we strongly oppose "by-right" language that would override zoning by-laws that have been established by citizens and their elected and appointed leaders. S. 2311 would provide for-profit developers with unprecedented power to override existing bylaws and ordinances, and also empower state agencies to effectively re-write zoning codes for thousands of neighborhoods across Massachusetts.

The MMA's concerns are presented below by topic. These sections, many of which which would erode local control and provide unprecedented windfalls for developers, would only serve to place a heavy burden on already under-staffed and over-worked municipal governments while doing little to actually encourage affordable housing.

### Mandated "By-Right" Multi-Family Housing Districts

S. 2311 would mandate every city and town to establish "by-right" zoning districts for multi-family housing, removing any special permit or local approval process except normal site plan review, with NO provisions that these housing units meet the affordability needs of the community, and prohibiting communities from setting density provisions less than 8 units per acre in rural communities and 15 units per acre in all other communities. The MMA is greatly concerned that this would increase the cost of housing in cities and towns and make it harder to meet affordable housing targets, because developers would almost always pursue projects for luxury and high-end developments that yield the highest profits.

### Mandated "By-Right" Accessory Apartments

S. 2311 would mandate every city and town to approve accessory apartments in all residential districts, granting homeowners "by-right" ability to add additions, separate buildings or property renovations, as long as the accessory apartment is no larger than half of the entire structure or 900 square feet, and meets building code standards. And although cities and towns could cap accessory apartments to no more than 5 percent of the total non-seasonal housing units in the community, this would be difficult to monitor.

Additionally, a 2004 analysis done by the Pioneer Institute on accessory apartment zoning in eastern Massachusetts showed that of the roughly 186 cities and towns surveyed, a great majority (104) allow accessory apartments, including the suburbs, while 82 did not have explicit authorizations. Most of these allow accessory apartments through special permits (71 of the 104). Most of the bylaws and ordinances have very specific criteria for granting permits that varied substantially. Overriding these already-existing by-laws would present enormous difficulties for communities that have already acted to address this issue.

### Mandated "Open Space Residential Developments"

Every city and town would be required to approve "by-right" residential development projects with greater density, if those projects are designed to preserve open space in or adjacent to the development. These are "compact" or "cluster" developments that are designed to allow for a portion of the land to remain undeveloped.

### Watered-Down Inclusionary Zoning

The MMA has been a champion of legislation to clearly authorize cities and towns to adopt inclusionary zoning bylaws and ordinances to require developers to include affordable housing as an important component of large projects. This is the only clear way that cities and towns can ensure that new developments help to expand the stock of affordable housing. S. 2311 does contain an inclusionary zoning provision, but the language has been watered down so that inclusionary zoning would only be allowed in exchange for municipal concessions, such as allowing greater density, even if those concessions are not economically necessary for the project to advance. Communities that have already implemented inclusionary zoning ordinances would be forced to weaken their local policies to conform with S. 2311, so that these localities could only use inclusionary zoning when they make additional concessions to developers. Further, inclusionary zoning could NOT be applied to any developments that are submitted under the "by-right" multi-family districts mandated in the bill. The MMA asks that the Senate adopt amendment number 13, proposed by Senator Brownsberger, which would allow inclusionary zoning without concessions.

The MMA and local officials have been working on zoning legislation for many years to address several problems at the local level, and S. 2311 includes several of these, including:

- **Development Impact Fees** Communities could charge development impact fees, to be used only for studies to review the specific project or for infrastructure improvements, but not for personnel-related costs, and all unspent money, plus interest, would need to be returned to the developer within 6 years; and
- Master Plan Votes In order to better connect planning and zoning, communities would be required to develop a comprehensive master plan, and communities would be given the option to reduce the 2/3 majority legislative vote required to make zoning changes down to a simple majority or a percentage in between; and
- Site Plan Review Site plan review would be codified in statute, with a statutory deadline of 120 days for local review; and
- **ANR/Minor Subdivisions** The bill would address concerns over the "approval not required" issue by authorizing communities to adopt a minor subdivision zoning bylaw to provide for local review of subdivisions of 6 units or less. Permitting of minor subdivisions on existing rights-of-way would be required within 65 days, and approval of minor subdivisions on new rights-of-way would be required within 95 days.

Unfortunately, these four advances are more than eclipsed by the unfortunate top-down weakening of local decision-making authority, making S. 2311 an unbalanced package that clearly benefits the for-profit development community at the expense of local control over basic neighborhood zoning and land use issues.

S. 2311 is far-reaching and complex, and proposes enormous changes that would have dramatic and widespread impacts on municipalities and local residents and businesses for generations to come. We strongly urge you to return to the original purpose of zoning reform, which is to develop a balanced package of updates and refinements that preserve local zoning authority, integrate modern planning approaches with zoning, and ensure a sustainable approach to building out neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

We respectfully ask you to remove all "by-right" provisions in the bill, restore the invaluable tool of inclusionary zoning to full strength, and consult with your communities to fully learn how this legislation would impact the cities and towns you serve.

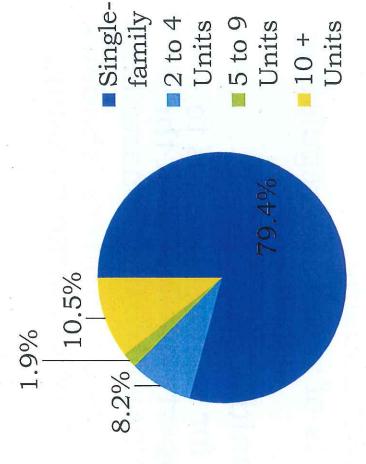

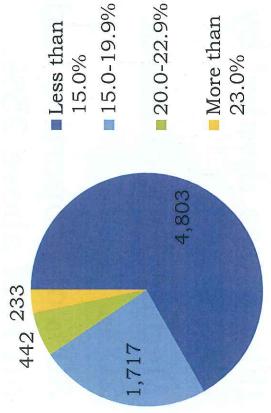

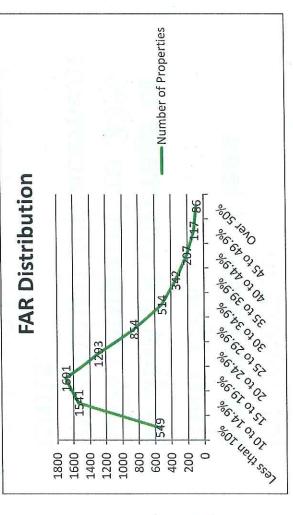

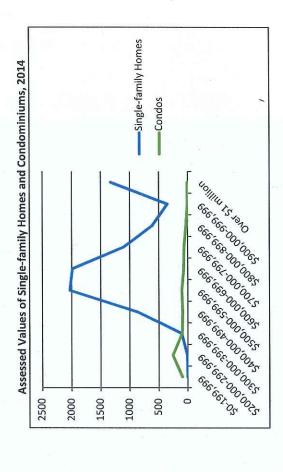

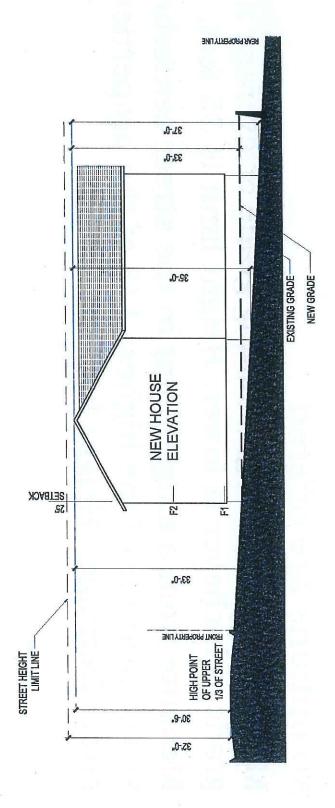

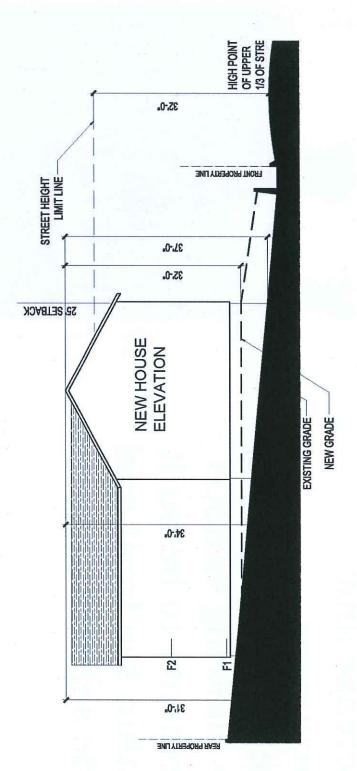

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# Town of Needham Board of Selectmen Minutes for May 24, 2016 Selectmen's Chamber Needham Town Hall

# 6:45 p.m. Informal Meeting with Citizens:

Chris Thomas, Vinh Truong, and Bony Ganugapanta, all seniors at Needham High School spoke with the Board about the negative environmental impact of using plastic shopping bags. They asked the Board consider banning the use of plastic bags within the Town.

Alan Rubin spoke with the Board about a permit application he requested for setting up his hot dog cart on July 4, 2016 in Needham. He commented obtaining a permit has never been an issue until this year when he was taken aback by questions from Town employees who verify information.

# 7:02 p.m. Call to Order:

A meeting of the Board of Selectmen was convened by Chairman Matthew D. Borrelli. Those present were Marianne B. Cooley, Daniel P. Matthews, Maurice P. Handel, John A. Bulian, Town Manager Kate Fitzpatrick, and Recording Secretary Mary Hunt.

### 7:02 p.m. Introduction of Director of Human Resources:

Christopher Coleman, Assistant Town Manager/Director of Operations appeared before the Board to introduce Rachel Glisper, the Town's new Director of Human Resources.

Mr. Coleman said Ms. Glisper began working for the Town on March 21, 2016. He said an extensive search produced approximately 30 applicants for the position, commenting Ms. Glisper was the preferred candidate. Ms. Glisper commented on her 16 years of experience in Human Resources, both in the private and public sectors.

The Board welcomed Ms. Glisper to the Town of Needham and wished her well in her new position.

### 7:05 p.m. Board Discussion:

# 1. Medical Marijuana Dispensary Applications

Mr. Borrelli summarized the process thus far. He said a public hearing was held on March 22, 2016 and additional questions were asked of the applicants on May 10, 2016. He noted more information has been received from the applicants since the last meeting. He commented on a proposed ballot initiative for recreational marijuana use. Mr. Borrelli said additional research highlights the question that should the Town allow a Registered Marijuana Dispensary to be sited in Needham and whether or not recreational use could be as of right. Mr. Borrelli said he is

concerned the question remains unanswered. He asked the Selectmen for their opinion of each applicant.

Mr. Bulian said the process to site a Registered Marijuana Dispensary in Needham began several years ago. He said the Board of Selectmen listened to three applicants and received a lot of information. He noted the Board of Selectmen meeting held on May 10, 2016 was a good question and answer session that gave him additional information. Mr. Bulian said he favors issuing a letter of support or non-opposition to Sage Cannabis, Inc., because Sage has answered all of the Town's questions every step of the way. He said Michael Dundas, President and CEO knows the process, as well as the rules and regulations. He said Sage Cannabis, Inc., has met all of the elements asked by the Board of Selectmen. He commented he was particularly impressed by the delivery controls relative to the GPS lock system, noting it is truly innovative and creative. Mr. Bulian commented Medical Marijuana of Massachusetts lacked knowledge of regulations, particularly regarding delivery to a business. He also commented MMM was notified by the Department of Public Health on April 13, 2016 that they were unable, per regulations, to meet the 1 oz. limitation to hardship cases, as acknowledged by Mr. Herlihy, CEO in a letter dated April 26, 2016 to the Department of Public Health. Mr. Bulian said the information was not disclosed at the May 10, 2016 Board of Selectmen meeting, nor by any subsequent communication. Mr. Bulian noted there are as many as 30% hardship cases, which is a material fact that should have been disclosed. Mr. Bulian concluded MMM has elements that make them a quality candidate, but they are lacking in understanding and actions, and for that reason he supports Sage Cannabis, Inc., for a letter of non-opposition.

Mr. Handel commented both applicants are qualified. He said MMM appears more patient and medically oriented, while Sage Cannabis, Inc. appears more interested in a production/pharmaceutical operation. He said he prefers a medical business model, therefore supporting MMM for a letter of support or non-opposition.

Mr. Matthews said both applicants are qualified. He commented on the pending recreational use referendum, noting in some places there may be expanded rights for those holding a medical marijuana permit. He commented it appears the Board is voting on an item which may have broader implications. Mr. Matthews suggested he would like a commitment from each applicant that they would not take advantage of expanded recreational rights, without appearing before the Board of Selectmen for further review and approval.

Mr. Borrelli agreed he can not vote for either candidate unless each agrees that they would not operate as a recreational facility without appearing before the Board of Selectmen for approval.

Ms. Cooley said she is not a fan of the business and is concerned, having learned over the last week, about the understanding of the recreational use marijuana ballot initiative. She said the initiative leaves the Town open to automatically approve

and provide for recreational marijuana facility. She said she supports Mr. Matthews proposal that the Community Host Agreement require approval by the Board of Selectmen if there is expanded use. She commented she recognizes voters indicated support for medical marijuana. Ms. Cooley suggested the Board of Selectmen provide feedback to the State regarding hardship marijuana cases and that the current proposal is excessive. She said the amount of marijuana involved in hardship cases at no charge seems crazy. Ms. Cooley said she supports issuing a letter of support or non-opposition to Sage Cannabis, Inc.

Mr. Handel agreed the Board of Selectmen should require approval, much in the same way it requires approval of alcohol licenses. He commented the Town should not commit to establishing a concentration in the mixed-use 128 area, saying much more discussion is needed.

Mr. Matthews asked Ms. Fitzpatrick if any of the applicants answered how they would deal with the question of expanded rights should the referendum pass. Ms. Fitzpatrick said while she does not want to speak for any applicant, the answers reflect the ambiguity contained in the initiative petition and the lack of specificity, noting concerns regarding a provision that an RMD could begin selling at retail immediately. She said another provision seems to suggest RMD's have preferred status to apply for retail. Ms. Fitzpatrick noted some concern expressed that an RMD that might want to change its business model, and would the RMD be locked in to a procedure through the Board of Selectmen that another entity would not be. She said the Town could craft satisfactory language. Mr. Matthews clarified Ms. Fitzpatrick feels the Board could move ahead with making a decision to issue a letter of support or non-opposition tonight, and the issue could be addressed in the Community Agreement. Ms. Fitzpatrick said if the Board conditioned the approval on the Agreement, and subsequently approves the Agreement, it would be reasonable.

Discussion ensued on proper wording of a motion.

Mr. Borrelli suggested a broader motion should the referendum not pass, that there would be no expansion of the use of recreational marijuana until approved by the Board of Selectmen. He said language should be crafted by the Town Manager and Town Counsel, working with Counsel for the Applicant with further approval by the Board of Selectmen at its next meeting on June 14, 2016.

Discussion ensued on proper language of a motion including a recreational waiver provision.

Mr. Matthews asked Mr. Borrelli his preference in applicants. Mr. Borrelli said he never supported the idea of recreational marijuana. He said with voter approval and Town Meeting direction, the Board of Selectmen must make a decision in the best interest of the Town. He said based on evidence, letters, and testimony, along with parking and location, he supports issuing a letter of support or non-opposition to

Sage Cannabis, Inc., pending a recreational waiver provision and an increase in the Agreement fee as represented by Attorney Cramer.

Mr. Matthews said the vote tonight is tentative, subject to further formal vote of the Board of Selectmen. He said both applicants are qualified, but based on discussion he supports issuing a letter of non-opposition to Sage Cannabis, Inc.

Motion by Mr. Matthews that the Board of Selectmen tentatively vote to issue a letter of non-opposition to Sage Cannabis, Inc., based on the Community Benefit Agreement and recreational waiver provision to be developed by Town Counsel, Town Manager, and Attorney for the Applicant, subject to further vote by the Board of Selectmen.

Second: Mr. Bulian. Unanimously approved 5-0.

### 2. Minuteman School Project

Mr. Borrelli referred to a letter dated May 18, 2016 and spreadsheet outlining two options for the Minuteman School Building project. Mr. Matthews said he and Ms. Cooley continue working on the project. He explained the project requires unanimous approval or a waiver by all 16 member communities. He said the Town of Arlington is due to vote on an override scheduled for June 14, 2016, and Belmont, by majority vote at its Town Meeting voted "No" on the project, which effectively vetoes the bonds. He said there are a few possible paths to move forward and the school district has written to the MSBA for an extension. Mr. Matthews said the critical issue is whether or not Belmont may change its vote. based on further ongoing discussion among all parties, in order to achieve the level of agreement needed. Mr. Matthews said the path forward is very difficult without participation by the Town of Belmont. He said size of school may be an issue. Mr. Matthews said towns continue to talk, however if the necessary approval is not reached for the MSBA project, then the default option of "pay as you go" to the existing facility is a very challenging situation. He commented on costs and if the MSBA option is off the table, dissolution of the district may occur. Mr. Matthews said the Town of Needham must make long range contingency plans for how to provide for its vocational students. He said any option would take over five years to complete.

Ms. Cooley noted the "pay as you go" option is more expensive for Needham than building a new school, noting it is a less desirable situation at an increased cost to the Town. She said the towns are still talking and have agreed to another round, and that she is hopeful.

Mr. Matthews gave a timeline of impending meetings and town votes.

Ms. Cooley reminded the Board that the Minuteman school district is regional, with a school board and superintendent who are coordinating many stakeholders. Mr. Matthews said that while the option of going to a referendum is not off the table, some serious discussion is required, as that option carries the risk of failure and

damage that could cause towns to leave the district. Mr. Matthews reiterated the goal is to get the ten member towns to work together.

### 3. Food Truck/Food Cart Next Steps

Mr. Borrelli referred to discussion prior to Town Meeting regarding the policy causing the "Hot Dog Man" to close. He said a public hearing indicated residents might want some type of food cart use, which he said needs to be balanced with the businesses in Town. He stated the issue was referred back to the Board of Selectmen at Town Meeting. He asked for Board comment.

Mr. Handel said there is a difference between food trucks and food carts, noting the "Hot Dog Man" was a nice amenity, but not sustainable given the circumstances. He said he thinks there would be much less opposition to a small scale food cart opportunity somewhere near the downtown but not taking up metered parking spaces. He said the Town should possibly experiment to see the impact.

Mr. Bulian concurred with Mr. Handel. He said there is a desire by some residents to see the restrictions loosened, but not to take up metered parking spaces. Mr. Bulian said there may be places in the general downtown area that might accommodate a cart, but it is important to have input from restaurants and businesses. He said limited events may also be appropriate.

Ms. Cooley supports Mr. Bulian's comments. She suggested loosening restrictions in a way that supports people using fields, i.e. Defazio. She commented she looks forward to more discussion.

Mr. Matthews said his view is more cautious. He said there is general agreement for allowing mobile food vendors in places that do not have restaurants. He said, however, his experience and observation indicates many people do not know how many different food service options and products are available in Needham. He said there is a lot of variety. Mr. Matthews commented the advocates of mobile food vendors believe they are protecting the business district. He noted it is the exact opposite of what really happens. He said the people working in the business district are subject to all kinds of rules, regulations, and mandates. He commented that by having a mobile food vendor come in, who is not subject to the same rules and regulations is unfair. He cited the lack of mobile food vendors at the Farmer's Market, noting bathrooms are necessary, but because of a courtesy agreement with the fixed location restaurants in the neighborhood, Farmer's Market patrons are allowed use of restaurant bathrooms. He said the same courtesy does not have to be extended to the mobile food vendors. He said there are vacant store fronts in the downtown and invited people "try their hand" in the food service business, noting there is plenty of opportunity. Mr. Matthews commented it is expensive and hard work that is highly competitive, and he is not willing to favor one group over another. Mr. Matthews commented on the \$1000 annual permit fee and said mobile food vendors are much harder to regulate and raise more issues for town staff to work with than fixed locations. He suggested the Town move slowly. Mr.

Matthews commented on vendors at events and fields, saying some parents don't want the nuisance and some clubs want to have the "franchise" to support their operation. He said he is willing to consider the issue further, but the bottom line is that the rules must be fair, understood by everyone, and applied equally.

Mr. Handel said there is a difference between a food truck and food cart. He said it is a question of ambiance and suggested the Town experiment with a location near the downtown.

Ms. Cooley said Mr. Matthews' viewpoint is not all that different, noting she was not advocating the Town make a change. She agreed with Mr. Handel regarding the possibility of allowing a food cart. Ms. Cooley suggested a streamlined approval process, similar to that of Wellesley.

Mr. Borrelli clarified there is no interest in having food trucks near the downtown business districts, but there is some interest to explore loosening food cart restrictions, based on feedback from the restaurant owners. He said cart permits must also be considered. He said he is interested in considering food cart vendors, but not food trucks. He said it would interesting to have a "food truck day" for a limited time at Claxton Field where traffic is not in the downtown.

Mr. Matthews said the first step is to collect input from different Boards, particularly Park and Recreation, then hold a public hearing.

Mr. Bulian suggested reaching out to the business owners for an informal meeting.

Ms. Fitzpatrick said drafting revised regulations would require changes to both the zoning and general by-law. She said review is important so as not to run into any unintended consequences.

### 4. Ridge Hill/Nike Community Campus Concept

Mr. Matthews commented Town Meeting appeared pleased the Board of Selectmen was moving in a positive direction toward creating a community campus at the Ridge Hill/Nike parcels. He said it is important to engage the Conservation Commission early in discussion as their mission is to be protective of conservation land. He commented on the possibility of expanding land under jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen, which will improve the active use options and conservation values. He said the two current users at the Nike site must be kept informed and engaged in the process.

Mr. Handel noted the complex land and planning situation. He said he agrees with Mr. Matthews in concept, but cautioned the Board of Selectmen to keep an open mind about potential solutions and the ultimate goal of an active community recreational area within an area also devoted to conservation.

Mr. Borrelli said multiple scenarios are possible, and that a joint meeting will be held.

### 8:03 p.m. Town Manager:

Kate Fitzpatrick, Town Manager appeared before the Board with one item to discuss:

### 1. Community Compact Application - Information Technology

Ms. Fitzpatrick asked the Board for its approval and to authorize her to submit a request for an Information Technology audit through the State's Community Compact program. She explained the program and said that it was started by Governor Baker in 2015.

Ms. Fitzpatrick recommends the Town of Needham participate in the Community Compact program in the area of information technology. She proposed to seek the assistance of the Commonwealth in evaluating the Town's existing IT structure and current staffing level against the Town's long and short term IT strategies and needs. She commented in order to meet the technological challenges that municipalities face requires a solid infrastructure, the creation and execution of a sound strategic plan, and a realistic staffing plan to support and execute it.

Ms. Cooley asked if the audit encompasses schools?

Ms. Fitzpatrick said Town IT infrastructure was primarily being considered, but by its nature some synergy would occur.

Motion by Mr. Handel that the Board approve and authorize the Town Manager to submit a request for an Information Technology Audit through the Community Compact program.

Second: Mr. Bulian. Unanimously approved 5-0.

Mr. Borrelli offered condolences from the Board of Selectmen to Governor Baker, whose mother passed away earlier this week.

### 8:10 p.m. Endorse Hillside School Schematic Design

Sue Neckes, School Committee Chair, George Kent, PPBC Chair, Steve Popper, Director of Design and Construction, Hank Haff, PFD Project Manager, and Don Walter, Dore and Whittier Architects, Inc., appeared before the Board to discuss the next phase, the Hillside School Schematic Design, which will be submitted by June 2, 2016 for a vote of the MSBA Board on July 20, 2016.

A Powerpoint presentation was viewed.

Mr. Walter updated the Board on the design of the new Hillside School. He discussed the site, building plans and images, and the schedule.

Mr. Borrelli commented the project is expensive, but beautiful. Discussion ensued on the cost of the project. Mr. Popper said there are a number of factors contributing to the cost, firstly, that the building is elongated due to the site. Mr. Kent said site work also contributes to the costs, as it is not flat land. Mr. Haff commented if the Town tried to build on the existing Hillside School site, the cost would have been much more.

Mr. Borrelli asked about the project schedule and the possibility of saving money if the project is accelerated.

Discussion ensued on the project schedule, cost of design, and funding. Mr. Popper referred to a comparative schedule and the possibility of accelerating the project. Mr. Popper said the school could essentially be opened one year earlier, thereby saving on escalation costs.

Mr. Handel said it is a good idea.

Mr. Borrelli agreed, the savings is a compelling argument.

Ms. Cooley clarified the risk is if the Town does not pass the override, not risk from the State process.

Mr. Bulian said the benefit is to the Hillside community, construction savings, and interest rate savings.

Mr. Borrelli said spending \$250,000 could save the Town \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000.

Ms. Fitzpatrick noted if the project moves forward, the MSBA will reimburse the Town a portion of eligible costs.

Mr. Borrelli said the plan must be considered.

Motion by Mr. Bulian that the Board vote to endorse the Hillside School Schematic Design for submittal to the MSBA.
Second: Ms. Cooley. Unanimously approved 5-0.

8:45 p.m. Executive Session (Exception 6)

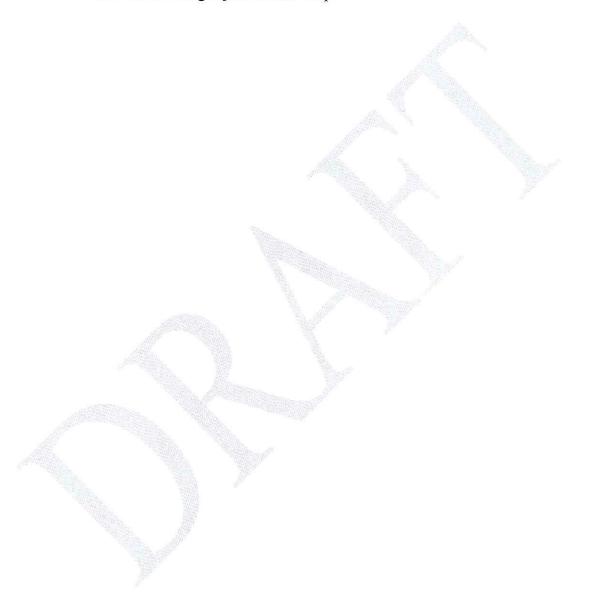
